Oregonian Concedes Election of Pierce.

BOIES OF IOWA FOR CABINET.

Cleveland's Retreat Discovered—Today's Dispatches.

Pierce Elected.
PORTLAND, Nov. 23.—Official returns from Grant county give Caples 664 votes and Nathan Pierce 607. Official returns from Harney county give Caples 213 and Pierce 421. These counties wipe out Caples' plurality and give Pierce a plurality on the face of the returns, of 88 votes. Three counties are yet to report, Malheur, Curry, and Lake. These counties in June 1895 republican and 518 opposition votes. All the probabilities indicate that he is elected, on the face of the returns.

Boies of Iowa.
DE MOINES, Nov. 23.—A conference of Democratic notables from all points of the state are being held here to arrange for urging Governor Boies for a cabinet position in order to boom him for United States senator. It has been decided that at the next state convention they will formally nominate him for that office.

The Aristocrat in Retirement.
PHILADELPHIA, Penn., Nov. 23.—President elect Cleveland's destination has been discovered. He has gone to Broadwater island near Exmore, Va., on Cape Charles island, which is maintained as a private hunting and fishing preserve by a club of leading Philadelphia capitalists. Game is abundant and Cleveland will have a chance to indulge his love for sport and escape the importunities of office seekers.

An Official Charged With Bribery.
CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 23.—Wm. C. Lincoln, ex-member of the board of trade, who is a juror in the special assessment suit for building a large sewer, was charged in open court this morning, with attempting to secure bribes from both property owners and the city. The matter has caused a sensation.

Coal Combine.
NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—The Congressional subcommittee of the Committee of Interstate Commerce which is instructed to investigate the Reading coal combine, met today, but as railroad magnates who were summoned did not appear, an adjournment was taken till Friday.

Pinkerton Investigated.
PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 23.—The committee of the U. S. senate investigating the Pinkerton detective system, began its first session in this city this afternoon. A number of persons with knowledge of the Homestead strike and riot have been cited to appear.

Foot Ball.
NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Indications fully point out that 30,000 people will see tomorrow's great foot ball game, between Yale and Princeton. In the history of the game in this country there has never been such a demand for tickets. It is believed the game will be close and exciting.

World's Fair Race.
DEADWOOD, S. D., Nov. 23.—The cowboys of Nebraska and Dakota met at Chadron, Nebraska, and arranged a long distance race from Chadron to the Nebraska building on the World's Fair grounds at Chicago. Starting May 15 next, for a prize of a thousand dollars.

Underestimated.
ST. PAUL, Nov. 23.—The discovery has been made that the wheat crop of Minnesota and the Dakotas is many million bushels above estimates. Grain men are all at sea. It has been estimated at 85,000,000 to 105,000,000. It is now believed it will go from 110,000,000 to 130,000,000.

Through Passenger Trains.
TOPEKA, Kansas, Nov. 23.—The State Railroad Commissioners have decided that railroads have a right to operate through trains for the benefit of long distance passengers, and that they cannot be compelled to stop such trains at small stations.

Prize Fighting Checked.
MAWPORT, Ky., Nov. 23.—The mayor has suspended the Chief of Police for allowing a knockout blow fight in the city last night between a couple of light weights.

Champion Cattleman Dead.
TUMACACI, Nov. 23.—Wm. O'Connor, the champion cattlemen of America, died today, of typhoid fever.

KNIGHTS OF LABOR.

Conclude Their General Assembly—Some Resolutions.
ST. LOUIS, Nov. 23.—The general assembly of Knights of Labor adjourned this afternoon. The chief feature of the day's proceedings was the refusal to favor the establishment of a militia system, and advocates an organization, under which men can select their own officers, and be authorized to hold their own guns. A resolution was passed in favor of restricting immigration to such persons as have money enough to support themselves a year. A resolution was also adopted, favoring the passage of a law prohibiting anyone from voting who cannot read the ballot, the provisions of the law to take effect one year after passage. It is also recommended that there be the closest affiliation between all the farmers and laboring men in sympathy with the Knights of Labor.

The Turks on Deck.
CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—The ceremony of dedicating the foundation of the Turkish pavilion at the world's fair occurred yesterday in presence of all of the Sultan's subjects, who came to take part in the exposition, as well as a number who came from Turkey especially for the occasion. The ceremony was a religious one including a sacrifice of a lamb and sprinkling blood on the foundation, typical of the Abrahamic sacrifice. It is believed that this is the first Moslem service ever held in the western world.

BABY RUTH AT LAKEWOOD.
Democrat and Fusionists Claim Wyoming.

