CLEVELAND AGAIN.

Amends His Letter of acceptance Lately Written.

New York, Sept. 28.—[Special, Standard Bay]—Capt. F. D. Allen, of Frankfort, Ind., called on Grover Cleveland yesterday. Mr. Allen had a long talk with the ex-president who expressed satisfaction with his letter of acceptance, having one small point. He did not like the word "actually" in a paragraph relating to pensioning soldiers. He went further, and requested Cleveland to explain more fully his position toward soldiers. Cleveland told him he believed in pensioning every soldier who received so much as a scratch in the war and went the other ground in detail.

Death of Ex-Judge Barnett, of Indiana.

New York, Sept. 28.—Ex-Judge Theodore Barnett of Indiana, died suddenly this morning at the Sinclair House, of apoplexy. He was 64 years old, and well known all over the country. In 1848, he was sent by the United States on an important mission to Mexico. Some time after he elected Judge of Indianapolis. He was an intimate friend of President Johnson.

Grand Democratic Barbecue.

RICHMOND, IND., Sept. 28.—According to custom, every presidential year, the Democrats of central and eastern Indiana held a big barbecue here today. All the trains brought large delegations. Tables were spread for 10,000 people at the fair grounds, and covered two acres. Twelve beefs, ten calves, fifteen sheep, and four thousand loaves of bread were provided. General Adlai Stevenson arrived at 11:30, and was received at depot by marching clubs. The reception was probably the most enthusiastic he ever received in Indiana. Speaking occurs this afternoon.

Cholera Patients at Fire Island Rapidly Improving.

New York, Sept. 28.—The news from both quarantined and convalescent camp at Fire Island this morning is encouraging. At former no new cases have developed. Patients are doing better. All well at Fire Island. The ill fated Norman, which has been quarantined since the 3rd instant, left for South Ampton this morning.

The Sons of Temperance.

New York, Sept. 28.—The 48th annual session of the national division of the Sons of Temperance opened today. Reports from the committees were read. These showed decrease of 143 subordinate divisions during the year. Since April 1st, 1891, the membership has decreased from 72,864 to 67,003.

Anniversary Celebration.

SAN DIEGO, CAL., Sept. 28.—The three hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the landing of Cabrillo on the coast, was observed here today in the presence of ten thousand visitors, including Governor Markham and Governor Torres. At 11 o'clock a vessel made into a good imitation of the Caravela with which Cabrillo landed 350 years ago, approached the shore. Joe Williams, a Portuguese fisherman representing Cabrillo, disembarked. A large crowd of Indians received him. The standard of the cross was planted and the land proclaimed to be in possession of Emperor Chas. I.

Hamburg in Ripe Condition.

LONDON, Sept. 28.—The Times correspondent at Hamburg says: "The cisterns are choked with solid matter; in fact, the chain of pollution grows with every link; the water in the river is cleaner than that in the water works, cleaner water in the water works than in the mains, and that in the mains is cleaner than in the houses, and only one thing was wanted—it was to provide the entrance of the cholera poison into the water system. This was arranged. The in-take is so situated that at flood tide matter from sewage outfalls can reach it. In Hamburg the house's sewage runs out at the basement and in again at the roof, after a little tour of the river and water works. This animal state of things has been noticed 15 or 20 years."

Indicted for Bribery.

CHICAGO, ILL., Sept. 28.—The grand jury this afternoon indicted M. C. McDonald a politician and ex-gambler for bribery in giving Justice Woodman \$300 to influence his decision in cases where a number of sports were arrested at Garfield Park race track.

An Explosion.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Sept. 28.—The Lima car works and over 200 cars were burned this morning. Loss \$100,000. The nitro glycerine magazine, four miles from Lima, exploded this afternoon, doing some damage to the town. No lives were lost.

British Men of War Sent to Release Canadian Sealers.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 28.—Notwithstanding the denial from London, a British man of war has been sent to Siberia to secure the release of the Canadian sealers, supposed to be held by the Russians. Hon. C. H. Tupper, Canadian Minister of Marine, says the man of war is now on the way there.

Amnesty Granted by the President and Fines Remitted.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 28.—The President granted an amnesty in the cases of Peter Swensen and James Mortensen, convicted in Utah of bigamy, and remitted the fine and costs in case Clarence Sanborn, convicted in California of violating the postal laws.

Scalper Law Unconstitutional.

CHICAGO, ILL., Sept. 28.—Judge Luthill, dismissed the cases against 13 ticket scalpers on the ground that the law against ticket brokerage is unconstitutional, because it attempted to regulate interstate traffic caused unjust discriminations and interfered with the liberty to make an honest living.

Accident to Capt. Wheeler at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 28.—Capt. Wheeler, of the fourth cavalry while on mounted drill this morning met with a severe accident. His horse became unmanageable and broke into a picket fence. The officer sustaining a compound fracture of the leg near the thigh.

Democratic Opposition.

