The Salem Building & Loan association holds the policy.

ABOUT SALEM'S UNIVERSITY

What is Being Done at Old Willamette—A Good Report.
Mrs. R. G. Matthews '80, was at chapel Wednesday.
Miss Ethel Frizzell recited so nicely Thursday as to give much pleasure.
The scientific lecture with illustrations, by a large amount of apparatus was a shining success. After a sweet vocal duet by Misses Adair and Carpenter, Prof. Cochran began to experiment and lecture. The special topics were water and air. The fact that water will rise to a level with its source, was illustrated by means of this principle; reservoirs are made to supply cities with water; the Romans not knowing this, built their aqueducts over valley and through mountains, at great disadvantage and enormous expense; yacuum, weight and pressure of air, syphon, and Hero's fountain, were discussed; two forms of which were exhibited, and the value of this method in the Hungarian mine system. Glass suction and force pumps, several interesting and comical experiments on the air pumps, one of which, a tug of war between Prof. Arnold and Mr. Shepard in trying to separate the Magdeburg hemispheres, was quite funny. The ringing of an electric bell in a vacuum demonstrated that air is the medium for conveying sound. Carbonic dioxide, putting out lights, and passing through lime water showed how dangerous is the gas passing from the lungs, even when we talk most eloquently and sing most sweetly. Two colorless liquids mixed made in one experiment white, in another, red and in a third, blue. Water was turned into wine and back again, as far as appearance goes.

The lecture was unique and complete, and if the adjectives necessary to explain our opinion were used, they would sound more like flattery than a true description. The lecture was satisfactory, and if at any future time, Professor Cochran will give another such he will be greeted by a large and appreciative audience. "Bull frog and Bull dog" was a college song sung by a college septette at the close of the lecture. Prof. Arnold made a few appreciative remarks at the close of which the audience were invited to look through microscopes at blood corpuscles, a section of bone, and a fly's foot. Miss Carpenter sang a vocal solo as a closing number.

The regular semi-term rhetorical occurred Friday afternoon.

Dr. Donald Downie will give a series of three lectures at the University chapel, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week for the benefit of the laboratory.

The services will be on "Napoleon," "Japan" and "Scotland and Ireland," illustrated by the stereopticon with an oxo-hydro calcium light.

The present term of school closes Nov. 11, and the second term opens Nov. 14.
