THE INSTITUTE CLOSES.

Work of the Last Days—Instructors and Teachers.

During Thursday the usual order of work was observed and the interest in class-drill was unabated. Prof. Wetzell's last work was a most excellent lesson upon government in connection with his work upon geography. No teacher could listen to it without getting many helpful hints as to how to make geography practical, and the feeling was unanimous, when Prof. Wetzell said that probably this was his last year's work in Oregon, that our loss would be a great gain to our neighbor state.

Friday morning Prof. Ackerman presented the claims of the Oregon State Reading Circle. He has this work in charge, and after showing teachers the advantage of systematic professional reading, entered into the details of his plan of work so that every teacher in the state might be benefited. There is no other tool which would yield better results in the schoolroom than this careful reading of some of the best educational works published, every page of which add to the teacher's strength. Prof. Ackerman also gave the teachers a cordial invitation to attend the Institute at Portland in September. Supt. Graham made remarks which gave each the feeling that Marion Co. teachers were sure of competent, cordial cooperation in every effort to place its schools on higher ground, and it is predicted the next two year's record will show the people have chosen wisely in putting him at the head of the school interests of this county. Let the teachers stand by and support him in his efforts to build up this work. No one deserves more credit than Prof. Anderson, of East Salem school for making the institute that has just closed one of the best ever held in Marion Co. He has never let slip an opportunity to help wherever there was a lack. His class-drills were of a character to interest all, and was a key to why so many of his pupils are so enthusiastic in their work. Every day added to his personal friends among those in attendance. Mr. Krapps, in a few well chosen words, paid each of the conductors a neat and deserved compliment. Then all adjourned for a trip through the penitentiary. It is due to the janitor of the building to express the appreciation of the teachers for his pleasant gentlemanly manner about the halls and consideration for the comfort of all.

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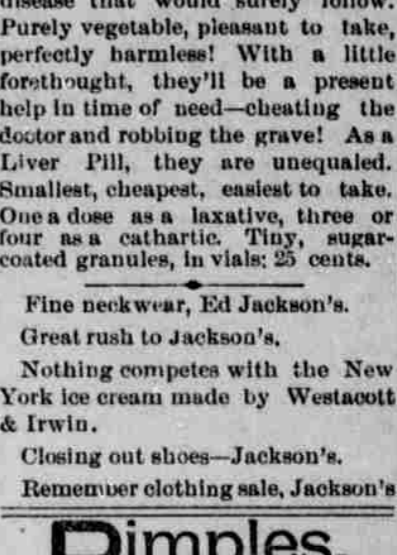
