THAT ATTEMPTED TRAIN WRECK.

The Portland Telegram of last evening contains the following concerning the attempted train wreck mentioned in last night's JOURNAL: "Charles Wilson, conductor of the Southern Pacific train No. 15, north-bound, reported this morning a narrow escape from wrecking at midnight Wednesday. As he was sitting in the office of Fields Brothers this morning, he stated that a half mile from Cottage Grove his train came in contact with a 30-foot rail laid squarely across the track for criminal wrecking purposes. The pilot caught it, and as the engineer caught a glimpse of the obstruction he permitted his train to move along slowly until it reached the trestle work, when the train stopped long enough to remove the obstacle that imperiled many precious lives. A south-bound train had just passed 40 minutes before, but from the fact that it passed in safety, the derailing obstacle must have been placed in position an hour later. An investigation resulted in finding tracks of human feet, recently trodden in the soft soil, and the dastardly criminals had long since disappeared. This is the second attempt to wreck a train in that locality within a week.

CHRYSANTHEMUM FAIR.—November is the month when the Chrysanthemum is in its greatest floral glory at Salem, and a fair is to be held at the height of the season under the auspices of the Kinder Symphony club of Salem. Such falls in honor of one of the most wonderful flowers are held in nearly all the larger cities and can be made a success here.