LAKEWOOD, N. Y., Nov. 23.—Mrs. Cleveland and Baby Ruth arrived at Lakewood and went direct to the cottage of F. P. Freeman. During the stay of the Cleveland family at Lakewood, the president elect will spend most of his time here, and will only go to New York when he has pressing engagements there.

Wyoming Democratic.
CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 23.—It now seems certain that the Democrats and People's party, which fused in this state, will have a majority on joint ballot in the legislature. The vote for United States senator will be 27 fusion and 22 Republican. The Republicans are straining every nerve to return T. E. Warren to the United States senate, but they cannot succeed. The fusionists are Democratic. The Democrats actually in the race for Warren's seat are: George W. Baxter, manager of the Western Union Beef Company, and a son-in-law of the wealthy Tennessee Macgee; A. L. New, a nephew of J. C. New, and the man who conducted the Wyoming campaign; Samuel T. Corn, who was sent here from Illinois by Cleveland; and N. Ellis Corbitt, a young lawyer who has grown up with the country.

FLOODS ON THE SOUND.
Report that the Mountain Streams are Subsidizing.

SEATTLE, Nov. 23.—Notwithstanding the constant and at times heavy rain all yesterday, the rivers of Western Washington are getting back into their banks, and the flood will probably be over in another twenty-four hours, and then some estimate can be made of the damages done to the rich valleys where the flood was naturally at its worst. The only streams that are now on the rampage are Black and Duwamish rivers, in King county. All of the streams that have their headwaters in the mountains have gone back into their banks, the water falling as rapidly as it rose; but the sluggish valley waterways are still surcharged, and the water does not flow from the flats very rapidly. The big log jam in Suohomish river above the Great Northern bridge has not as yet been broken, but the river is not rising and there is very little debris coming down, so it is almost certain that the bridge piers will be able to stand the strain until all danger is passed.

The whole town of River Park, consisting of about fifty houses of working men, is completely under water, and the people saved but little furniture or clothing, as they had to move in the night. Duwamish district is almost altogether given up to dairy farming, and several hundred head of cattle have been standing in water three feet deep for the past three days. At the big stock farm of Senator Squires men have been at work for forty-eight hours saving stock by swimming it to the foothills.

CRIMES AND CASUALTIES.

Ironworker Roasted.
PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 23.—The body of Anthony Newhouse, employed in the Homestead mill, who was found dead in his room, was brought to the morgue here. Newhouse had the chills, and procuring a bottle of whisky went to his room. Then he sat near the roaring gas fire. The escaping gas asphyxiated him and his body was so close to the fire that it was literally roasted. His legs were baked black, and his breast was browned. The body had been subjected to the terrible heat for more than 24 hours. Every time the undertaker touched it part of the body would crumble away.

A Boss Killed.
CINCINNATI, Nov. 23.—"Cooney" Seamers, a notorious character, was fatally shot a week ago by an equally notorious man named Dorsey. The affair attracted wide spread attention because both men are political bosses with big followings. The shooting occurred very late at night in a "crap dive," and there was a mysterious man who also took a hand in the shooting. No trace of him could be found until yesterday, when he surrendered, and proved to be Henry Brown, one of the richest tobacco planters in the Ohio valley. He was slumping, and fired the shot in self-defense, he claims.

Burned Three Children.
TACOMA, Nov. 23.—"Happy Jack," a local character, put in the city jail, got out of the cell and burned the clothes of 22 prisoners in the stove, leaving them naked. He had a grudge against two of the prisoners. He will be examined for insanity.

PRESERVED SMITH CINCHED.
Kansas Woman Suffrage Extended to Counties.

TOPEKA, Nov. 23.—One important result of the recent election which has hitherto escaped general attention will be the extension of woman suffrage. Kansas women can now vote for municipal and county officers. The platforms of both the Republican and People's party pledge the extension of woman suffrage to all state officials, and there is no doubt it will be accomplished at the coming session of the legislature.

Rev. Smith Beaten.
CINCINNATI, Nov. 23.—Test votes taken on preliminary questions arising in the case of Professor Henry P. Smith show that a strong majority is opposed to him. In order to make the action positive, Rev. Dr. Bryan moved that the court declare the first charge and specifications sufficient in form and legal effect, and this carried, ayes 36, nays 23. This makes the formal trial on this charge at least necessary. Under the charge, specification one is that he taught in an article in the New York Evangelist that acceptance of doctrine was only required by ministers at the time of taking ordination vows, and specification two, which asserted he taught that whether a minister had departed from doctrines can only be determined by judicial process.

