CITY ELECTION.—The next political election after the Presidential contest will be the Salem city election. A mayor and marshal are to be chosen to succeed Mayor D'Arcy and Marshal Minto. Successors to members of the council are to be chosen as follows: 1st ward, Chas. Johnson, term expires; 2d ward, Geo. Collins, term expires; 3d ward, C. B. Moore, term expires; 4th ward, A. Klien, vacancy term for which he was appointed expires, and Lamoureux, term expires. There are no names suggested as yet to fill these places.

AT HOME.—The Democrat of last night says: Judge Boise passed through Albany this noon on his way home from the Siletz, where he has been as one of the commissioners to set aside the land for the whites. There are about 210,000 acres in the reservation, of this only about 80,000 is good farming land. The Indians have been allotted 40,000 acres all in good farming land, leaving only the poorer land for the whites. The 80,000 acres are among the best in Oregon, rich and fruitful. The Indians cannot sell for 25 years unless the law is changed.

MARSHAL'S REPORT.

Marshal Minto made a report of delinquent sewer assessment of 1891 which was turned over to him for collection, the summary of which is as follows: Amount turned over, \$1,691.18; collected to date, \$1,060.57; amount due the city, \$630.57, on the following property: Mrs. E. L. Moore, \$244.20; Mrs. N. B. Pratt, \$112.50; E. C. Churchhill, \$13.54; Jno. Holman, \$25.10; M. L. Shelton, \$59.99; Cora and Sheila Boon, \$14.62; C. P. Chapman, \$24.15; German Reform church, \$98.19. The report was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

PETITION AND REBATES.

B. E. Critchlow's petition for a rebate of \$5 taxes was allowed.

Mrs. Catharine Stutesman was allowed a rebate of \$8.20.

T. H. McIntire was granted a tax rebate.

Jay C. Smith was granted permission to repair the Club livery stables, lately injured by fire.

The petition for a reconsideration of the order removing the electric light from the foot of Marion street was referred to the committee on fire and water.

A petition from the residents on 14th street, between Chemeketa and State, to prevent the trespassing of cattle on their lawns was referred to the committee on health and police.

The petition for the opening of Chemeketa street from 14th to the eastern limits of the city was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

A NEW FRANCHISE.

The ordinance establishing the franchises of the Capital City railway company was passed, after striking out the permit to run on 13th street from Chemeketa to Centre, and thence to Asylum avenue. This gives the company a franchise through on State street, but leaves its Chemeketa street privileges just as they were.

MISCELLANEOUS.

An ordinance was passed authorizing the sale of \$20,000 bonds to cover floating warrants. This was in accordance with the bid of J. H. Albert to take the bonds at par less a commission of \$575.

The offer of the city of Seio to take three of the old hydrants for \$20 was laid over until another meeting.

S. T. Northcott objected to the method of work on State St. at Front.

An ordinance was ordered prepared authorizing a sewer to be built on Trade street beginning on Winter street and running 900 feet to block 18. The estimated cost is \$800.

TWO FINE SYSTEMS.

Street Railway News—How the Salem Lines are Extending.

There is no more favorable indication of the prosperity and growth of Salem than the fact that two street car systems are extending their lines as rapidly as they find it possible to get franchises, and build the lines. It is not a bad sign for working people. It means employment.

MORE CAR LINES.

The city council at its session last night gave the Capital City railway company the right to build on State street, from 12th to 18th, which will give them a continuous line from Commercial street to the penitentiary. Manager Barnes says the work of construction will begin at once, and that this extension, as well as the asylum line, will be in operation within a month. This will give the company two more valuable pieces of road, and will accommodate a large additional number of patrons. In judiciously encouraging the extension of electric lines, Salem is doing much to build up the city, and is offering exceptional opportunities for investment.

THE OLD HORSE CAR TRACK

on Commercial street is the subject of newspaper criticism. It is charged that the city is covering it with gravel and that it should be torn up, etc. The company was seen and says its line is not being covered with gravel. They say: "It is the intention of the Motor Line Co. to improve and electrify its Commercial street track between State and Trade streets, as soon as the city has permanently improved the street. They say the track is now at grade, is no obstruction, and the company will maintain it in good shape until they are ready to operate it as a part of their whole system at no distant future."

HOW THEY RUN.

The Salem Motor Co. has this morning put on a through time service giving four cars an hour each way from the fair grounds to Rural avenue. The first cars leave at the company's office, corner Commercial and Chemeketa at 6:30 a. m. and run each way every fifteen minutes until 10 p. m. The cars pass on the Commercial street, Oak street and North Division street switches. There is a car from Commercial street each way every fifteen minutes. This fast time is made by a new arrangement of the switches, they having been moved so as to gain five minutes time on the runs each way. A time card will be out in a few days. This will make a very popular service, and Supt. Derby says no pains will be spared by the officials or employees to make this a desirable line for the public to use. It will be extended as fast as possible at this season of the year.
