BIG TRAIN ROBBERY.

The North Pacific Train Held Up by Masked Men.

PORTLAND, O., Nov. 25.—The Northern Pacific train was held up near Hot Springs, Wash., last night. It arrived here this morning. E. H. Miller of this city who was on the train said: "I was sitting in the smoking room of Pullman when three masked men entered the department and ordered me to throw up my hands. I complied. They relieved me of ten dollars, watch, ring and scarf pin."

Three masked highwaymen climbed on to rear platform of last sleeper while it was stopped at Hot Springs. They held up male occupants of the car while the train was going from that station to next, then stopped train, got off and made their escape.

They got away with about \$1200 in money, and a good deal of jewelry. They fired one shot while in the car, and gave the train a parting salute when it moved away. It is believed that the robbers were the same who robbed the Roanoke bank two months ago. They understood train signals perfectly, so that Engineer Geary readily obeyed every signal given.

While a robber stood at each door of car and covered the passengers, a third man took the collection after all passengers complied with the order to throw up their hands. None of the lady passengers were molested.

Among the chief losers was F. C. Taylor, Pendleton, who was relieved of an open faced gold watch and forty dollars in cash.

PORTLAND, Nov. 25.—At the meeting of the state military board today it was decided not to hold an encampment next year, owing to lack of funds. New rules were adopted but as they must be submitted to attorney general they cannot yet be made public. They work no radical change, however. In matter of naval battalion it was recommended that two companies be detailed as coast guards. Should recommendation meet approval of the governor, companies will be located, one at Astoria and the other at Portland. They to be subject to first regiment.

To Seat Republicans.

OMAHA, Nov. 25.—It is stated that steps have been taken by Democratic state committee to prevent Republicans from unseating a sufficient number of Independents and Democrats in the legislature to control that body on joint ballot, and thus return a Republican United States senator. The legislature stands Democrats 5, Republicans 14, Independents 14, in the senate. In the house Democrats 9, Republicans 49, Independents 44. On joint ballot the Republicans require 13 to elect. Contests have been commenced to seat Republicans enough to elect a United States senator.

Home Rule.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—The cabinet has decided parliament shall meet January 23. John Morley, chief secretary of Ireland, has taken to Dublin a draft of Gladstone's Home Rule bill which will be submitted to Irish leaders. It is understood that the measure provides for retention of full strength of the Irish party in the imperial parliament and for strengthening of imperial veto.

The Silver Conference.

BIRMINGHAM, Nov. 25.—The international monetary conference resumed sitting this morning. Senators Allison and Jones set forth the American suggestions, basing them on general view of the monetary situation in the United States and in countries represented in conference.

Train Wrecked.

BRENNHAM, Texas, Nov. 25.—A passenger train, Houston & Texas Central road, was wrecked near Clear creek two miles south of Brenham last night. A number of people are injured and two killed.

Both Killed.

CENTRALIA, Ill., Nov. 25.—A shocking accident happened a mile south of here late yesterday afternoon. An aged man and woman

were driving in a wagon when the team became frightened by approaching team of ponies. They gave a sudden start throwing them to the ground, killing her on the spot and fatally injuring him.

HIGHWAYMEN IN OHIO.

Mississippi Newspaper Men Come to Blows.

LIMA, O., Nov. 24.—A gang of desperadoes created terror in the city yesterday by playing highwaymen and having a shooting encounter with a posse of police. G. H. Anspach was held up near the Chicago & Erie railway track. A man shoved two revolvers into his face while one behind him rubbed cold steel against his neck. He knocked the revolver near his face away, and brought his lantern down on the man's head. The blow knocked his man to the ground and Anspach ran. Several shots were fired at him. Another man named Romer was next attacked. He was severely choked and his pockets rifled. He is in a serious condition. Frank Herrod lost his overcoat, a gold watch, his pocketbook and contents. By this time the police were in pursuit. In an encounter the chief of police was injured, and all the highwaymen escaped. Getting reinforcements and ammunition, the police started again in bugles to scour the country for the robbers who were all armed. A hot battle with bloodshed may result.

Journalistic Duel.

MERIDIAN, Miss., Nov. 25.—A street encounter occurred yesterday between C. S. S. Price, business manager of the Meridian News, and Eric Gamberl, editor of the Meridian Tribune. Gamberl editorially criticized in the Tribune the alleged journalistic discourtesy of the News in failing to give its retiring editor, Colonel H. S. King, a send-off. Business Manager Price in a card yesterday morning denounced the Tribune as an "officious intermeddler." Price and Gamberl met on the street yesterday. Price drew a pistol and struck Gamberl on the head, kicking him as he fell and striking him on the head after he was down. Friends then interfered. Gamberl's friends say he was unarmed. Gamberl was frightfully bruised about the face and is in a serious condition.

Killed by His Little Son.

VAN WERT, O., Nov. 25.—James Neer, a farmer residing near this city was fatally shot by his 5-year-old son. Neer had loaded one barrel of his shotgun, and as he was about to load the other barrel, the child came up, and, unnoticed by the father, raised the hammer of the loaded barrel, when the hammer slipped from the child's fingers. The gun was discharged, and the entire load of shot struck Mr. Neer in the face.

