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THE NEW ELECTRIC.

The Dirt Flying-Pole Setting-Contract Letting-The Route.

It will go down into history that first dirt was moved in the construction of the Salem Motor Railway company's electric line on Tuesday, July 26th, 1892. The men commenced work this morning on Commercial street at the north bridge, and work is being pushed south. The present grade is being adopted, and a first-class track will be laid. Shipments of iron and spikes are expected daily, which will be laid as fast as they arrive. Pole setting begins today by Contractors Mason and Smith, and the ties are already largely delivered.

A contract will be let this evening for all the work and bridges on the Winter and Oak extension, the various contractors now being busy making their figures. In a few days work will also be commenced on this portion of the line, and Salem's bucket brigade will again be largely increased.

A loop will be made from the Oak street line at 12th street to the end of their present line at the S. P. passenger depot. This will necessitate a new bridge just east of the present 12th street bridge, and thus relieve the city's bridge of the car traffic.

Drowned by a Boy.
DUNQUE, (Ia.) July 25.—Frank Mulquency, a boy, was drowned a month ago off a raft lying along shore in the river at this point. His death was supposed to have been accidental, as he could not swim. He was in bathing with two other lads about the same age, Mulholland and Gussie Randolph. Mulholland was the larger of the three and was 16 years old. It is now learned that Mulquency was thrown from the raft into the water by Mulholland and purposely drowned.

Young Mulquency was paddling about in shallow water, between the two ribs of the raft, when Mulholland took hold of him and said he would show him how to swim. The boy begged to be let go, saying he did not know how to swim.

"Well, I'll make you swim," said Mulholland, and with that he took hold of the screaming and kicking boy and threw him off the raft into deep water. He never rose, and the current carried him under the raft. The two boys at once gave an alarm and young Mulquency's body was found that night or next morning, the drowning having occurred late in the afternoon. The story Mulholland told at the time was that the boy had jumped off the raft during his absence and went down before he could reach him. Young Rudolph told his parents the truth when he went home, and perhaps told other boys. At last the story got out and Mulholland was arrested. Rudolph was held as a witness. It is reported that Mulquency had some property left him that would be in the case of his death revert to certain relatives, who are believed to have employed Mulholland to drown him. Other arrests will follow, and the case promises to be a most sensational one.
