

FIELD WILL RESIGN.

Returning to Railroad Pool Methods.

PORTLAND DEMOCRATIC RATIFICATION

Promises to be the Largest ever Held in the State.

Justice Field's Resignation.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17.—Washington special says inquiries fail to corroborate the statement that Justice Field's design of offering his resignation to President Harrison, so that he may appoint a successor before Cleveland's return to office. The story is believed, however, and intimate friends of Field assert that his resignation no doubt will be forthcoming, unless Cleveland will pledge his word that he will not appoint as his (Field's) successor, Judge Wallace of San Francisco.

To Re-Establish the Pool.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—A meeting of the presidents of all the seaboard trunk lines doing business to the west was held here, it was decided that the only way to prevent demoralization of rates was to return to the old plan of pooling business, pure and simple, as was done before the interstate commerce law made it illegal. It is no less illegal now, but officers saw no other way out of the difficulty and evidently resolved to take chances of the law not being rigorously enforced against them.

Portland Democrats.

PORTLAND, Nov. 17.—At Democratic headquarters today arrangements for tonight's ratification are being actively consummated. All morning trains brought large numbers of enthusiastic Democrats from all parts of the state. The number will be largely increased by afternoon accessions. The ratification gives promise of being the most enthusiastic one ever held in the state.

Scurvy in Tacoma.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 17.—Scurvy has broken out on the ship Hawkeye, loading wheat for the United Kingdom. Three sailors are at the hospital and others on board are affected. The men declare they were kept on short and poor rations during the trip from Cardiff to Santa Rosalia, which lasted 165 days. The attention of British Vice-Consul Alexander was called to the matter, and the men are now given proper food.

A JACK THE RIPPER.

A Woman Brutally Murdered by a Drunken Beast.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17.—A particularly bloody and brutal murder occurred on Montgomery Avenue early this morning, when "Big Belle" Sullivan was stabbed and killed by Pat Sullivan, who went under the title of the "Woman's Husband." Sullivan grabbed the woman by the arm, and with a few incoherent remarks, pulled out a huge sheath knife, and despite her struggles plunged the knife into her rapidly. The first blow ripped a gash on the left side of the scalp, over three inches long, and the second blow was similar to the first, and but one half inch lower. The woman dragged her assailant along the pavement, in an effort to get away. Sullivan held on and inflicted ten gaping wounds in her body, one nearly severing the left arm from the shoulder. The woman's refusal to further support Sullivan, is supposed to have led to the tragedy.

Will Contest Pierce's Vote.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 17.—It is understood that the Democratic state central committee will contest the election of the Republican elector receiving lowest vote, on the ground that Nathan Pierce, elector on the Populist ticket, and who was endorsed by Democrats, did not have his full vote counted. It is claimed that in Clatsop county alone 600 votes for Pierce were not counted. As the count stands Pierce is only a few hundred behind. Democrats say they will make a contest, not because Pierce's vote is needed in the electoral college, but they want to make a test case.

A Miserable Death.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 17.—Thomas, formerly engineer on the Esquimalt, went hunting in the vicinity of Comox several days ago, and as he did not return a search party was sent after him. They found his body. He had been caught by the leg in a bear trap and died from hunger and loss of blood.

WILL NOT SMASH IT.

Democrats to Proceed Slowly With McKinley Bill.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 17.—Senator Vest says Democrats will proceed cautiously in reforming the tariff and not smash McKinley bill as a blacksmith would destroy a watch. Free trade pure and simple he said is impossible, "for the only proper way to raise money to carry on the government was by a cautious tariff." He ridiculed an idea of an extra session of congress to deal with the tariff. "Cleveland" he said, "is too level headed for any such nonsense."

He does not believe in a Cavalry Charge upon the existing system of taxation, and will proceed slowly.

A FATAL RATIFICATION.

Fireworks Ignite and Destroy the Building—Many are Wounded.

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark., Nov. 17.—The Democrats of Mountain View held a ratification meeting last night. The quantity of powder and fireworks stored in the schoolhouse in which the speaking was held, accidentally ignited, wrecking the entire building and burying the occupants in the ruins.

The debris took fire in several places, and it was with the utmost difficulty that the rescuers were enabled to extinguish the flames before they were cremated. Berry Sherrod, one of the most prominent residents of the county, the son and daughter of Silas Graham and an unknown man were killed while 15 others were severely injured, some of which will prove fatal.

