MORE ELECTRIC RAILWAY.

The Capital City's Extension to the Asylum.

FRANCHISE BY THE COUNTY COURT.

Work of Construction to Begin at an Early Day.

Saturday afternoon the County Court granted the Capital City Railway Co. a franchise over Asylum avenue, the cars to be running in ninety days. The proposed extension will leave the Rosedale line near the junction on Cheneketa street. The track is to be placed on the south side of the street. It will be built in all respects as good as the other suburban extensions, and everything will be built first-class. The work will be under the supervision of the county surveyor and the company is to provide proper culverts and water ways. The line will be built as nearly as practicable upon the present grade of the road. It will be firmly ballasted and the rails used will be heavy ones. The managers say that the material has been placed and it will be shipped immediately upon telegraphic advice. The franchise says that the road shall be completed and in operation within ninety days, but the company expects to go to work right away and have cars running at an earlier date. The new line will cost about \$10,000.

Some of the managers of the Capital City say they hope to continue their line to Silverton at an early day, making it a motor line to the heart of the county. That is what Salem wants—motor lines to connect the whole county—and this city will do its share toward such extensions.

Col. A. I. Wagner and other property owners want the Asylum extension to run up Cheneketa street to 20th street, and then cross over to Asylum avenue. A motor car with double dynamo was put on this morning to haul material over the line and help build the new line. It will haul a small train of cars with perfect ease.

Supt. Barnes will go out on the proposed new extension to the Asylum, in company with County Surveyor Herrick as soon as possible to locate the route. It will probably leave the present line at its crossing of Cheneketa street.

HOP PRICES.—At Seattle the market is not active but hops are quotable at 18@20 cents per pound, with holders somewhat firm at the higher figure.

An Eastern authority shows that exports have been just about one-tenth of the yield so far this season, whereas for the same time last year shipments amounted to one-third of the crop. Sales have been made at 20 cents per pound in New York, but the market is quite dull, with holders averse to releasing, except at full rates. There have been small sales of choice Sonomas at Santa Rosa recently at 19 cents per pound, but as a rule growers insist upon 20 cents.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Eric Anderson, who lives on Court street, aged 45 died suddenly this morning. He is reported to have been sitting on the edge of his bed and dropped dead very suddenly. Mr. Anderson is a retired farmer who came to Salem to live about a year ago.

Inquiries thought perhaps he was ill, and he was indeed very much prostrated at slanderous reports that have again been circulated, reflecting upon his moral character. Mr. Corwin and his leading church members are very reticent, and a meeting of the trustees has been called at the church for Wednesday evening. It is stated by some of the leading members that if the parties circulating the reports are responsible Mr. Corwin will certainly bring suit.

Suicide in Portland.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 10.—Alfred Vosper, an old citizen of this city and a wealthy real estate dealer, committed suicide at his residence at Piedmont, on the East Side, yesterday morning, by hanging himself. He was very well known, and his death created quite a stir among a large circle of friends and acquaintances. His mind was unbalanced and about two weeks since his ailment took a violent turn. Although being worth about \$50,000, he imagined that he was a poor man, and worried over the imaginary danger of himself and family starving to death.

MARION COUNTY COURT.

The Capital City Electric Railway Gets a Franchise to the Asylum—Other Business.

A franchise was granted Saturday to the Capital City Railway for an extension of their lines on Asylum avenue to the state asylum.

In the afternoon the following business was dispatched:

The county clerk was directed to draw warrants on the county treasurer to pay the claims of jurors for Circuit court, warrants are to be drawn when each juror has finished his attendance.

The sum of \$1000 was ordered paid Ladd & Bush to cancel a loan.

The petition for a bridge across Butte creek was allowed, the bridge to be built jointly by the two counties, each paying one half and building the approach on its own side.

The bridge will be a fifty-foot structure with fifty-foot approach on the Marion county side and forty-foot on the Clackamas side. Bids will be asked for the building of the bridge.

The matter of bridge across slough, near Mt. Angel, was continued until next spring.

The matter of a present ownership book was deferred until after the meeting of the legislature. Several propositions are before the court for making such lists.

THE POULTRY AUCTION.

Saturday's Sale of Thoroughbreds Successful—Good Prices Realized.

There was an immense crowd in attendance at the first auction sale of thoroughbred chickens in this city Saturday at 2 p. m. The fifty fowls in coops of one and three were placed on exhibition at 10 a. m. and until the hour of the sale there was a regular poultry show and drew a constant crowd of visitors at the Red Front Bazaar where Col. Goode, the city auctioneer, holds forth. The sale was begun at the minute and began with a trio of White Leghorn spring chickens that went at \$5.50. Coop after coop went like hot cakes at good prices.

They were nearly all spring chickens and nearly full grown. Three coops of Black Langshans went at fancy prices. The buyers were mostly breeders from the farms and towns of the county with a good sprinkling of Salem fanciers. The coops were borne off promptly by purchasers and every one felt that they were getting their money's worth. The sale was a great success and as the first poultry auction ever held in Salem the result is very encouraging to breeders. The editor of THE JOURNAL who raised every bird sold has no reason to be dissatisfied with the result of his chicken farming. There will be more such sales in future and Salem bids fair to become quite noted as a breeding center.
