## Weaver in Portland—The Party in Iowa—Political and Other News, Etc.

### PEOPLES PARTY.

**Gen. J. A. Weaver Opens the Campaign This Afternoon.**  
PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—General James B. Weaver, People's party nominee for president arrived here from San Francisco this morning. He will formally open the presidential campaign in a speech this afternoon and tonight. He is accompanied by his wife and Mrs. Lease of Kansas.

### Of Interest to Post Masters.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Considerable disappointment is felt at the postoffice department over the unexpected omission from the country civil bill of an appropriation of \$5000 which had been asked for to enable the sixth auditor's office of the treasury department, which audits postmasters' accounts, to employ 20 people for six months, at the rate of \$500 per year, to assist several million paid money orders which have accumulated and are accumulating in the office, and which, in their present state, prevent the settlement of thousands of postmasters' accounts. The fact that no provision had been made for their employment was not discovered until yesterday, when it was found necessary to rescind all action in this respect.

### The Eight Hour Law.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—Solicitor General Aldrich of the department of justice is preparing an opinion in regard to the application of the eight hour law, passed at the last session, to the public service and public work contracts.

### Sham Battle.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—The United States cruisers Charleston and Boston left here this morning under command of Admiral John Irwin, to convey three companies of the naval reserve of this city to Santa Cruz, Cal., where the battalion will have practice in naval maneuvers and will take part in a sham battle Saturday with the national guard now in encampment there.

### Postmaster Killed.

SEATTLE, Aug. 12.—Thomas C. Bliston, postmaster at Fremont, a northern suburb of Seattle, was killed yesterday while unloading sawlogs from a flat-car, at the Lake Union dump. Bliston had just taken a contract for unloading the logs, and went to work this morning. The first log he attempted to unload slipped and struck him in the chest, inflicting injuries from which he died a few minutes later.

### Killed For a Washing Bill.

GREENSBURG, Ind., Aug. 12.—Two brothers, Wm. and Sam. Little, got into a quarrel over \$1.80 which William owed the wife of Samuel for washing. William drew a knife and stabbed Samuel in the side killing him.

### Narrow Escape.

OREGON CITY, Aug. 12.—While at work on the suspension bridge this morning, John Nelson caught hold of a live electric wire with his bare hand and would have been killed had not a fellow workman pulled him off. His hand and arm were badly burned. The wire was carrying four thousand volts.

### Family Completely Wiped Out.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 12.—The house of William Lester at La Mesa district, ten miles out, has been burned in ashes. Two men are suspected of incendiarism. The last member of the Lester family recently died by a house falling on him. His wife and all his family have been accidentally killed, and all possessions of them were burned.

### A Contest in Alabama.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—It was unofficially said at the Republican headquarters that the managers will assist Kolb, the Alliance candidate, in making a contest in Alabama for the office of governor. General has been consulted and a preliminary is alleged to have been made, by which the result of the action can be set aside.

### Sitting Bull's Daughter.

WISCONSIN, N. Y., Aug. 12.—The daughter of Sitting Bull and Peter White, formerly of the United States army, were married here yesterday. Marle served with Custer a long while and it is reported she once saved his life when she was attacked by Indians.

### Steel Rails Recovered.

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Captain Ryan is in the city, and reports that work of getting the steel rails of the wreck of the Abercorn is progressing favorably. They have been between 1000 and 1200 tons, and have not gotten into the low water yet, but have had a little broken account of the rails being recovered.

### Commenced Suicide.

FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—Barney, head of the firm of Levy and Co., fruit commission merchant, committed suicide yesterday by shooting on the gas in his room.

### Cabinet Resigns.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Members of the cabinet met at noon today and agreed to resign. Most of the resignations will have to be today.

### Georgia Republicans.

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 12.—The republican state convention nominated electors at large. A resolution was adopted setting forth that it is inexpedient to nominate a state ticket.

### Must Have a License.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—The commissioner of internal revenue has decided that the various bi-chloride of gold institutes in the country must take out a government retail liquor license, involving an annual tax of \$25.

