The Marion county superintendent does not mean that this county shall be one whit behind and if a ringing appeal to teachers and school officials will fetch it. In conclusion he makes this strong point: "Marion county must not be behind in the matter, and while we must have the co-operation of patrons and pupils, our success will depend entirely upon the zeal of the teachers. I am preparing for an exhibit of county school work at this office. It is expected that each teacher will send something for this exhibit. This may consist of maps, charts, compositions, analysis in grammar and arithmetic, history work, samples of penmanship, examination papers, drawings, and anything and everything done by the pupils."

A DEPARTED PIONEER.

Sketch of a Citizen Who Was Well Known in Salem and Vicinity.

Thomas H. McIntire was born in Quebec, Canada, October 23, 1824. He moved to Niagara county, N. Y., with his mother when he was a small boy, his father having died in Canada. He lived there until he was a grown man. He was married to Margaret Buchanan, May 29, 1846, in Niagara county, N. Y. The family left New York in 1848, living in several different states, and came from Nebraska the 22d of May, 1892, coming with a wagon across the plains. They reached Oregon the 8th of October and settled in Polk county, where he lived until 1875, when he bought a farm 6 1/2 miles south of Salem on the Jefferson road. His health failing him, he sold his farm and moved to Salem last October, where he resided until the time of his death, September 23, 1892. He was an earnest christian, having been a member of the church for the past 25 years. He will be greatly missed by all his friends both in the country and town where he lived.

CORRECTION MARKETS.

Wheat Raises Four Cents—Hops and Other Produce.

At the Salem flouring mills today the card of 64 cents for wheat attracted the attention of many, as it represented a raise of 4 cents. The foreign market looks favorable and a higher price is not at all improbable. Hops have been quoted at 20 cents by some unreliable authorities. The truth is only 17 cents is offered for the best quality, ranging from that figure down to 14 cents. There are few buyers.
