THE OFFICIAL BADGE.

A sample copy of the official badge to be worn by the children in the "public school review" on the 21st day of October next, has been received at the JOURNAL office. This review will precede the afternoon celebration in all cities and towns in the United States on that day. The badge is five and a half inches long and two inches wide, of white satin ribbon bearing the stars and stripes surmounted by the American eagle, and has a representation of the landing of Columbus. The inscription upon it reads: "National Public School Celebration, Columbus Day, Oct. 21st, 1492-1892." This has been adopted by the executive committee of the National Public School Celebration of that date.

DROPPED SIXTEEN FEET.

Mr. Church, of the Santiam Country, Has a Fall.

He Comes to the Capital City on Business Matters and Meets with a Narrow Escape from Death on Tuesday Night.

Mr. Church, who has a farm in the Santiam country several miles above Mehama, came to Salem on Tuesday and stopped at the Kansas house on Court street. About 10 p. m. he retired for the night and was given the fifth room in the second story on the west side. About 12 o'clock, midnight, the proprietor of the hotel heard a noise coming from the walk immediately under the window of Mr. Church's room, and went to see what the trouble was. Here he found Mr. Church lying on his right side in a semi-conscious condition and groaning terribly. He was picked up and carried to a room and Dr. J. A. Richardson immediately called. It seems that Mr. Church had gotten up and sat down in the open window at this time, he not feeling very well, and must have lost his balance, falling backwards to the ground and walked a distance of sixteen feet.

He was considerably bruised about the side and right ankle, and complained of some internal pains on the right side. Today he was able to start on his return home and complained of considerable soreness, but thinks he will be all right in a short time.

It was a most lucky thing for him that he escaped being killed, for if he had fallen on his head, no doubt, his neck would have been broken. He is the father of James Church, who, several winters ago, lost his lower limbs by being frozen while in the mines in the Elkhorn (Santiam) country in company with Mr. Jones, then of Stayton.

FROM THE SANTIAM REGION.

A Journal Man and His Companion Enjoying Themselves.

CAMP SULLIVAN, Sept. 7, '92. A party of men on their way from Mills City to Gates, were leisurely picking their way over the ties of the Oregon Pacific, talking among themselves of things uppermost in their minds, when their attention was attracted to a piece of canvas stretched over a pole near the railway tracks, number 240.

The fat man of the crowd said to the lean one, "I guess that is where them JOURNAL fellows is camped!" and so it was.

In a picturesque little glade, close by the foot of a large mountain, with the roar of the babbling waters of the restless Santiam ever in our ears, we have pitched our tent. The sun never shone on a more beautiful valley, than the one which skirts the noble river at our feet.

We are contented; and why should we not be? The whole world seems beautiful and pleasant to us, and since we know nothing of care, "our minds are at rest with every man" and we are happy.

The robins wake us from our slumbers in the morning, and at evening the music of the rushing waters lulls us to our night's repose. What care we what the world says and does: "As for us and our house," we will serve the goddess of pleasure, and not the god of war and displeasure.

Little difference to us does it make whether the skunks and cats steal our grub, or whether we always find our larger full; in either case we murmur, "they will be done" and go to work and prepare our meals, and feast on them, with relish unknown to those, who have never "camped out."

The wary trout here may not bite so fast as the chubs in the Willamette, yet they get there just the same, and we have a mess of them once in a while, which would do honor to the table of a king.

Of times we try our hand at hunting the tender spring grouse, so abundant in these regions, and sometimes we are so fortunate as to coax one so close to the end of our guns that we can't miss him. If we tried, and then we shoot; we use rifles, so you can imagine what is left of the bird after we have shot it. On one occasion while we were engaged in this pursuit, we wandered far up on the mountain, and coming down by a circuitous route, we behold far down the mountain side beneath us, a beautiful little hamlet from which issued a subdued hum, which bespoke the industry of the village. Longing to see more closely this favored spot, we betook our way down a deep ravine and soon came to the suburbs of the place, and upon enquiry, found that we were in Mills City. Here in the metropolis of the North Santiam valley, you may leave us to ourselves until we are ready to tell you more of our camp life. Until then, "Au revoir."

THE NEW BUSINESS BLOCKS.

They Are Being Rushed to Completion.

The stone work of the new building, which is now in the course of construction for the Salem Iron works, in the rear of the main building, is all finished and as soon as the brick for the superstructure is hauled the masons will rush it to completion. This will be one story, and will be used for the pattern making and the engine room. It is located on the site of the old wooden structure which was burned several weeks ago. The large force of workmen in this establishment is rushed to the utmost as several fine building fronts are in the course of preparation.

The elegant front of the Capital National bank is now up to the second story and, an idea can now be formed of what the handsome front in Oregon will look like when completed.

All the brick work on the upper story of Hon. John W. Minto's building, on Commercial street, is completed and the work of finishing up the inside goes bravely on. This is simply a remodeling of the upper story and it will be used for the Y. M. C. A. hall when ready.

The Adolph and Burke bricks on Commercial street are going up at a lively rate, as also the second story on Dr. L. L. Rowland's store room on Court street.

D. F. Wagner's corrugated iron building on Court street, north of the opera house, is being plastered at present.

The work of changing G. W. Gray's old brick block front into one of iron and glass is going on at a rapid rate by the contractor, F. B. Southwick. The room in this building, formerly occupied by John Hughes' grocery store, will be used by Westcott & Irwin for their wholesale confectionery department and candy manufactory.

The stone foundation for a fifty foot extension to M. T. Rineaman's store is being put in this week, which will give him one of the largest store buildings in the city.

A NEW INDUSTRY FOR SALEM.

When Thos. Kay built this woollen mill here in Salem he said that the time would come when the products of the mill would be manufactured into garments in Salem. That promise is now being fulfilled. At the Woollen Mill Store, No. 299 Commercial street, and can be seen at any time and any one having any doubt are specially invited to call and be convinced.

One year ago last July when Mr. Bishop became manager of the store he at once began the investigation of manufacturing ready made clothing with a view of undertaking such an enterprise in Salem, believing that the money for making up the clothing they sold in Salem should be paid out to the working people of Salem. At the same time well knowing that to undertake it with one or two foremen and the balance of inexperienced help was going to be a big job, but being willing to exercise patience and not despond the day of small beginning, it was undertaken.

Mr. Bishop went to San Francisco and secured a Foreman, a practical Cutter and Tailor, bought linings and trimmings, and sewing machines and buttonhole machines, arranged for rooms over the retail store, 299 Commercial street, and started in the business of manufacturing ready made clothing. Started in about the middle of June with three hands and has increased to ten and fully expects to use 15 or 20 inside of twelve months as it has been a success from the day it started. Also it is due to the credit of this woollen mill the distinction of making their clothing by White Labor only, as every other mill on this coast, that make up any ready made clothing, do it all, except cutting, by Chinese labor and some even have Chinese do the cutting.

In addition to the ready made line a special feature of making suits to order will be carried on. Goods, workmanship, and fits will be guaranteed.
