Big Harvest of Premature Electoral Apples.

ON THE BRIDGE AT MIDNIGHT

It Looked as Though Cleveland was Elected.

The Associated Press returns at midnight on Tuesday indicated a possible victory for Cleveland and Stephenson. Congress will probably be Democratic, and Harrison will carry Oregon by a small vote.

THE DOUBTFUL STATES.

MONTANA. Thirty-five precincts out of 488 give Harrison 3,152, Cleveland 3,057. Indications are that Harrison has carried the state by a small plurality. Richards, for governor, Republican, is elected.

SOUTH DAKOTA. YANKTON, S. D., Nov. 8.—The chairman of the Democratic state committee, at 10 o'clock tonight conceded the election of the Republican state ticket by 8,000 plurality, but claims that Weaver presidential electors were chosen by 5,000 plurality.

MICHIGAN. DETROIT, Nov. 8.—Michigan will give from five to seven of her votes for Cleveland. State returns show gains for Morse, dem., for governor, and his election seems assured.

MAINE. AUGUSTA, Nov. 9.—Returns at midnight give Harrison plurality of 14,000.
