DR. GWYNNE HONORED.

Chosen Missionary of This Presbyterian Synod.

The Committee on Overtures at the Albany session of the Presbyterian Synod on Saturday presented a report in favor of electing a synodical missionary in which they say: "That in their judgment this Synod urgently needs not a superintendent, an Amateur Bishop, to lord it over God's heritage and override the judgment of presbyteries, but a pastor at large, an earnest, humble, sweet spirited man of God, who shall assist in the care and supply of vacant churches under the direction of Home Mission committees and Presbyteries, a man who shall represent us fairly to the board and in whose judgment we can have confidence, and particularly and chiefly a man of evangelistic powers and success, etc."

The election was by roll call and resulted in 63 votes cast, of which Dr. Gwynne, of Salem, received the largest number, 27. He was made the unanimous choice of the synod. He was introduced to the Moderator by Dr. Brown and accepted the position and duties of this onerous office in a few earnest words.

THE EVANGELICAL CHURCH.

The Salem Property Transferred to the Bowmanite Pastors.

On Saturday last Messrs J. B. Fisher and Daniel Stewert, representing the Evangelical association, took possession of the Evangelical church property in this city, which has been held by Messrs. Bollinger and Bowersox and their adherents. This is done in consideration of the decision recently rendered by Judge L. B. Stearns of Portland, and the withdrawal of the pending suit before the circuit court of Marion county.

Under the agreement made these gentlemen hold full possession and collect all rents, but allow Mr. Bowersox and his followers to use the church the second and fourth Sundays of each month, until such a time as a supreme court decision is rendered in some state of the Union in favor of the present possessors. This settles a long standing disagreement, and it is to be hoped will be the dawning of a new era of prosperity for this important church.
