THE CITY SUE.—Papers were today filed by J. A. Carson, attorney for Hattie Easton and Chas. H. Chase, in the office of the clerk of the circuit court, bringing suit against the city of Salem for damages. The plaintiffs claim that the city damaged their property, which is just south of the Commercial viaduct, \$9000, by filling that street. The more specific charges are that the street has been filled five feet above their houses, that the water course has been obstructed, that fruit and shade trees have been destroyed and that large quantities of earth and rock have been thrown upon their property. The case will be tried at the October term.

\$20 STOLEN.—This forenoon a \$20 piece was stolen from the safe of Conn & Henderson. A young man, Wm. Rogers, who recently served a year's sentence in the "pen" for standing a man up in a Salem alley, was in the store just before it was taken, and was arrested a while after; but was discharged, as the money was not found on him and he was not seen to take it, though there seemed little doubt on the subject.

Y. P. S. C. E. CONVENTION.—We are in receipt of a neat programme announcing the first annual convention of the Marion county Y. P. S. C. E., which will be held at Salem, Oct. 1st and 2d. No pains have been spared, on the part of those interested in the meeting, to make it a grand success, and it promises to be such. Every young Christian worker in Marion county should be in attendance.

INTEREST GROWING.—The Revs. Fisher, who have been holding protracted meetings at the Evangelical tabernacle in east Salem, had intended to close last week, but the Saturday evening meeting proved such an unusual success that they have concluded to continue the good work a while longer.

PROBATE.—In the estate of O. C. Gunnison, F. J. Rice, administrator, today filed his bond of \$1200 with the clerk of the courts. J. B. Mooney, executor of the estate of Thos. Hunt, asked for final settlement, and the date was set on November 7th.

MUST BE PAID.

Warrants are Ordered to Force Collection of Street Assessments.

All those members of the council who signed the call for a special meeting of that body last night, were present but Alderman Johnson. After waiting until nearly 9 o'clock the mayor sent for Alderman Collins, and when he arrived a few minutes later, there was a quorum, or five in number—being Collins, Moores, Lafore, Olmstead and Klein. The object of the meeting was then stated by Mayor D'Arcy and after some remarks concerning the sense of the meeting, Alderman Moores made a motion that the city recorder be instructed to draw up a warrant ordering the city marshal to proceed to collect each individual assessment for the work that has been done on Chemeketa and south Commercial streets.

On the first named there are sixty-two assessments and six only have been paid and received for, while on Commercial street there are assessments on sixteen property holders, with five that have been handed over their amounts due for the improvement. It only required a short time for the council to remain in session, and after an adjournment those present indulged in a spirited conversation, concerning the work of the past and future, until after the hour of 10 o'clock.

The principal object of the call last night was to get the matter before the people in such shape that if it is to be carried to the courts it can be done without delay, as the October term convenes on the 10th prox.

Whether or not those who have refused to pay for the work done will assist in testing the question in a legal way, remain yet to be seen. Every day finds some one in Salem who says the past summer's work done on the streets is a grand improvement, and all this growing about the softness of the Chemeketa thoroughfare will soon be unheard of.

NEW Y. M. C. A. QUARTERS.

Delegates to Tacoma—What is Proposed for a New Hall.

The delegates to the Northwest Young Men's Christian Association convention at Tacoma have all returned, Secretary J. R. Wetherbee, returning last night. The other delegates were Hal D. Patton, J. J. Mutton, G. N. Sroat, F. E. Brown, P. H. Hatch and Mr. Porter, of Willamette university. All report a good time and a large well-attended convention.

THE SALEM BRANCH has grown so that the trustees have been looking out for larger quarters. A new lease must be made Oct. 1st, and may result in their leaving the present commodious well-fitted rooms in the Patton block. The new quarters proposed are in the Minto-Chapman block. The second floor of this building affords a floor space of 110x40 feet, and if the present plans of interior arrangement are carried out, it would give the branch here the largest and finest hall on the coast.

The gymnasium and lecture room will be 40x50 feet, with the galleries would seat 400 people. Besides there is planned a reception room, parlors, library and reading room 25x35 feet, four porcelain baths, a shower bath 8x10, and three sponge baths. The rooms are all to connect with double doors so that on occasions of large public assemblies the entire floor can be opened practically into one room. The plans of this interior, as drawn by Architect Burghart, are very complete and classy. A large old-fashioned fireplace near the entrance will give all who enter here a warm reception.
