ASTORIA & EASTERN R. R.

News of the most encouraging nature comes in from the vicinity of the great tunnel on the route of the Astoria & Eastern railway. A gentleman who came in from that point states that about 700 men are bunched on the last three miles of the road this side of the tunnel, and that but a short time will elapse before that portion of the road will be finished. All who have inspected the completed portions of the road say that the work is as good, if not better, than anything else, of the kind in the country, and that no expense is being spared in that construction. Where the route lies along that selected by William Reid for the Astoria & South Coast main changes have been made and where Reid intended putting in trestle work in crossing gulches Mr. Gross is filling in by cutting immense quantities of rock, thereby making the roadbed one of the best ever built. It is expected that as soon as the first consignment of rails arrive here, cars will be running from the seashore to the tunnel within a couple of weeks at farthest, as the Messrs. Corey Bros. are confident that they will lay three miles of steel daily. It is even possible that the connection will be made between the tunnel and this city before the expiration of the present year, and that the citizens may have the pleasure of riding out behind the iron horse and viewing the picturesque scenery of the Nehalem country, and inspecting its magnificent timber.—Astorian.

BETTER SERVICE WANTED.—The Board of railroad commissioners in session in this city yesterday passed the following resolution:

"Whereas, This board has been informed and has personal knowledge of the fact that the Union Pacific company carries only a conductor and one brakeman on the passenger trains over its mountain divisions between Portland and Huntington; Therefore be it resolved that said company be informed that it is the sense of this board that such service is not sufficient to adequately protect the traveling public against liability for accidents which might result from such service; also that it be requested to put on two brakemen between Portland and Huntington on all of its passenger trains."

A GHASTLY FIND.

Mechanics Find a Skeleton Under the State House Gallery.

This forenoon as Contractor Southwick and his crew of workmen were engaged at tearing out the old gallery of representatives hall in the State House, a most ghastly sight met their gaze. After Al. Mize had torn up a good strip of the floor he thought he would see what was under there anyway, he was shocked at finding a complete skeleton, with nearly all the flesh decayed from it. He called up the boys, and a hasty consultation was had. Bids Received by the Street Committee—The Work Will Go.

As advertised in the JOURNAL, the street committee opened bids for street improvement last night. The same will be considered by the council tonight, and are given below.

The bids were as follows:

The Money Was Gone.

PANAMA (via Galveston), Aug. 2.—The steamship San Jose, of the Pacific Mail steamship line, arrived here last night, having left San Francisco July 15 for Panama by way of Acapulco. The vessel was at Acapulco on the 22d. The passengers were not allowed to land, and there was considerable excitement on the steamship when it was learned that the restriction was owing to a reported large theft of money and jewelry. One of the passengers, it appears, entrusted several bags containing money and gems amounting altogether to \$12,500 to the purser, who has been 32 years in the service of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, and whose integrity is regarded as above suspicion. The money and valuables were stolen on the voyage, but by whom is a mystery. The police came on board and made a search among both the passengers and crew, but without satisfactory results as far as is known.

WILES.—At 7.30 p. m., July 30, 1892, at his home in Stayton, Hiram Wiles, in his 71st year.