### Nominated for Congress.

SEWARD, Neb., Aug. 12.—The Independents of the fourth district nominated W. H. Doch, of Saunders county, for congress. Doch was on the Alliance ticket for lieutenant-governor two years ago.

### People's Party of Iowa.

DES MOINES, Aug. 12.—The people's party convention met in this city at 10 o'clock yesterday. The convention was called to order by J. J. Stott, and W. C. Weeks, of Winnebago, was elected temporary chairman. After adjournment for district caucuses, the following candidates for electors were announced:

### Will Not Prosecute Her.

PATERSON, N. J., Aug. 12.—Patrick Quinn, Western Union operator at Delaware station, who was shot by Hattie Acres in the telephone office, lies in the hospital in this city in a critical condition. He has refused to make any statement except to say he will not prosecute Miss Acres, as she had come to shoot him. He admits he promised to marry her and wronged her. Miss Acres is in custody pending the result of Quinn's injuries. She denies she attempted suicide after the shooting, by poison. After firing the two shots at Quinn, she handed him the smoking pistol and told him to shoot her, as she did not want to live. Miss Acres is an attractive young woman, 22 years of age, and belongs to a respectable family of Cresco, Pa.

### The New Cruiser Marblehead.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—It has been determined by the navy department that the cruiser Marblehead to be christened the cruiser Marblehead to be christened at Boston today. The duty will devolve upon Mrs. Charles H. Allen, wife of one of the contractors of the vessel. There has been some dispute as to the propriety of having a married woman christen the vessel. The usual custom has been to have the duty performed by a young maiden, but in view of the fact that the two naval vessels, the Baltimore and Raleigh, were christened by married ladies, precedents are regarded as no longer binding.

### From Cour d'Alene.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 12.—United States District Judge Beatty yesterday afternoon held that eleven of the Cour d'Alene rioters were guilty of contempt of court in violating the injunction served upon them restraining them from interfering with mine owners in the operation of mines. Judge Beatty sentenced the prisoners to terms ranging from four to eight months. Ten of the men who have been on trial were discharged.

### The men held, and their terms of imprisonment, are as follows: Thos. Eaton, John Fitzgerald, Dan Harrington, Hugh McGee, J. A. Nicholson, Gus. Ferguson, Thomas Whalen

### such six months; R. Robinson, four months, and Joseph Poynton, eight months. Thos. O'Brien, president of the miner's union, was held, but the sentence was deferred until the Bunker Hill-Sullivan case is heard. It is understood that an appeal will be taken and application for a writ of habeas corpus will be made to Justice Field. Judge Beatty, in rendering his decision, said that the question of diverse citizenship could have been raised in the original proceedings, but it had not been so raised. Court said it was not essential that each party should be served with a copy of an injunction. It was only necessary that they should know an injunction had been issued. Neither was it necessary that parties should have been named in the restraining order, that order having been issued against the miner's union. The judge stated that labor organizations were entirely lawful in the abstract, but the lawful character of a particular organization must be measured by its acts. The acts of the Cour d'Alene miner's union showed that they were of an unlawful character. A strict interpretation of law would render each member liable for the acts of the organization, and said he could, "there is no doubt I could hold all the defendants who are members of the union. I will not, however, apply that rule, but will endeavor to determine the connection of each of these respondents with occurrences at the Gem mill on July 11th." The court then analyzed the testimony as to the participation of each defendant in those occurrences with results given.

### Hal Pointer—Direct Race.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Aug. 12.—Nine thousand people were present at the Hal Pointer-Direct race yesterday. Betting was twenty-five to six in favor of Hal Pointer, but Direct captured all hearts, if not all pocketbooks, and received more applause than his swift competitor.

At 5 o'clock the two horses came down the stretch, neck and neck, and as they passed under the wire Pointer led the pole. They kept their positions to the turn, when Gera pulled Pointer a length ahead. At the half star Direct closed on to the flank of the gelding. Direct could not stand the pace, and Pointer steadily drew away until he gained a length at the last turn, and a half, in 2:09.