New York, Sept. 28.—Chairman Wm. Harrity, of the Democratic National committee, returned from Harrisburg this morning. The local committee of anti-snap delegates will call upon him this afternoon to confer about running a local ticket in opposition to Tammany. Harrity has already expressed himself as opposed to any division in the ranks of the local Democracy.

Excitement at St. Joseph.

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., Sept. 28.—There is much excitement here over the case of a man named Wed, five miles in the country, said to be suffering every symptom of cholera.

Suspected Cases in Texas.

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 28.—The state health officer reports to Governor Hogg of having attended two suspected cases of cholera. One died Sunday.

Senator Hill Will Practice Law.

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 28.—Within a few months, probably when the present campaign closes, the shingle of "David B. Hill," attorney and counselor-at-law, will be hung out in Albany. Senator Hill's practice will be confined to cases in the courts of appeal and the general term.

Illness of a Famous Pianist.

PARIS, Sept. 28.—Paderewski the famous pianist, is critically ill in the city with rheumatic fever.

Engaged to be Married.

LONDON, Sept. 28.—The engagement is announced of Lieutenant Jenson, member of the last Stanley expedition, to a daughter of Addison Head, of San Francisco.

Killed by Lightning.

OTTAWA, KANSAS, Sept. 28.—Lightning struck the house of Samuel Adkinson last night, killing Adkinson, his wife and two children. The house was burned.

Onrise of a Sealing Schooner.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Sept. 28.—The sealing schooner George R. White, of LaConner, arrived from Copper Island yesterday with 243 sealskins. The White sailed from Puget Sound last January, and cruised along the coast between Tillamook and Sand Point until July, when she went to the Russian coast. August 29th she spoke the schooner Walter Earl, of Victoria, and May Bell, of Victoria, which reported that the Russians had seized four British and two American sealers.

Cholera Scare in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—William Forney, collector for the Standard Oil Company in New York, and a nephew of John W. Forney, secretary of war under Grant, was taken sick in the health office in the city hall yesterday, and fears were entertained that he was suffering from cholera. He left New York city Friday on the Pennsylvania limited express and is on his way to San Francisco on business for the company. He was taken sick on the train, and the conductor, fearing he was affected with cholera, put him off the train. The next train, however, picked him up and brought him to this city. A reporter rang up Dr. O. N. Huff, and the latter hurried down and examined the patient. He said the man did not have the cholera.

Wholesale Murder of Infants.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—The Examiner prints the statement of a woman named Montrose, who charges that within a period of 10 months, ending last May, 40 newborn infants were disposed of in such a manner by Dr. H. C. Beale, to whom she rented rooms for a lying-in hospital, as to convince her they were murdered by him. He was held for trial in \$10,000 cash bail, which he forfeited and escaped. The bodies of the infants, Mrs. Montrose states, were either thrown into the bay or cremated by Beale at other quarters occupied by him.

The Transcontinental Will Die.

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—The Atchison road having withdrawn, the transcontinental association has lost all its usefulness and will in any event die a natural death on January 1 from the defection of the Canadian Pacific, Northern Pacific and Great Northern. The withdrawal of all other transcontinental lines is anticipated before October 1, as that will be the limit when the 90 days' notice required will be effective on January 1.

The Behring Sea Matter Difficulty.

OTTAWA, Sept. 28.—A dispatch from Lord Ripon, colonial secretary, London, respecting the Behring sea matter says: "With regard to a renewal of the modus vivendi it will be seen from the convention under which it was arranged that in the event of arbitrators deciding against the claims of the United States in regard to seal fisheries, the government of the United States has undertaken to compensate British sealers for abstaining from exercising their rights pending arbitration."

Fifty Buildings Destroyed.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 28.—The town of Howard, the county seat of Miner county, on the Southern Minnesota railroad, was nearly wiped out by fire yesterday afternoon. It caught in a livery stable, and spread so rapidly before the high wind that the people barely escaped from the building. Mr. and Mrs. Aikworth were caught in the building and killed. More than 50 buildings were destroyed. Loss, \$100,000.

Russell Renominated.

BOSTON, Sept. 28.—In the Democratic convention yesterday Governor Russell was unanimously renominated. James B. Carroll was nominated as lieutenant governor.

Rescued From the Wreck.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Sept. 28.—Captain O'Brien and his wife, Wm. Holmes, were rescued from the wrecked Whalback Wetmore after being on her ten days. They were taken off yesterday by Captain Bergman, of the Umpqua life-saving crew. It was a hard matter for the life-savers to reach the ship, but they worked hard and managed to get a line on board, which the men tied around them and jumped over-

board. The men were very much worn out from exposure, and when they saw the life-boat upset on Friday, gave up all hope of ever getting ashore. The men had a hard time of it, and for the last five days, had only one meal a day, and yesterday morning they divided the last biscuit they had for yesterday's meal. They suffered terribly with cold, and had to stand in water to their knees. The wharf was crowded with people when the men came ashore at Empire, and the greatest interest in caring for their wants was taken by the people of that place. The weather side of the main cabin of the Wetmore is stove in, and from what has been experienced it is not probable that any one else will go on the wreck to keep parties from boarding her and claiming salvage.
