CITY POLITICS.

Further Details of the Coming Contest December 5th Next

FOURTH WARD.

In the fourth ward the nominees for delegates to the city convention are: F. T. Wrightman, A. Moffett, K. Kahill, R. G. Keene, A. Lee, P. J. Larsen, Frank Meredith, Geo. W. Wait, J. L. Hockett, Owen D. Hut-ton, Ed. F. Hutchins, A. O. Condit, councilmen—for the long term, A. Klein; short term, Ed. F. Hutchins.

This completes the list of names suggested for Republican aldermen. They are: Geo. F. Smith, 1st ward; E. C. Cross, 2d ward; E. M. Waite, 3d ward; Ed. F. Hutchins, 4th ward. It is not known that all of the gentlemen named will consent to run. Mr. Waite says he was nominated by citizens of his ward without his knowledge, but does not want the office, or to have any official connection with city affairs in the shape they are in. In the first ward it is charged openly by Democrats that John Gray and his friends secured the nomination of Mr. Smith to give Gray an opportunity to beat him. Gray cannot get the election against a strong and popular candidate, they say, of any party, and this game is his only show to get into the council.

We understand Mr. Smith does not seek the office. But it is believed Mr. Smith would make an energetic member of the city council.

THE CITIZENS' MOVEMENT

As shown by the meeting last night at the opera house, has gained a great deal more strength than THE JOURNAL had anticipated. There is a strong undercurrent in its favor, and many men feel that the machinery of party primaries tends to defeat those who from disinterested motives really desire a better management of city finances. Salem is not overrun with immorality as some mole-eyed moralists would have the world know. There are fewer saloons in Salem than in any city of its size on the coast. In nine-tenths of the area of the city there are no saloons. The question of suppressing the houses of ill-fame is an open one in any city, and one on which even moral people entertain a divergence of views. The men who have held the reins of city government the past year are not bad men. They average up fairly well with other citizens. They have done more to keep Salem a live town than any council that ever sat there. That mistakes have been made in city business is only natural under our city charter. Aldermen get no pay for their time. This should be corrected and then there would be less excuse for not attending to public business.

The next city administration will have before it such tasks as securing a new charter, appointing a committee of expert accountants to report on the financial condition of the city, fighting some big lawsuits, and other big jobs, too numerous to mention. Only the best men should be chosen to do this work. The people do not care to what party they belong so they have the ability, intelligence and backbone to put our city government in the best shape possible.

Salem wants a mayor who will insist on having a straightening out of the city finances, and who has enterprise enough to favor a constant forward movement of this city. A rational and businesslike system of public improvements, is what the people want and are willing to pay for.

The best business talent possible should be secured at the coming city election. The people should remember that officials once in office do about as they please. Hence good selections are imperative.
