SPINNERS' STRIKE.

An Attempt to Reduce Wages in England.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—At a recent meeting of the executive council of the master Cotton Spinners' Federation in Manchester, replies were received from firms representing over 18,000 spindles in favor of enforcing a 6 per cent reduction in wages, were considered. The operatives have declined to accept their masters' proposal, and the federation will, it is thought, now attempt to force reduction on the men. A general strike of cotton operatives will probably be the outcome.

Hamburg Officials Hiding the Cholera Spread.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—From Hamburg comes today the grimly significant item of news that it is intended to construct a temporary railway from the town to the churchyard. Tuesday and Wednesday there were 600 funerals. The horse supply has proved inadequate. At a hotel at Velter a commercial traveler's boxes were found to bear the Hamburg railway label. The traveler was requested to leave town immediately. In vain he declared that he came from Berlin and that the label was an old one, and, though several merchants of Velter stated that he was employed by a Berlin firm, he was forced to leave. He walked to the next railway station, as the people would not allow him to wait for the next train. A town in Prussia rose in terror at the rumor that a Hamburg citizen and his family were about to visit it. The burgomaster promptly wrote to the intending visitor:

"I have ordered the policemen and physicians to await you at the station and to convey you to the hospital, where you will be obliged to undergo a quarantine of eight or ten days. Will you inform me whether you are coming or not?"

Indian Festival at San Diego.

SAN DIEGO, Sept. 26.—The Diegan Indians arrived this morning and paraded under police leadership to Rancho Riagro for a festival. Men, women, children, dogs, and papooses many barefooted and bareheaded, and some carrying nets full of luggage, and Pioletine men brought bows and arrows. The oldest woman, aged 128, came up in buggy, five other wives respectively, aged 123, 118, 110, 88 and 85 walked along the streets.

No Cholera in New York.

QUARANTINE, Sept. 26.—Dr. Jenkins and Dr. Sternberg have just returned from Lower Quarantine and have officially announced that the port of New York is free from cholera. The health officer says there are no cholera cases down the bay today, all the sick having recovered.

Fatal Row in a Saloon.

VINCENNES, Ind., Sept. 26.—Yesterday afternoon James Kerns had a fight at the Last Chance saloon with "Bob" and "Gene" Dale, brothers. Kerns slashed both with a knife and split one of Dales boys nose open. Both Dales were dangerously carved. Bill Dale, another brother, then took a hand in the fight and shot Kerns. Two of the injured men will probably die. Bill Dale, the only uninjured man, is in jail.

Burial of General Pope.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 26.—Secretary Foster says there is no reason to believe Minister Scruggs is not as free as air or that there are slightest signs of strained relations between United States and Venezuela. Secretary said the department was in communication with Scruggs since Saturday and had received no news of unpleasantness. The remains of Major Genl. John Pope reached here today and were interred with military honors at Bellefontaine cemetery.

BOLD ROBBERY.

Bank at Roslyn, Washington Robbed in Daylight.

ELLENBURGH, Wash., Sept. 26.—Word was received here from Roslyn that on Saturday the bank of Abrams, Snipes & Company had been robbed. Five masked men rode up to the door at 2 o'clock and when they left they carried with them a sack of money said to be \$10,000. Today was pay-day at the Roslyn mines and \$40,000 arrived from Tacoma this morning. The robbers supposed the money was placed in the bank, though it was taken to the company's office. They executed their plan in a manner which would have done credit to the James boys.

Cashier Abernethy was writing when the first robber entered, and turned to wait on the supposed customer, but found himself facing a revolver. Dr. Lyons, who had entered just after the first highwayman, turned to go out, but instead dashed against a pair of revolvers in the hands of a second robber. The third confederate entered, picked up Cashier Abernethy's revolver and knocked him down with it. He rose, his head streaming with blood, and was told to keep quiet if he wanted to live. The third man then walked to the safe which was open, took out the coin and bills, shoved the money in a canvas bag and threw it over his shoulder. The three then went out, joining two more men who had been stationed so as to guard all the approaches.

S. A. Frazier, the assistant cashier, who was outside, grabbed a shotgun and made for the bank, when one of the robbers stopped his progress by placing a bullet in his hip. A colored man named Conoley was shot in the leg and several others had narrow escapes. One of the robbers held the reins of five splendid horses, and as soon as the vault was looted, all mounted. Then, after firing up and down the street, they put spurs to their horses and dashed away, disappearing on the trail over the mountains north of Roslyn.

The sheriff was notified and a large posse started in pursuit. It is believed the robbers cannot escape, as the peculiar topography of the country will aid the officers. The manager of Abrams, Snipes & Co. arrived at Roslyn this evening and immediately offered a reward of \$1000 for the apprehension of the robbers. This is supplemented by an offer of the same amount made by Cashier Abernethy. The robbers were dressed as cowboys and showed themselves to be expert horsemen and gunners. President Snipes, of the bank, was here today and left for Roslyn on the night train, accompanied by Detective M. C. Sullivan.
