THE LAW IS PLAIN.

The officials are puzzled as to how to print the official Australian ballot. Section 49 of the law says: "The name of each person nominated shall be printed upon the ballot in but one place." Elector Nathan Pierce should appear but once on the official ballot according to this, and his political designation should be: "Democrat—People's." If this is not done, Pierce will appear twice on the ballot, having two numbers and having to go on the tallysheet twice to any other elector's name, creating confusion and making the ballot thus counted clearly illegal. If an illegal ballot is put in the field in any county, the vote of that county will be thrown out. The plan is to throw the election into a Democratic house and thus seat Cleveland with an illegal ballot. If this is not a scheme of Democratic manipulators at Salem to throw out Marion county it is nothing, as today it is learned that the Democratic clerk, who has sole control of making up the ballot, has decided to have Pierce's name printed twice. Republicans should be on the lookout for any attempt at fraud. Section 23 provides that first the number and then the name of each candidate must be called and tallied. If printed twice and numbered twice he must be entered twice in the tallysheet book to correspond. He will be entered as a Cleveland elector and as a Weaver elector and out of this will grow a confusion that will make the ballot illegal. Prominent Democrats and Republicans say that the clerk is mistaken in his understanding of the law, and if he attempts to print Pierce in two places upon the official ballot, steps will be taken to stop the proceedings.

We trust the generous people of Salem, who have never yet turned a deaf ear to the wants of suffering humanity, will come forward with their contributions, and thus assist us in affording prompt relief to the deserving poor.

The Salt creek grange will hold its regular session on November 4th, when several candidates are to be initiated.

The St. Charles hotel and furniture were sold at auction this afternoon by the assignee, D. Forman, in order to settle the estate. Mr. E. D. Barrett purchased the real estate, a frontage of 258 feet on Front street, and the furniture, paying \$700 for the real property, subject to mortgage by the Lion county bank, of \$3000 and interest, \$44000 in all, and \$500 for the furniture and fixtures and \$125 for the bus.—Albany Democrat, Oct. 26.

An exchange says: "Deputy Sheriff W. L. Watkins, of Benton county, is reported to have taken to Salem, three foster children, of Yaquina, they having been committed to the reform school by a Yaquina justice. Two are girls aged 8 and 15, and one boy aged 9. The father is on the county. There are three other children. It looks as if it were a case where provision was trying to be made for the support of the children; as they are probably average children; but they will not receive the girls there."

Hanna; capital stock, \$20,000.—C. W. Boynton Saw Co., of Portland; C. W. Boynton, Wm. L. Murray and C. E. Boynton, incorporators, capital stock, \$100,000.

Is the Oregonian helping the Democrats this year, an exchange says: "From the tone of the editorial in the Oregonian one would conclude that its editor looks to see its party reap a very heavy harvest of 'apathy' on the 8th of November. There are some indications pointing that way."

Mrs. Buell of Bellevue, Yamhill county, an old settler in Oregon, killed herself by discharging the contents of a shotgun at the fatal point in her body. Her death was immediate and is supposed to have been suicide. She leaves six children nearly grown.

The Guard says: Kola Nels, manager of the Eugene branch house of Phil Nels & Co., of Seattle, advances the estimate that out of 3000 bales of hops raised in Lane county, 1200 bales have been sold thus far. At the rate raisers have been selling the last few days the bulk of the crop in this county would soon be sold. In this state there were raised between 16,000 and 18,000 bales. Of this amount the most sales have been made in Lane county, although about 1000 bales have been shipped to England on consignment from Marion county and a few small sales made in other parts of the Willamette valley.