Died at Age of 110.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Nov. 25.—Mrs. Joanna Ward, of Caboness, the oldest woman in Newfoundland, died on Saturday aged 110 years. She was born in 1782, and having received a fair education, was a mine of information on all matters transpiring at the end of the last and the beginning of the present century. She retained possession of all her faculties almost until the moment of her death, and enjoyed excellent health.

The Prodigal Marries.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—The World this morning says: "Count Berthold Ulrich, Baron Wulff von Wulfenstein Vjest, and Miss Louise Suetterlin were married at St. Bartholomew's church last night. The bride is of German birth and has lived in New York city for some time with her family. Count von Wulfenstein inherited a fortune equal to \$5,000,000. He spent his money freely, and when the last cent had departed he strolled by chance into St. Bartholomew's mission one night, three years ago, and the mission made a man of him. While yet under 30 years old he had run the gamut of dissipation, squandered money at the races and lost it at Monte Carlo. Then he came to America to recoup."

Canadian Pacific.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—It was currently reported in Chicago financial circles that the real purchasers of the Lake street elevated railway is the Canadian Pacific railway. It is well known the Canadian Pacific has for some time been anxious to secure an independent entrance to Chicago, instead of being, as now, a renter of trackway and other facilities for conducting its business from the Wabash railway, and the opinion prevails that the Canadian Pacific has been behind the "L" road from its inception. To purchase the right of way into the heart of the city would cost at least \$20,000,000, whereas the "L" road will not cost one-fourth of that sum.

MONTANA DEMOCRATS.

Number of Pensioners—An Injured Man Commits Suicide.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 25.—A special to the Pioneer Press from Helena, Mont., says the official canvass of Chouteau county has been completed, giving a certificate to one Democrat member of the legislature, making that body democratic on joint ballot, and insuring the election of a Democrat to the United States senate.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—The annual report of the assistant secretary of the interior deals exclusively with the work of the board of pension appeals and with the purchase of Indian supplies at the government warehouse in New York. On June 30, 1892, there were borne on the pension rolls the names of 365,087 pensioners, 179,928 more pensions than were carried on the same rolls at the end of the preceding fiscal year, and 457,050 more than on the rolls June 30, 1887.

Determined to Die.

SAN JOSE, Cal., Nov. 24.—About four months ago, Andy Gross, driving a cart, was run into by a Southern Pacific train. He was seriously injured, and has since been unable to work. Wednesday morning a shot was heard in his room, and he was found dead with a bullet through his heart, fired from a rifle. He had made deliberate preparations. He laid upon the bed; alongside of him lay two pistols and a dirk, which he was going to use should the rifle fail to do its work. He left a letter to the effect that he was tired of life. He was about 40 years of age.

LABOR NEWS.

Pinkerton Investigation—Criticized Acquitted, etc.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 24.—The senatorial Pinkerton investigation committee began its session here, Chief Martin of the Carnegie labor bureau, thought the effects of the employment of armed detectives was bad, as workmen were violently opposed to them. H. C. Frick thought his company had a right to employ armed men to protect their property. He said the firm was now treating with the men as individuals, but had no prejudice against them if they belonged to the union. He denied that the firm had a black list and said that they employed over 20,000 men, about 35 per cent. native Americans. Speaking of the effect of the strike, Frick said the men probably lost about \$1,000,000 in wages. The firm's loss he could not estimate. They lost a good many contracts, but in no case were they held for damages. H. D. Gamble, of the United States circuit court, being examined, stated that his opinion that extraordinary means were required in such affairs as occurred at Homestead. The laws were inefficient and the sheriff by reason of having no money, almost powerless.

There are 180 Homestead strikers indicted for the crime of murder, treason, aggravated riot and conspiracy to be tried at the present and the December term of court. Little more than two-thirds have been arrested. About 140 were bailed out in the criminal court by Alderman McMasters. Hugh MacDonnell, with Critchlow, is held without bail. The trial of Sylvester Critchlow, charged with murder in connection with the Homestead riots, was brought to a close by the jury bringing in a verdict of acquittal. The prisoner was not released, he having yet to answer to the charge of riot, but will probably be bailed tomorrow.

IN FAR OFF BERLIN.

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—A brilliant Thanksgiving reception was given by Wm. Walter Phelps, American minister to Germany. Almost every member of the American colony was present, as also a large number of distinguished Germans. Two hundred guests were present, and Minister Phelps, responded to the toast "The President of the United States." He said: "President Harrison has given the country the cleanest and most successful administration in American annals. When history makes up the record, on every page should be written the name of Benjamin Harrison." Mr. Phelps gave a toast to the "Republican party," which he said was "temporarily withdrawing for repairs because it had given some of us office."

Cops on Bicycles.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—There are strong probabilities of the Chicago police department being equipped with bicycles.

THANKSGIVING FOOTBALL.

