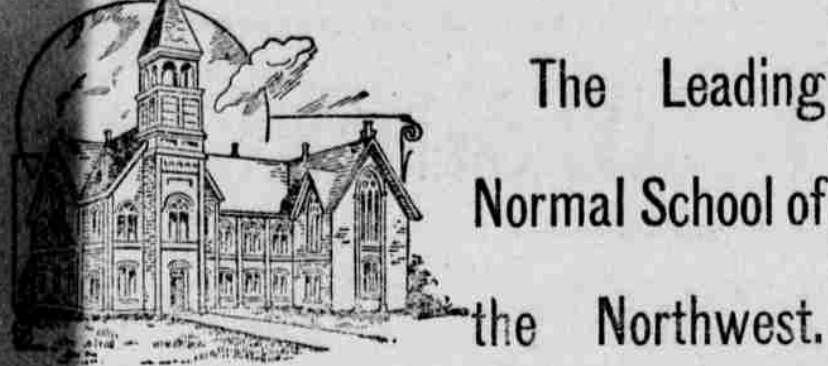

STAGE GLINTS.

William H. Rieger, who went abroad with the Arion society as solo tenor, has been engaged to sing at the Worcester festival.

Mme. Sissieretta Jones, the "Black Patti," will tour the country for the next three years under the management of Major Pond.

Mr. Bolosky Kiralfy has arranged a new spectacle which he has called "The Orient," and intends producing it in New York city in the fall.

The play comedian James T. Powers will star in next season has been called "A Mad Bargain." It is by Mr. John J. McNeill and Mr. Julian Mitchell.

Miss Adelaide Detton will make a tour of this country next season, beginning in November. Miss Detton is an American girl, and has been for five years before the British public.

The Germs of Fungi.

"The important part which fungi are intended to play in the economy of nature, chiefly as scavengers, is indicated by the plentiful provision made for their reproduction," said a student of vegetable pathology. "So widely distributed are the germs of these plants that every breath of air you take probably contains several kinds. They are everywhere in the atmosphere, ready to develop themselves whenever the peculiar conditions adapted to each species are offered."
