FINE POULTRY AUCTION.

Saturday next (Oct. 8th), at 2 p. m. the sale of thoroughbred poultry will take place at the Red Front Bazaar Auction house just west of Lunn's corner. These fowls were grown by E. Hofer, North Salem, and are mostly of this spring's hatch and pullets all laying. They are nearly all full grown for this season and as fine a lot was never offered. No private sales have been allowed for a month so that the flock has not been picked. There will be a neat coop for each trio. The varieties included in this sale are Black Langshans, Plymouth Rocks (a flock that cannot be beat), Partridge Cochins, White Leghorns and Light Brahmas. See ad.

IN OPERATION.—The Salem soap and chemical works are now fully ready for business. The machinery is about all ready for work, and soap is being made every day. A car-load order is being made up for a Portland house, and the local trade is already demanding it. The capacity of the works is thirty tons per week, and the proprietor expects to find sale for that amount almost as soon as his goods become known.

SALEM B. & L. ASSOCIATION.—At the regular monthly meeting of the Salem Building and Loan association Monday evening, \$2358 was loaned at seventy-five months' interest in advance. This was the last directors' meeting for the third year of the association since organized. The annual meeting of stockholders will be held early in November.

CHEAP FARES.—The Salem Motor street railway has put on for sale at office and by conductors tickets in books at \$3.00 per hundred. This offers very cheap riding over the new fast line. A solid steel gravel ballast track is going down on Commercial street, when the company will operate five cars and make 10 minute trips.

A FREAK.—Persons interested in freaks of nature can now see one that is not only a curiosity but truly beautiful. It is an apple tree on Mrs. Caulfield's premises on Chemeketa and 13th streets, in full bloom. This is an unusual occurrence, but even if the tree should develop a good crop of apples it would not be surprising for Oregon.

HEAVY WORK.—The great 375 horse engine for the Salem electric power company has arrived from Sioux city, Iowa, and is now being put into place by Howard the house-mover. The machine weighs ten tons, but will be handled as easily as a butterfly.

THE COUNCIL MEETS.

Public Improvements The Question of the Hour—Other Business.

The city council held a regular session last evening. All members were present except Johnson. The mayor placed Alderman Klein on all the committee positions held by ex-Alderman Hutton. The electric light at Marion and Water streets was ordered removed to the corner of Mission and 15th street.

Alderman Hunt asked that Recorder Goodell take charge of the suit begun against the city by Hattie Easton and Chas. Chase, and that a demurrer should be filed before the case went by default. Carried.

HEALTH AND POLICE.

Alderman Lamoureux, chairman of the committee on health and police, made a report on the condition of the block west of the court house. "It is a disgrace the city. If a man wanted to go through there he would have to walk on stilts. The south half of the block reeking with filth and refuse of all kinds. Why, we found in one place where a Chinaman kept fifty or sixty ducks under his house. Cesspools, disease-breeding filth and dirt abounds, and we recommend that the matter be referred to the marshal to order it cleaned up. A sewer should be put in through the block."

PETITIONS.

A. O. Condit petitioned for the right to grade Oak street abutting his property. Referred.

Ladd & Bush petitioned for the curb about the Willamette hotel block be placed out sixteen feet from the building, so as to take the shade trees inside same. Referred.

The Salem Light and Power company petitioned to have all electric poles placed on the outside of gutters, also to amend the pole ordinance now before the council. A special meeting was ordered for this evening to consider the matter.

D. Seaward, who had a horse injured by a bad cross-walk, asked for damages. Referred.

STREETS AND RAILROADS.

The Capital City Railway company ordinance asking for a change of name, and for a right to build on

Liberty street from State to the northern boundary of the city; on 18th street from Chemeketa to Centre, and thence east on Centre to the city limits, was defeated by a vote of four to three.

The question as to whether the street contractors, Mason and Smith should be allowed to make deep fills with dirt taken from high places, or whether it should be filled with 80 per cent. gravel, was referred to the attorney of the city, for consideration tonight.

OFF FOR SILETZ.—R. P. Boise, one of the commissioners to secure the opening of the Siletz Indian Agency, was ordered to report there on the 18th, and has started on this mission. Before he returns steps will have been taken to throw open about 150,000 acres to settlers. The commission will negotiate with the Indians and report the terms upon which the lands will be ceded by them to the government. Then congress will have to pass a bill and only after that can the president by proclamation throw the lands open to settlement. Gen. Odell has been over the reservation, making surveys for some months. We give this information for the benefit of intending settlers. It will be some time before any of the lands can be entered upon by home-seekers.

The wheelmen of Salem had better provide themselves with 16 foot planks to carry along.

Branches are run at nearly all towns up and down the line and Colonel Olmsted is preparing to wash all the linen in the valley, as he is pretty nearly doing now.
