FROM WOODBURN.—The Wood-

burn Independent, of today, the 7th,
contains the following news items
worthy of clipping: The mill machi-
nery has all arrived and it is now
being placed in the mill. The
freight on it was just \$1200, yet
some people think it costs nothing
to build a mill. Last week
Mr. Naylor, who lives at the
place of Lennel Walker, lost his
valuable Newfoundland dog. It
got after his cow and she got him
crowded sideways into the brush so
he could not defend himself and
gored him to death. The dog was
fine blooded, weighed over 150
pounds, and was a valuable watch-
dog. A stock company is being
formed to purchase the Boyer race
track, which is situated near Mr.
Benjamin's farm, two miles from
here. Seventy-five shares, at ten
dollars a share, are required and if
they are taken the company will in-
corporate and improve the track.
As it now is, the judges cannot even
rule a horse or rider off the track,
nor enforce, rulings which are essen-
tial to track government.

HUNG IN EFFIGY.—The city of

Newport on Yaquina bay was
thrown in a state of excitement last
Saturday night, on account of the
very foolish act of hanging and
burning the mayor of the city and
Prosecuting Attorney Condon, in
effigy. The cause was that the
mayor and Mr. Condon had given
notice through the press that here-
after all saloons in that city must be
closed on Sunday. The hanging of
a person in effigy is a piece of rank
foolishness and a cowardly act.

A HOP RAISER'S LOSS.—Last

Sunday night the hop house of
Francis Feller, near Butteville,
caught on fire and burned to the
ground, together with 600 boxes of
hops, says the Woodburn Independent.
The cause of the fire was a
coal oil lantern, which was ac-
cidentally knocked over and spread
blazing oil over the dried hops. Mr.
Feller was almost through picking,
so that the entire crop was prac-
tically lost. The house and con-
tents were insured in the Mutual
Protective Association of the grow-
ers in this part of the country.

ton goes to Jacksonville tonight to at-
tend the Southern Oregon Pioneer's
reunion on Thursday. Mr. Patton
was the first judge of Jackson
county in 1852, and master of the

THE CITY LEGISLATION.

They Held a Regular Monthly
Meeting Last Night.

The city council met last evening,
with Mayor P. H. D'Arcy in the
chair. Present, Aldermen Collins,
Hunt, Johnson, Lafore, Moore, and
Olmsted; Councilman, H. Lamo-
reux coming in later.

Before proceeding with the regu-
lar order of business, Mrs. Nancy
Whitten was allowed to make a
claim for a rebate of tax. Referred.

The committee on ways and
means reported that the brick build-
ing owned by S. Jones should be
assessed at \$2500 instead of \$3500.
On motion of Alderman Johnson a
rebate of \$1000 was made in the
assessment.

The committee on accounts and
current expenses reported favorably
on the following bills and they were
allowed:

J. A. Cook, having purchased the
auctioneer's license of Tucker &
Sperry, asked that the same be
transferred to him. Granted.

Geo. D. Goodhue presented a com-
munication agreeing to do the work
which the city had contracted to
Archie Mason for \$15,542.22 at \$12-
508.50, as per his bid, provided the
city would pay him in warrants
payable from the abutting property,
and not from a special fund. Or-
dered placed on file.

The recorder read off the follow-
ing list of payments made on the
street improvement assessments:

Petition of Mrs. Hattie Easton and
Chas. H. Chase for an estimate of
damages due them on South Com-
mercial street, where the fill was
made, was referred to the committee
on streets and public property.

The complaints and affidavits of
Christian Frickley, S. A. Carpenter,
Mrs. Z. Miller, G. C. Will, J. J.
Roberts and H. S. Belle in regard to
assessment of taxes were referred to
the committee on ways and means in
conjunction with the city recorder.

The committee on health and
police were given further time to
report.

The following bids were received
for filling and putting in bulk head
at the south end of the south Com-
mercial street bridge: Mason &
Smith, \$300; J. E. McCoy, \$374. On
motion the bid of Mason & Smith
was accepted.

Residents of and near Mission and
Fifteenth streets petitioned for an
electric light at that intersection.
Referred.

D. L. Green, Juno Newsome, J. D.
Southernland and other property
owners in block 18 asked the council
to lower the Ferry street sewer that
they can properly connect there-
with. Referred.