Bimetallism Discussed.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—A. J. Warner, president of the American Bimetallite League, has issued an address to the people of the United States in which, after noting that the Republican protective policy has failed to stop the fall of prices and bring about general prosperity, he says the Democrats will make a like failure with tariff reform, and that they will then be thrown from power. He continues: "The rise and fall of prices is due to one cause—the increase in the money standard—that is, in the value of gold; in other words, the change is in the ratio and not in the commodity. This evil cannot be cured by tariff legislation. There is no remedy but to stop the increase in the value of the money unit, and until this is stopped the stealthy appropriation of the earnings of the people by the insidious device of an increasing money standard will go on. Such a money standard is no more defensible or tolerable than would be an increasing unit of length or width or of volume. The next issue, therefore, will be the money question, nor will this issue be long delayed. Its suppression by the two leading parties in the campaign just closed did not settle it. The people are being educated on the money question faster than politicians comprehend, and they will not submit forever to the robbery of an increasing gold standard. Now is the time for bimetallists to organize and push to the front the issue of free bimetallic coinage."

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FINANCIAL PROBLEMS.

Proceedings of the International Monetary Conference.
BRUSSELS, Nov. 23.—Last night Beernaert, the Belgian prime minister and minister of finance, who opened the proceedings, said in his inaugural address that the conference had been called to discuss one of the gravest and most complex problems modern society ever had to face. He extended, in the name of the Belgian government, a most cordial welcome to delegates. After referring to the monetary crisis during the past century Beernaert said it was in the direction of an international understanding that a solution of the monetary question was now sought. This, he added, is in accordance with the law of progress. Numerous such understandings had been arrived at for the regulation of the common interests of the civilized world in regard to telegraphs, railways, weights and measures, and why should not the same course be followed in the case of money. It was fitting the deliberations of the conference should take place on the soil of a country belonging to Latin union, but it was for the delegates of the United States to put forward the views of their government and explain how it is proposed to carry these views into effect. Beernaert advised the delegates to enter the discussion without being too greatly impressed by the prospect of massing the silver for which appeared to be no employment.

Montefiore Levi, as president of conference, followed Beernaert. Levi said he accepted the honor of presiding over the deliberations, knowing it was intended for Belgium rather than for himself. He referred to the numerous attempts made in the monetary question, mentioning especially the British gold and silver commission of 1886 as distinguished above all other similar bodies by its eminently practical character. The worst feature of the present monetary situation was its instability. He hoped the conference would sink individual interest, and keep in view the higher interests of the great human family.

Hon. E. T. Terrel, United States minister to Belgium, replied in a few formal words on behalf of the American delegates. The conference then adjourned until Friday.

A NEGRO KILLER.
Mrs. Leas and the United States Senatorship.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 23.—There has been a bill introduced in the legislature which, if it becomes a law, will practically do away with the negro vote in Alabama. It provides that all persons whose state and county tax as assessed do not amount to \$5 will be required to pay, if it be shown such person failed to vote at August or November elections the previous year. There are not 20 per cent. of negro voters who pay exceeding \$5 a year. At the lowest calculation 50 per cent. of negro voters have taken advantage of the opportunity to save \$5.

Mrs. Senator Leas.
TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 23.—Mrs. Leas said yesterday that she would accept the United States senatorship if offered to her, but would not engage in a scramble for the place. A peculiar fact connected with the affair.

Some Peculiar Rodents.
Death valley, California, notwithstanding its suggestive name, is the abode of more curious and wonderful specimens of animal creation than any place of its size within the limits of the United States. The oddest of these creatures, perhaps, is a species of rodent called the "kangaroo rat," which travels from place to place by executing a series of jumps or springs, almost in exact imitation of his namesake of the Australian wilds. Then, too, as though it were nature's purpose to make a miniature of every large piece of handiwork, the same locality furnishes the "kangaroo mouse," a counterpart and perfect pocket edition of the rat. Besides these kangaroo rodents there are at least two other old specimens of the same genus in the Californian Valley of Death—the "pocket mouse" with little pouches inside his mouth for storing away surplus food, and the "scorpion mouse," which feeds wholly upon scorpions.—St. Louis Republic.

How Cultures were Fooled.
Some sports took place at a station in upper Burma, one of the events being what is popularly known as a "Victoria Cross race"; that is, the competitors have to ride some distance, taking two or three hurdles on their way, to a point where there are arranged a number of figures in stuffed cases, shaped like human bodies; they then dismount, fire a round of blank cartridge, pick up a dummy each, and race back. In this case, after the sports were over the dummies were left on the ground, and in about half an hour after the ground was deserted I noticed a vulture settle on the ground close to the dummies; in about another five minutes, more than thirty had collected.

The birds seemed much puzzled as they carefully inspected each lay figure, walking from one to the next all along the line, and eventually, after sitting in a circle for a short time, flew away. These birds must have discovered the dummies by sight, though I have often heard that vultures rely on their sense of smell as well.—Cor. London Spectator.
