KOLB TO TAKE OATH OF OFFICE.

A DEMOCRATIC SENATE.

Cleveland Carries Congress and the U. S. Senate With Him.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—On the 4th of March, 1893, twenty-five seats in the United States senate became vacant. The control of these senatorial vacancies was at stake in the recent presidential election, and it is now evident that the Democratic party has captured enough of the vacancies to insure its supremacy in the senate, regardless almost of any possible combinations between Republicans and Populists, assuming that Montana, California and Wyoming will send Democratic senators. Democrats at the beginning of the 53d congress would have as many senators as Republicans and Populists combined and thus be able to organize the senate by casting the vote of Vice President-elect Stevenson.

CAN RELY ON FUSION.

It is reasonably certain however that Democrats can rely on the support of some Populist senators in any of their projects, whether for removal of the present force of Republican employees or revision of tariff. Of 25 senatorial seats vacant March next, Democrats will name occupants of 13, Republicans 9, Populists 3, one being Senator Stewart of Nevada who has gone from the Republicans.

DEMOCRATIC GAINS.

Democrats lose no seats. They now hold and gain five from Republicans; one each in California, Montana, New York, Wisconsin and Wyoming. Populists gain senators from Republicans in Kansas and Nebraska, besides Senator Stewart, of Nevada, who will succeed himself. Some doubt still surrounds the complexion of the legislatures in California, Montana, Wyoming and Nebraska, but late returns all say the Democrats have gained legislatures in the first three named states and populists in the last.

Weaver, of Iowa.

DES MOINES, Nov. 12.—General Weaver, the People's party candidate for president, says his party is not a temporary affair but is going to stay in the field and be a factor in every campaign for the future. He also said that he had received private advice from Alabama, which convinces him that he carried that state by 3000 plurality, and he expects to make a fight for it. That Kolb's friends will stand by him at the approaching inauguration of governor in that state. Kolb will take the oath of office, and his friends and supporters will see to it that he secures possession of the office to which he was honestly elected.

Ohio for Harrison.

COLUMBUS, Nov. 12.—The Democratic committee is not receiving returns on election today, but stand by their claim of 500 plurality for the Cleveland electors made last night. At Republican headquarters the official count is being received by wire as soon as completed in the counties. This afternoon with all counties official, except Hamilton and Turnbuhl, Harrison electors had a plurality of 917. Chairman Dick claims the entire Republican electoral vote.

"We Are The People."

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 12.—Chairman Simpson of the Republican state central committee issued a bulletin this afternoon conceding the election of Lewelling, the entire Populist state ticket, and a majority of legislative candidates.

Cabinet Predictions.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 12.—The Herald says William C. Whitney will be Cleveland's secretary of state and Geo. W. Cable of Illinois secretary of the navy.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 12.—Semi-official returns from all counties except one give Cleveland plurality of 3303.

Kansas Gets Saloons.

PORT SCOTT, Nov. 12.—The victory for the constitutional amendment proposition to repeal prohibition in this state was secured yesterday, and simultaneously several saloons were opened in this city. This

is the first time in 11 years that a saloon has been run openly.

Half a Million Fire.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 12.—A destructive fire this morning in storehouses on the river front, occupied by Holton, Biles & Dallett, agents of the Red Line steamers which run to South American ports, has caused a loss of half a million. The place was filled with cotton and the fire is supposed to have been smoldering several days.

A Fatal Fog.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 12.—A dense fog is prevailing. Traffic has almost suspended and many casualties and robberies are reported. The thieves escape under cover of the mantle of fog. It is feared that many fatalities will occur at the docks which are veritable death traps in such weather.

Death Cheats the Gallows.

READING, Pa., Nov. 12.—Murderer Kock, who was to have been hanged Friday, was found dead in his cell shortly before the time set for the execution. No traces of poison were found, and after a post mortem the doctor swore death was caused by nervous exhaustion.