THE HERESY TRIAL.

A Test Vote Shows the Accused Has Some Strength.

CINNATI, Nov. 17.—The Wednesday session of the synod of the trial of Prof. Preserved Smith for heresy was occupied by the argument of Dr. McGibbin for the prosecution. The reverend speaker held in the charges that such constituted an offense against the doctrines of the church, and that they were proved. At the afternoon session Rev. Dr. McGibbin continued the argument on behalf of the committee for the prosecution. He made numerous citations from the Bible, which were not made in the committee's statement of charges. This Prof. Smith objected as introducing matter to which his attention had not been called by the prosecution. The moderator overruled the objections. Prof. Smith appealed, and the vote resulted in thirty-eight to sustain the moderator, twenty-five against sustaining, and eleven members declined to vote. While this could not be regarded as indication of the vote on the main issues, the friends of Prof. Smith are quick to claim that it showed a growth of feeling in his behalf.

Turney Reported Ill.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 17.—There are various reports concerning the illness of Governor-elect Turney. One says his condition is not serious; another that it is probably fatal. In latter event Buchanan will be governor two years more. The constitution says the governor shall keep his seat until another is elected and inaugurated, and that but one election shall be held.

National Grange.

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 17.—The national grange, Patrons of Husbandry, assembled in the state house in the 26th annual convention, yesterday. Master J. H. Brigham delivered the annual address. He stated that the financial condition of the grange was good, and reports from state granges show increasing numerical strength.

Works of Art for Chicago.

NAPLES, Nov. 17.—The Constellation is here for the purpose of taking on board and conveying to the United States works of art by American artists for the Chicago Exposition. She will also take works of art loaned by the Italian museums, and will probably remain here until November 25.

Papal Nuncio.

ROME, Nov. 17.—As soon as Mr. Cleveland's administration shall have been inaugurated in Washington, the Vatican will open negotiations for the establishment of a special United States legation, and the reception at Washington of a special nuncio.

Gold for Russia.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The Rothschilds will send another £1,500,000 in gold to Russia next week. Half has already been purchased. It is expected the remainder will be secured without having recourse to the Bank of England.

FOREIGN BUDGET.

Mrs. Deacon Case—Spanish Prison Mutiny—A British Federal Council.

PARIS, Nov. 17.—The appeal of Mrs. Deacon from the decision of the tribunal of the Seine, declaring she had no right to apply for a divorce from her husband and awarding the custody of the children to Deacon, came up today in the first chamber of the court of appeal. Deacon was present, but Mrs. Deacon was not. Barroux, for Mrs. Deacon, charged that Deacon was a man of violent temper, and had neglected his wife. He declared that for two years Deacon studiously ignored his wife's liaison with Abelle, and refused to apply for a divorce because Mrs. Deacon paid the household expenses. On the night Deacon killed Abelle there had been no criminal intercourse between the latter and Mrs. Deacon. Deacon had consented that Mrs. Deacon should have two of the children. Deacon's present demand for the daughter was due simply to a desire for vengeance and hatred of his wife. Barroux claimed Mrs. Deacon was justified in requesting her children until the appeal was decided. She had taken the girl from the convent to prevent the husband sending her to America. Continuing, Barroux declared the attitude of Mrs. Deacon, after the tragedy, was comparable with Mary Magdalene, who solicited for sympathy. He asked the court to place the child in the convent, and allow Mrs. Deacon to visit her weekly.

MADRID, Nov. 17.—Convicts in Farragosa prison mutinied yesterday morning. They overpowered the guards, and prepared with outside assistance to effect a general escape. Troops were hastily summoned, and when the convicts refused to return to their cells the soldiers fired on them. They advanced on the troops, however, with all sorts of improvised weapons, and a desperate hand-to-hand fight ensued. Some of the soldiers fell back, reloaded, and as the opportunity offered fired into the convicts, who were finally overcome; not, however, till nine of them were killed and 17 wounded.

New Hawaiian Ministry.

HONOLULU, Nov. 17.—Queen Liliuokalani has appointed the following cabinet to succeed the one lately ousted by the legislature. Hon. G. N. Wilcox, minister of the interior; Hon. M. P. Robinson, foreign affairs; Hon. Peter Jones, finance; Hon. Cecil Brown, attorney-general.

The suit on behalf of United States Minister Stevens against Daniel Logan, editor of the Bulletin, on a charge of libel, reflecting on Minister Stevens in connection with the wreck of the ship William A. Campbell, was dropped November 8, by consent of the prosecution.

