

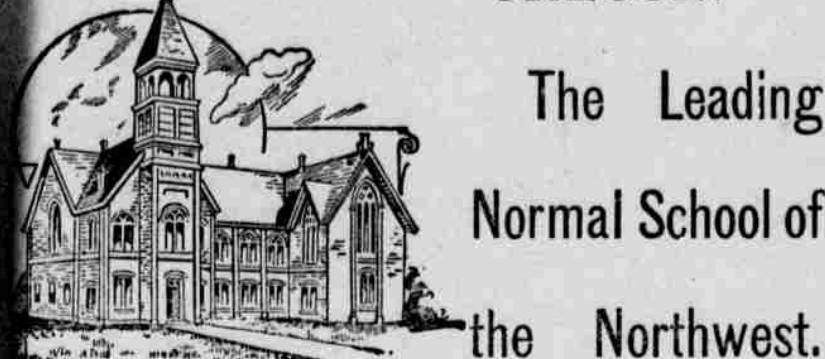

Daniel Webster as a Pedagogue.

Daniel Webster took charge of Fryburg academy in January, 1802, making the journey thither from his home in New Hampshire, a distance of 100 miles, on horseback. He taught two terms, or until September. His instruction is said to have been so acceptable to the trustees that they gave him a special vote of thanks and a small pecuniary gift when he retired from his position as teacher. In his leisure moments Daniel Webster copied deeds in the registry office, and these may still be seen there. He was anxious to increase his salary of \$350 as much as possible, in order that he might assist his elder brother in the payment of his college expenses.

The Fourth of July of that year was made memorable by the entrance of Mr. Webster into the realm of oratory, where later in life he was destined to reign as a king. This first oration is still in existence and has been issued in a printed form. It is unknown whether Mr. Webster fed his scholars upon the milk of the constitution, pure and undiluted, but it is presumed that this document, which Daniel as a little lad first read from his new red bordered pocket handkerchief by the light of a pine knot, must even then have engaged the deepest thoughts of the young manhood of its coming defender. Mr. Webster in after years never forgot this humble institution, but always kept a warm place in his heart for that which was his first stepping stone to public life.—Portland (Me.) Press.

Do Lying Witnesses Always Yawn?