Famine in Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 12.—The harvest in southern Bessarabia proved a complete failure. The inhabitants are without grain and the cattle without fodder. Much suffering is certain to result.

Yale Wins at Football.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—In a football game between Yale and University of Philadelphia today Yale won first half, 22 to 0.

President Harrison Interviewed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—President Harrison talked freely about the recent defeat of his party and the causes which brought it about, says a dispatch from Washington to the Herald. He said:

"The overwhelming defeat of the Republican party was due mainly to the position of the party on the tariff. The Republicans forced the issue to an extreme, which did not meet with the approval of the people. Another important element, which had much to do with the defeat of the Republicans last Tuesday, was the force bill and old lines, but in my estimation it did more than that, for it brought to the support of the Democrats many votes in the North. The verdict last Tuesday can be construed in but one way. It means the condemnation of the extreme high tariff policy of the Republicans. The inevitable result, if the party is to obtain or hope for a renewal of power, is a modification of this position, but not a renunciation altogether of the protective tariff policy, which has been the key note of every Republican success for many years past.

ONE REASON FOR DOUBT.

One of the reasons for the president's doubt as to the election was the well-known dissatisfaction of a number of prominent leaders of his party. This was evinced by a statement with regard to Dudley, Quay and Cameron. As to Cameron, the president believes he not only failed to support the ticket, but actually did all in his power to defeat it. Cameron's influence, like Quay's, extended far beyond the confines of Pennsylvania, and the president evidently realized both these gentlemen were in a position to do much injury to the ticket in the heretofore doubtful states of New York and Indiana. As to Colonel Dudley, the president said he did not believe Colonel Dudley had done anything to injure the ticket, but his influence had rather been of a negative character.

SENATOR MORRILL.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Senator Justin S. Morrill, the father of the war tariff, in an interview today said:

"The Democratic victory seems to be complete. In my opinion it is best so. I want the Democratic party to take full charge and responsibility of national affairs. There will be nothing to prevent them from carrying out their policy, and if they do this everybody can see how the change will work. It is possible we have carried the principle of protection nearly to the extreme limit. At all events, I think it quite as well that the other side should have an opportunity of making a practical test. They will begin by taking off the duty on wool and probably coal. I scarcely think there is any danger of an outrage repeal of the McKinley bill. There will likely be a substitute measure of a specialized character adopted. The silver element in the party is strong enough to pass a free money

and the only protection there will be against it will be Mr. Cleveland's veto. I hardly think they will interfere with the pension list just yet, though there is no doubt that the party is hostile to the present measure, which call for \$150,000,000 annually. To have left this at about \$125,000,000 might have been better. As to the state bank issues, I think they will be brought along under Democratic government. The repeal of the tax is the only thing necessary, and the South is strongly in favor of it."

FOREIGN CABLEGRAMS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The latest accounts from Samoa disclose great dissatisfaction among the natives over the methods pursued by the commissioner appointed by the three foreign powers, the United States, England and Germany, in the application of funds received for taxes. The complaint is made that the tax fund is consumed in the payment of high salaries to the commissioner and his appointees, and that they get no return in the way of improvements for the heavy assessments made upon them. Consequently affairs in the Samoan group are unsatisfactory and threatening. For this reason an order will be sent by the mail steamer which leaves San Francisco tomorrow for the cruiser Alliance, now at Honolulu to go to Samoa. It is not the intention to send another vessel to Honolulu to relieve the Alliance. The U. S. treasury pays 85 cts. per oz. for silver and has a gold balance of \$124,633,814.

Civil Service Extensions.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—It is understood the policy to be pursued by the administration in regard to filling existing vacancies in the civil service was the principal subject considered at yesterday's cabinet meeting. It was recalled that just before going out of office in '89, Cleveland made extensions of the classified service, which put further limitations upon the patronage limited over to Harrison. For some months Harrison has been considering the question of placing the bureau of engraving and printing and the government printing office within the classified service. It is said he has decided to do this, and when the Democrats come into power, they will find civil service rules extended to these other branches of the service.
