DIED.

RICHMOND.—Friday, July, 15th, 1892, on his farm near Dallas, from fracture of the skull, Thos. G. Richmond, aged 60 years.

Mr. Richmond was out on his fine farm with the county surveyor doing some work yesterday morning, and as he was climbing a fence the top-board gave way and precipitated him backward onto the ground, resulting in almost instant death. The deceased was an old resident, and has been an active man all his life, having also accumulated a good fortune of not less than \$50,000. He has been a member of the State Agricultural board, and was always a prominent worker for the state fair at Salem. Mr. Richmond made a business of raising fine horses and stock, in which pursuit he took great pride and enjoyed good success. His family consists of a wife and five children, three of whom are married, and two boys aged 15 and 18 years living at the family home in Dallas. He was also a prominent Mason and Odd Fellow, both of which orders will assist at his funeral, to be held Sunday afternoon.

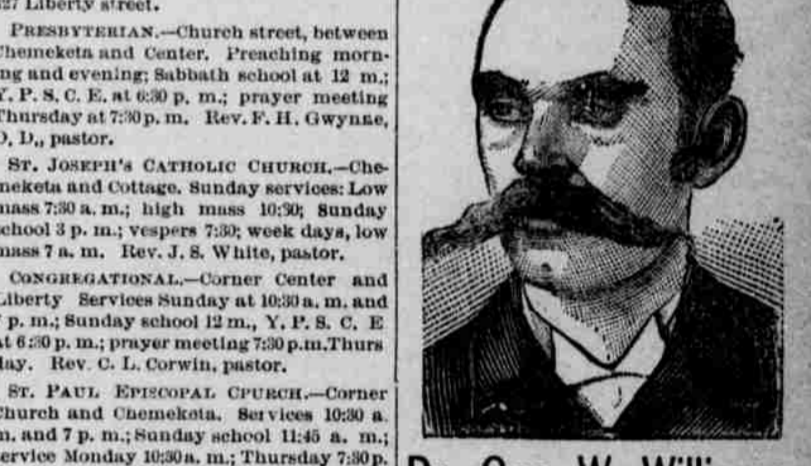