Mrs. Dr. Carpenter filed an af-
fidavit stating that she was not a re-
sident of Marion county. Ordered
filed.

On motion the city marshal was
authorized to employ the necessary
assistants during the fair week.

On motion a warrant for \$100 was
ordered drawn in favor of Recorder
Goodell for the removal of the Cap-
ital City Railway company's poles
from the center of Chemeketa street.

Alderman Hutton presented his
resignation as a member of the
council, which was on motion ac-
cepted. The resignation read as
follows: "Owing to the fact that my
labor and time at the Salem Iron
works will not justify me in giving
proper care and attention to city af-
fairs, I hereby tender you my re-
signation as alderman from the Fourth
ward. Yours truly, O. D. Hutton."

An ordinance was read for the
first time defining the routes of the
Capital City Railway company.

The ordinance providing for the
grading of the business streets of
the city was read the third time.

This covers 140 pages of type-written
manuscript, and took two hours to
read it. It was passed as amended,

by a unanimous vote.

The ordinance to regulate the
width of sidewalks on Commercial
street between South Mill creek and
Center street and on State street be-
tween Commercial and High and on
Court between Commercial and High,
so that they shall be of cement
fourteen feet wide, was passed.

The ordinance regulating the
number of telephone, telegraph and
electric light and line poles was re-
ferred to the committee on ordinan-
ces.

The committee on streets and pub-
lic property was authorized to go
ahead in the matter of building the
Winter street bridges.

Alderman Collins asked the privi-
lege of putting down crushed rock
in front of his property instead of
gravel.

The council then adjourned after
a lot of bills against the city were
read.

MARION COUNTY COURT.

September Term Begun—The New

Docket—Routine Work.

The county court met in regular
session this morning, with Judge
Wm. Hubbard in the chair, and
Commissioners Watson and Ander-
son on duty.

County Clerk W. H. Ezan has
prepared a regular docket for this
court, similar to that used by the
circuit court, which will be of great
convenience, both to the officers and
public.

In this every case and claim
before the body is numbered. A
column is provided for the journal
page on which final record of the
case is made, thus forming a com-
plete index for future reference.

This docket will prove a valuable
acquisition to the court house, and
Mr. Ezan is entitled to credit for his
ingenuity in getting it up.

The following is the court's work
up to 3 p. m.:

In the matter of a location for a
county road leading from Woodburn
to Sebuck's mill and running to the
center of Butte creek, on petition
of J. S. Seeley, reader of appraisers
read Sept. 7th, ordered established
when damages are paid by the pe-
titioners.

Transfer of a liquor license of W.
R. Anderson to Chris Paulis, al-
lowed.

At 3 p. m., the court was holding
a private consultation on the mat-
ter referring to an estate.

A TAX QUESTION.—A legal ques-
tion has been raised by the Eugene
school district, assessing the stock
in the Myrtle Creek Mining Com-
pany, held in the district, says the
Guard. The holders of the stock
refuse to pay the tax and yesterday
and today the sheriff was levying
on the property of the delinquents
to pay the same. The stockholders
propose to resist and will enjoin the
sheriff from selling the property
levied upon, claiming that the mine
was assessed in Douglas county,
hence the stock is not liable to taxa-
tion. The district holds that while
the mine was duly assessed in that
county, still the capital stock of said
company is also liable to taxation.

The Ruling Prices as Quoted This
Morning, Sept. 7th.

Wheat is now quoted at 63 cents
at the Salem flour mills. The drop
from 64 cents occurred on Tuesday,
the 6th, that price having stood for
several weeks.

HOPS.

Hops are quoted in New York for
the '91 crop at 20@23 cents, while
the buyers are offering to contract
the '92 crop at 18@20 cents. IN SA-
LEM THE CONTRACTING PRICE IS
14@15 CENTS. THIS IS RELI-
ABLE.

[So far from all sections the re-
ports are to the effect that the crops
are falling short of all expectations
from 40 to 60 per cent. Last year
the hop bar was large and this year
was not counted in the estimates
at the beginning of the season. Re-
ports show but little mold is found
throughout the yards in Oregon, and
the crop, generally, will be of a
much better quality than last year.
Picking will be over and baling will
commence within a couple of
weeks.]
