BACK TO ALASKA.—Hon. Warren Truitt, United States district judge for the district of Alaska, is in the city, accompanied by his wife. They came down on the Queen, and have been spending several days in Oregon, where Judge Truitt has important business interests. They leave this morning on the return trip to Alaska. Judge Truitt was for several years one of the most prominent lawyers and leading Republicans of Oregon, to which state he came in 1870. He was county judge of Polk county, Or., in 1874, a member of the legislature in 1882, a presidential elector in 1884, and was afterward appointed register of the United States land office at Lakeview. Since then he has filled other important offices and resigned a fine federal position to take that of judge of the district of Alaska.—Seattle Post Intelligencer.

LECTURE ON JAPAN.—Last evening Naomi Tamura, the native Japanese, gave an interesting talk about the work of Christianity in his land. His statement of the growth of the work the past twenty years was a marvel to many. He believes the only way to Christianize Japan is to educate native preachers, and his object in coming to America is to build up a work of this character. Besides being pastor for a church of 400 members, he conducts private schools. He thinks the American home life is what is needed to help his race.

BOAT BURNERS CAUGHT.

The Men Who Fired the B. O. Young Neatly Captured.

When the little river steamer B. O. Young was burned a few weeks ago at Dove's landing, a short distance above Salem, a slight rumor was started that something might prove to be wrong about it. The boat was doing a poor business; had been sunk but a short time before, and was heavily insured; besides owing \$3500 for her machinery to the Salem Iron Works. Nothing more was said or heard about the matter until a few days ago a representative of the Fireman's Fund Insurance company appeared from San Francisco, ostensibly to settle up the loss. The man was Thos. Mc Carthy, and while he played the part of an adjuster, was in reality a detective employed by the underwriters. He met the men Capt. John Dove, David Young and C. A. Pyburn at the Hotel Willamette Wednesday evening, and after taking their testimony stated bluntly that he believed some one had burned the boat, and that being the case he proposed having thirty men on grounds the next morning early, to hunt for tools and other plunder that the perpetrators must have stolen and hid. He had already located the tools and had a man on the watch. His ruse worked, and started the men post haste for the spot to sink the tools in the river. In the meantime Sheriff John Knight and Deputy Sheriff Wrightman had gone to Dove's landing by way of Hall's Ferry. The ferryman was posted as to who would follow, and helped the men by secreting their horses and buggy. He took them over the river and they went afoot to the spot. Next Mr. Mc Carthy appeared at the ferry and was treated likewise. Shortly after appeared the three victims, when the ferryman shouted out of his chamber window, "ferry yourselves," which they did. The three men arrived at the clump of brush where the tools were hid about half an hour later. Dove remained in the buggy, while his accomplices went out to get the things. He was immediately covered, and was compelled to call to the other two: "Hurry up, come in quick." This had the necessary effect and brought them to the spot, where they were arrested at once. The officers handcuffed the three together, and lodged them in the county jail in Salem at 5:30 Thursday morning. The sack of tools was also brought. The men were not allowed to talk enroute, and on arriving at Salem were each put into a separate cell, where they could not communicate. It was still believed that the boat's compass must be hid in the brush, so Deputy Wrightman went out yesterday, taking Pyburn along in irons, and after a long search found it near where the other tools had been hid. Thus the men are lodged, and a good supply of evidence to convict them is secured.

On the day of the fire Kemp, the boat's engineer, was taken to the logging camp up the river by Capt. Dove, as he could not be trusted with the scheme. Dove's family also left the boat at this time, and before Dove returned the boat was burned, no one but Pyburn and Young being present at the time. Pyburn, the fireman, is believed to be the man who struck the match that made the fire that burned the boat that caused the arrest that will give Oregon three additional brick-makers.

District Attorney McCain arrived this afternoon from McMinnville, and is in conference with his deputy A. O. Condit and Mr. McCarthy. A preliminary examination will not be held before tomorrow, but the insurance company expects to push the prosecution to the end. On the whole, this is the neatest and most effective piece of detective work ever carried out in this section. It without a doubt confirms the verdict of many citizens, and reflects great credit upon the officers who performed service.

THE CONTRACT IS LET.
And Salem Will Have a \$30,000 Infirmary.

The asylum board held an adjourned meeting at the governor's office this morning, and a contract was let to John Gray for building the new asylum infirmary and engineer's cottage. The price is \$29,997. There were two lower bids which were withdrawn, that of Wikstrom & Chensy for \$25,721, and J. A. Hazell for \$25,975.

This will give the state two fine new buildings at Salem, and as the contractor has six months to finish the work, they will be ready for use next spring.

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THE HOP DROP THIS YEAR.

It Bids to Be Unusually Good—Lice Not Very Prevalent.

Albany Herald:—The hops-growers of this state are feeling exceedingly hopeful just at present, though every one, be he the owner of 100 acres or 1, is constantly on the outlook for the ubiquitous louse, which is making its appearance throughout the hopyards of this country very generally.

So far as mold is concerned, little fear is felt. But few such cases have come under the notice of growers, and little damage will be done. With two destructive agencies out of the way, there is no doubt but the growers would be largely ahead on crops this fall. The vines are all filling out rapidly and every week sees the tiny hops grow a little larger.

Under favorable circumstances the crops would be 50 per cent heavier than last year, and the fact that all the heavier growers are building new and larger drying houses and storage rooms is evidence that they are placing large trusts in the decrees of Providence. Early in the summer and late in spring, most growers looking downcast.

At the time rain was most needed it did not fall, and when dry, warm weather was prayed for it rained hard and the mercury gently pressed the button. This rain, however, did not evaporate, but it moistened the earth so thoroughly that when warm weather actually came the tendrils crawled up the poles and put forth their blooms.

Some growers are simply using a pure tobacco solution, while, like all other solutions, is applied to the under side of the leaves of the vines. As may be imagined, this is not the easiest task in the world, though with variety of spraying machines in use the operation would seem void of all trouble.

So far, however, no preparation has been found which will destroy the pests, and many growers have come to the conclusion that spraying is almost useless.

To overcome the effects of lice, moth and rust, the growers are constantly on the outlook for new features in the way of machinery, driers and poles. Several yards on French prairie have discarded poles, and use in their stead long wire trusses, from which the hop vines hang and run along across wires. This does away with the expense of poles which every year are becoming more costly, as the scarcity of material is felt. The most approved drying and baling machines are used, and the hophouses are being constructed according to new plans. They are built taller and narrower, and with better ventilators. Closer attention is being paid to the subject of cultivation.

No rust has appeared thus far, and no one anticipates trouble from that quarter. Lice are just beginning to put in a healthy appearance, though last year they were found in discouraging numbers nearly a month earlier than this. The louse appears not so destructive as last year either, and every grower is taking the utmost precaution to prevent the belligerent insect from spreading. For this purpose millions of gallons of "spray" are being used. Picking will begin about the first of September.
