

MAY BE A COSTLY EXPERIMENT.

It is feared by many persons that the attempt of the city council to get along without a city attorney may in the end prove a costly experiment. A lawyer of any ability from all parts of the state that can cannot be espected to draw so imbe had for the means at her disposal posed for the improvement of Commercial street and assessment of all mercial street and assessment of all that valuable property, and have it drawn so as to stand the test of the courts, and do this work at twenty-five dollars a month. There were times in the village days of Salem when one lawyer on the city council would draw up the ordinances required free gratis. That time is past. The property interests and public interests of the city are too great for the city to afford to have its ordinances drawn up by any but firstclass legal talent. A paving ordinance requires the most careful description of each particular piece of property. Actual ownership must be attached to each lot and that valuable property, and have it of property. Actual ownership must be attached to each lot, and in order to do this the county records must be searched, as an erroneous assessment is fatal to a collection after the street improvement is made. This opens the way to litigation and in some cases directly throwing the expense upon the city. THE JOURNAL has no plea to make for Mr. Hichardson's work. It must stand upon its own merit. We further believe that the city will save money by having the ordinance for a street improvement as important as that proposed for Commercial and its cross streets drawn up by competent legal talent. If that is done the city will be able to defend its work in court.
