THE CHARGES SUSTAINED.

Rev. Corwin Branded by the Committee.

HIS RESIGNATION REQUESTED

And a Letter of Dismissal from the Church—Corwin not Cleared.

At a meeting of the members of the First Congregational church, Wednesday evening, at which nearly 150 members were present, the report of the committee to investigate charges against the moral character of Rev. C. L. Corwin was submitted, and acted upon.

The committee had prepared a report on the charges of immoral conduct. The rumors of these have polluted the moral atmosphere of the community for nearly a year, and in this report the whole matter has come to a head. The committee was composed of J. W. Davies, chairman, M. A. Bently, J. J. Mutton, Thos. Holverson, T. McF. Patton, A. W. Dennis, C. M. Parmenter, J. S. Steiner, Mrs. J. C. Strickler, Mrs. M. S. Vanderal, Mrs. W. W. Martin, Mrs. G. H. Burnett, H. M. Branson, J. C. Booth, Mrs. J. L. Chapman. This was the organized committee, but T. McF. Patton, Mrs. Martin, Mrs. Burnett and Mrs. Chapman next day refused to serve and the chairman filled the vacancy by appointing Dr. J. M. Keene, Mrs. R. P. Boise, Sr., and Mrs. Weller.

The committee has held a number of meetings and has submitted to it affidavits of reputable married women who allege improper liberties and approaches made by Mr. Corwin at divers times and places. The members of the committee also had witness before them and satisfied themselves by personal inquiries. Following is a verbatim

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

To the First Congregational church of Salem, Oregon: We your committee appointed to investigate certain charges that have been made against our pastor Rev. C. L. Corwin met in the church parlors Friday evening Oct. 14, 1902 and continued its session until all the testimony that it was possible to obtain was duly considered and we find that the charges are sufficiently sustained to justify the committee in recommending that the church request Dr. C. L. Corwin to tender his resignation and that the church grant him a letter of dismissal from the church.

Second, That we recommend that the church take no further proceedings in the matter. John W. Davies, C. M. Parmenter, M. A. Bently, H. M. Branson, Isaac S. Steiner, T. Holverson, J. C. Booth, James J. Mutton, J. M. Keene, A. W. Dennis, Mrs. E. F. Veller, Mrs. E. Boise, Mrs. M. S. Vanderal, Mrs. H. A. Strickler.

THE PROCEEDINGS.
C. M. Talbot was chairman of the meeting and W. J. Staley clerk. After prayer the report was read. Mr. Parmenter moved that the report be received, which was done by a vote of 71 to 18. J. C. Booth moved and T. McF. Patton seconded that the report be adopted. Rev. Corwin then read his defense, denying all charges as false, insinuating that he had not been treated courteously in this matter. He charged accusers with being reckless—very reckless indeed, and produced a sworn denial of all statements made affecting his character. He spoke at unusual length in his own behalf, protesting his innocence, but contradicting himself several times and denying entirely new matters that had not been before the committee and of which no one knew a word, but the speaker. His defense made no impression except to further confirm the correctness of the committee's findings. Joseph Cooke called

the reading of the affidavits which were produced before the committee. Suffice it to say they were of such a character that only women with an outraged sense of propriety would make, and make at a great sacrifice to their own feelings, and only out of a sense of the highest duty toward the church and the cause of a holy religion.

A stormy discussion followed the reading of the affidavits in which such men as C. M. Parmenter, J. C. Booth, T. McF. Patton, Jos. Cooke, Napoleon Davis, Dr. Keene, Percy Willis, Frank Gilbert, J. J. Mutton, and others expressed themselves very freely.

An amendment was offered to so change the report of the committee that it would ask for a resignation, but gave no letter. Lost by a vote of 65 for, 66 against.

A secret ballot was then taken, on the report of the committee, which was adopted by a vote of 68 for and 51 against.

Mrs. Talbot said she could refute all the charges that had been made.

A PROTEST.
was put in here by Mr. Parmenter, a leading member of the church. He protested against giving any letter of recommendation, but before he could get a second the meeting had adjourned, the motion to adjourn being put through with a rush. Chairman Talbot, with whom Corwin has made his home, leaving his chair, and the meeting broke up almost like a mob.

A FALSE IMPRESSION.
has been sent abroad by a reckless and designing report published this morning. It conveys the idea that the church has contradicted and stultified itself in order to shield and whitewash Rev. Corwin, which is not the case. THE JOURNAL has taken pains to give the news and dispassionately to get at the facts of last night's meeting. The action of the church in adopting the report of the committee does not exonerate Corwin, but condemns him. Chairman Talbot's ruling, that, as the report of the committee gave Corwin a letter of dismissal it was bound to give him a letter of full fellowship, was not sustained. The ruling was protested against, the other trustees decline to sustain this ruling and the clerk of the meeting will not write a letter with that understanding. In refusing to amend the report of the committee the church repudiated Mr. Talbot's ruling. His ruling reveals that from the start the organization was under the cunning hand of Corwin, as Talbot is the man he has made his home for a long time.

THE FACTS ARE.
that practically all the contributors and levelheaded adult members, who have had years of experience in church work, are opposed to retaining Corwin and dead set against his being given a letter of any kind. One very prominent man, who has been a pillar of the church, has been looking up his history and says:—"His history for the past twenty-five years will not bear investigation, and there is hardly a congregational minister in the association who will have anything to do with him."

NO RECOMMENDATION.
The false report that the committee or the church had given Dr. Corwin a letter of recommendation, as published here and telegraphed to the Oregonian, is denied by nearly every member of the committee. Corwin's best friends on the committee say they never intended that he should have a letter or a recommendation and so stated openly at the meeting. Any such report rests, says another member, upon a technicality that is not worth considering. His resignation is asked for and he is dismissed from further services as pastor of this church. He is given no letter from the church, nor any letter of recommendation. The report as it read was adopted by a large vote without amendment.

IN CIRCUIT COURT.

Record of Proceedings Had in Judge Burnett's Justice Mill.

In case of the State vs. Capt. Dove occupied the attention of court and jury all of yesterday, (Wednesday) afternoon. He was the owner of the boat that he and two others are charged with setting on fire. The case is contested for all there is in it and will take some time to hear and argue it.

The grand jury reported a not true bill against T. P. Welch, constable, in the gambling case.

THE DOCKET.

State vs. C. W. Christie, carrying concealed weapons; pleaded guilty and fined \$15.

State vs. W. H. Rider, keeping a vicious animal; arraigned, will plead today.

State vs. Fred Van Wagner, larceny in a dwelling; arraigned, will plead today.

The Southern Pacific rate case (on a motion to tax the costs) was continued until the February term.

TODAY'S DOCKET.

State vs. W. H. Rider, pleaded not guilty.

State vs. Fred Van Wagner, pleaded not guilty. L. F. Conn appeared as attorney.

State vs. Hugh Starr for trespass and drawing weapon on Mrs. Krus, imprisonment for three months in county jail.

STATE VS. DOVE.

The trial of Capt. Dove occupied all the forenoon. Plaintiff has rested in introduction of testimony and defence begins this afternoon with its witnesses. The case can hardly be completed within another day.

WILL NOT ADJOURN.

The circuit court will not adjourn Friday, for Columbus day. At least that was the opinion of Judge Burnett this afternoon. The governor's proclamation, requiring observance of the day, does not declare the day a legal holiday. The point that a day must be declared to be a day of fasting and thanksgiving in order to be a legal holiday will not stand.

Section 5543 of the code is construed by the state officials as empowering the governor to declare a legal holiday. Judge Burnett will not adjourn unless it is clear to his mind that it is a legal holiday.