Federal Council.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The council of the imperial federation approved the report of the committee which proposes the creation of a federal council in which shall sit representatives of Canada, Australia and South Africa, together with the British prime minister, chancellor of the exchequer, minister of the colonies, minister of war, first lord of admiralty, and the secretary of state for India. This council shall fix the contributions each part of the empire shall pay toward the common defense. The report declares the essential principle of federation is that the voice of the empire in dealing with foreign powers should be the united voice of all the autonomous parts of the empire.

Fighting in Rio Grande.

VALPARAISO, Nov. 17.—News comes of further fighting in the Rio Grande de Sul. The federal forces attacked Villa Rosario, near San Gabriel, killing a number of Republicans and taking others prisoners. The Republicans repulsed the federal forces at Dom Pedrito. Rivera Chica has been occupied by federalists. A number of Republican chiefs are hiding along the frontier. There is much anger against the Uruguayan authorities for allowing the federalists to organize their forces on Uruguayan territory.

Archbishops Confer.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—The conference of Roman Catholic archbishops of the United States, together with Archbishop Corrigan, began yesterday. The session is understood to be chiefly for the consideration of the educational question of this country. Among other questions it is understood Archbishop Kater of Milwaukee will ask conference to accurately define the term "Sacerdotium." Among the archbishops present are Gross of Oregon, and Riordan of San Francisco.

SMALLPOX ON THE SOUND.

Breaking Out in All the Centers of Commerce.

OLYMPIA, Nov. 17.—The commissioners of Snohomish county have appealed to Dr. G. S. Armstrong, secretary of the state board of health, for aid to suppress or control the smallpox epidemic now going on in railroad camps on the Great Northern. It was shown that men employed on the Great Northern who contracted the disease are permitted to lie about the camps exposing others to the contagion. No pest house has been established in which to place patients. The company's physician visits the camps in turn, but can do little to check the spread of the pestilence because of exposure. Employees are leaving the neighborhood daily, carrying smallpox into different parts of the state. This accounts for the breaking out of the pestilence in different sections between which there is no immediate connection. There are about thirty cases among the camps, and are being cared for under conditions that place the principal cities in imminent danger of the disease.

Major O'Brien, of the state board, has left for Seattle, to consult with Judge Burke, legal representative of the Great Northern, concerning the epidemic. The only feasible scheme suggested to prevent railroad men from scattering out over the state is to hold back their pay for six weeks. But the difficulty in this plan is that the road expects to be through work in Snohomish country on the 25th, and will then discharge a large number of their men.

Smallpox has broken out in Seattle, Tacoma, Ellensburg, San Juan Island, Snohomish, Lowell, Sultan, Index. A man has died at Chehalis from the disease. The smallpox is supposed to have been taken into the Great Northern camps by men from Victoria.

SMALLPOX IN SEATTLE.

SEATTLE, Nov. 17.—There are eighteen cases in Seattle all isolated in the pest house. The houses from which the cases came have all been quarantined, with all their occupants. George McLennan, railroad laborer, died at the pest house Wednesday. At Friday harbor, on San Juan Island, a single case has caused great excitement. New Westminster and Vancouver, B. C., health authorities, acting under instructions from the provincial health officer, are inspecting all steamers from the sound before they are allowed to land.

A Bogus Jewelry Case.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 17.—The discovery was made that the supposed priceless jewels and sacred relics, owned by the late Rev. Father Mollinger, and which played such an important part in the thousands of cures performed by the priest, are bogus. According to J. J. Wright, who was Father Mollinger's carpenter, the jewels are mostly pieces of colored glass, and the alleged golden altar at St. Anthony's chapel is nothing but wood covered with gilt. Mr. Wright said yesterday: "I built the altars and put the relics in position. There is not a truly valuable stone in the whole building; they are mainly glass imitations colored to represent emeralds, amethysts and diamonds. One time I asked Father Mollinger why he did not exhibit real stones. He said he was afraid robbers would steal them." The legal contest for the property began today in the common pleas court. Attorney Wegar filed an ejectment suit on behalf of Right Rev. Bishop Phelan, trustee of the Holy Name church, against the Mollinger heirs. It is asked that a summons in ejectment be issued against the defendants, who are in possession of property the title to which, it is alleged, belongs to the plaintiffs.
