Cures for Rheumatism.

In Michigan a double cedar knot is carried in the pocket to cure rheumatism, and in New Hampshire a man carried a gall from the stems of goldenrod for the same disease. A small white grub is in the gall and he thought as long as the grub remained alive no rheumatism could get hold of him. Hickory nuts, the buckeye and its cousin, the horse chestnut, which brings good luck in New Jersey, are other foes to rheumatism in different localities.

Some people wear a strange ring made of a potato with a hole bored through it for rheumatism, and others carry a plain potato in the pocket. The charm is more potent if the potato has been stolen. Almost anything seems to have rheumatism fighting properties, for in southern Michigan a pebble in the pocket serves to ward it off.—Kansas City Journal.

A Sure Cure for a Balking Horse.

An officer of the police detail said recently: "When I was a mounted policeman I learned of a most humane and kind method of curing a balking horse. It not only never fails, but it does not give the slightest pain to the animal. When the horse refuses to go take the front foot at the fetlock and bend the leg at the knee joint. Hold it thus for three minutes, and let it down and the horse will go.

"The only way in which I can account for this effective mastery of the horse is that he can think of only one thing at a time, and having made up his mind not to go, my theory is that the bending of the leg takes his mind from the original thought."—Our Animal Friends.

Where the Sun Shines Most.

The southern coasts are the most sunny ones, if we except the Channel islands, as represented by Jersey, where alone one-half the possible amount of radiance is registered for May and August. The east coast of Britain is also decidedly sunny. In the summer and early autumn Ireland shares with the west coast of Scotland the reputation of persistently clouded skies, but later on, toward November, the observatory in Phoenix park, Dublin, records the greatest average amount of sunshine for that month—namely, 28 per cent. In the metropolis, as might be expected, the record is bad.—Chambers' Journal.

The Ladder Dwarf.

"Among the strange and weird demons and bogies which are believed by miners to haunt the workings under ground not the least horrible is the 'Ladder Dwarf,'" said a former prospector. "I never saw the creature myself, but he is described as hunched-backed, with a short body, large head and enormous long and powerful arms. In fact, he resembles an exaggerated gorilla. His favorite trick is climbing the ladders by means of which the miners leave the mines, raising himself with his long arms, and as he passes the rungs kicking them out one by one. He is supposed to always do this just before an accident of some kind in the mine."—Washington Star.

An Unexpected Passenger.

During an inundation of the Brahmaputra river the man who took the helm of the steamer at daylight was astonished to see a large tiger sitting in a crouching attitude upon the rudder. A heavily laden flat or barge was lashed upon each side of the steamer, and the stems of these vessels projected beyond the deck of the steamer right and left.

The decks of the barges were only three feet above the water, and the tiger, alarmed by a shout from the helmsman, made a leap from the rudder to the nearest vessel.

In an instant all was confusion. The terrified natives fled in all directions before the tiger, which, having knocked over two men during its panic stricken onset, bounded off the flat and sought security upon the deck of the steamer alongside.

Scared by its new position and by the shouts of the people, it darted into the first hole it could discover. This was the open door of the immense paddle box. The captain rushed to the spot and closed the entrance, thereby boxing the tiger completely.

The door being well secured, there was no danger, and an ornamental air hole in the paddle box enabled the captain to obtain a good view of the tiger sitting upon one of the floats. A shot through his head put an end to his career, and as the men who had been knocked over were more frightened than hurt, the affair was concluded in a way to satisfy all parties—except the tiger.—Youth's Companion.

Bombarding the Enemy.

The island of St. Thomas, in the West Indies, has near its shores the Ship rock, which appears, when seen from a short distance, almost precisely like a full rigged ship under canvas. If the sky is clouded and the atmosphere hazy, the illusion is remarkable.

M. M. Ballou repeats in "Equatorial America" the story of a mortifying mistake made by a French corvette while cruising in these latitudes. It was at a time when the buccaniers were making great havoc with legitimate commerce in the West Indies.

It seems that the coast was partially hidden by a fog when the corvette made out this rock, and supposing it to be a ship under sail, fired a gun to leeward to bid her heave to.

Of course there was no response to the shot, and the Frenchman brought his ship closer, and cleared the decks for action.

Satisfied that he had to do with a powerful adversary, he discharged the whole of his starboard armament into the supposed ship looming through the mist. The corvette went about, and prepared to deliver her port guns in a similar manner.

Then the fog slowly dispersed, and the rock smiled grimly on its assailants.

An Experience with a Loon.

Captain John Hea, of the Chicago Towing company, had an experience with a loon several years ago. His tug was lying outside the harbor late one afternoon waiting for a tow to come along. Just at nightfall the crew caught sight of a loon and resolved upon a chase. Around and around went the loon, swimming and flying, always making the circle smaller. They tired him out and Captain Hea had pile pole ready to strike, but something occurred to change the mind of the whole crew in an instant.

"Suddenly raising itself in the water," said Captain Hea, "and stretching out its long neck, that bird gave out a cry of distress and anguish that seemed human, and at times supernatural, ascending to the very clouds. A squall swooped down on the lake from the north just at this juncture and our tug being five miles down the lake we made a run for the harbor. We made bad weather of it, the tug shipping several seas, but we finally got into port safely. Just as we rounded the piers that loon circled around the pilot house with a solemn croak and then winged its way back to sea again."—Chicago Herald.

Treatment for Snake Bites.

Sir Joseph Fayrer offers the following suggestions for the treatment of snake bites: Let the patient be quiet. Do not fatigue him by exertion. When or even before symptoms of poisoning make their appearance, give can-de-luce or liquor ammonia or carbonate of ammonia, or even better than these, hot spirits and water. There is no occasion to intoxicate the person, but give it freely and at frequent intervals. If he becomes low, apply sinapisms and hot bottles, galvanism or electrogalvanism over the heart and diaphragm.

Cold douches may also be useful. Encourage and cheer the patient as much as possible. As to local effects, if there be great pain, anodynes may be applied or administered, and antiseptic poultices to remove sloughs; collection of matter must be opened. Other symptoms are to be treated on general surgical principles. This, I believe, is the sum and substance of what we can do.