Great Game Between Yale and Princeton Colleges.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—At 2 p. m. the teams came on the field and after preliminary practice tossed for position. Princeton won and took the west goal, the wind strongly in her favor. Yale had the ball.

The team then lined up and fun commenced at 2:05. Yale went to work without delay, and inside of four minutes secured a touch-down, from which a goal was kicked for Yale, followed with wild excitement. Score: Yale 6, Princeton 0. Princeton seemed paralyzed by Yale's sharp play. Now it is Princeton's ball, and by a wedge and punt puts it to Yale's 15-yard line. Yale rallies, and desperate defensive tactics by Princeton regains 20 yards. Then Princeton loses the ball and it is landed on Yale's 25-yard line.

Yale is on the defensive, but Princeton plays a bucking game and puts the ball on Yale's 10-yard line again. Two attempts by Princeton at a goal from the field failed, and it is Yale's ball on her 20-yard line. Yale makes a hard fight, and the ball is again in the center. Princeton rallies, and works the ball to Yale's 30-yard line. Yale makes a hard fight, and the ball is again in the center. Princeton's rush-line is broken, and the ball is again in Princeton territory. Up to the 15-yard line it goes, then the tide is stemmed and it goes back to the center in Yale's hands, but is forced up to the Princeton 20-yard line. Princeton forces the ball back to the center, but Yale gets it, and, after worrying back and forth, succeeded in reaching Princeton's 40-yard line. Two or three men have been hurt, but continue to play. Princeton tries the 4 and carries the sphere into Yale's territory, finally reaching the 40-yard line, but cannot hold the advantage. Now Princeton has the ball on the center of the line.

Princeton finally reached Yale's 10-yard line, but Yale rallied and forced their opponents back to Princeton's 30-yard line. Time was called for the first half without further score than Yale's touch down and goal.

Princeton's fine play caused general surprise. They were specially strong in tackling and blocking. Yale was much of the time on the defensive. Yale's fumbling was very noticeable, being attributed to the cold.

The second half opened with Princeton having ball, and it was soon forced to Yale's 30-yard line; but Yale rallied and soon had the ball in Princeton's territory. Laurie Bliss, of Yale, made a fine run of 25 yards, but was savagely tackled, and went down with a badly sprained knee, but continued playing. Yale's ball was on Princeton's 25-yard line. Princeton got it back to the 35-yard line, worked it back to center and finally into Yale's territory, but it did not stay there. Yale gained gradually, and finally Stillman captured the ball as it bounded back of Princeton's goal and scored a touch-down.

GERMANY TALKS WAR.

Reichstag Opened With a Bristling Speech from Chancellor Caprivi.

BERLIN, Nov. 24.—The long-looked-for event of the present session of the reichstag occurred yesterday. The army bill was introduced and Chancellor Caprivi said that he did not intend to justify the bill by referring to war in sight or by indulging in gloomy forebodings. He added:

"I will disclose the whole truth. We are at peace with all nations and encounter no difficulty in any quarter in maintaining the dignity of the nation. His majesty, the emperor, has justly remarked that Heilighof was the last piece of the globe we desire to acquire. Germany will not provoke war, for there is no prize to gain by victory. But neither will she undertake to prevent war any more, as she did in 1870."

The chancellor then referred to the alleged forgery by Prince Bismarck of the famous Ems dispatch which precipitated the Franco-German war and read the genuine dispatch.

THE CHANCELLOR'S ADDRESS.

The chancellor also read the draft Prince Bismarck prepared which explained the proposed reforms in the military service, and referred to measures by which he proposed to meet the increased expenditures. He stated that the beer tax would scarcely be felt, as it amounted to

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to the imperial French government by the royal Spanish government. The French ambassador at Ems further demanded of his majesty the king of Prussia to authorize him to telegraph to Paris that his majesty the king engages for all the future never again to return candidature. His majesty the king thereupon declined to receive French ambassador again, and had him told by the adjutant in attendance that his majesty had nothing to communicate to the ambassador."

The last sentence of the above is what Prince Bismarck is alleged to have forged, with the intention of so wounding the amour propre of France that she would declare war against Germany and thus allow him, in the event of Prussian victory, to bring about the formation of a German empire. Caprivi declared emphatically that Prince Bismarck had not falsified the dispatch and that it was untrue King William was too conciliatory, or had not struck too proper note in dealing with France.

GERMANY DID NOT PROVOKE WAR.

King William, he said, even as late as July 18, 1870, had a dispatch sent to the German minister at Paris, intimating that he was indignant at the Due de Gramont's demand, addressed to him through M. Benedetti, and reserved any further steps. The whole of Europe was of the same opinion as Germany at that time, as shown by Gladstone's declaration and Prince Gortschakoff's dispatch to the Russian ambassador. The chancellor said: "I refer to these matters in order to show that Germany did not play a provocative part. The French love wars and glory, and the more complete their self-consciousness and the desire to conclude an alliance, naturally not for defensive purposes, but with a view to the revision of the map of Europe."

Chancellor Caprivi's speech was greeted with loud applause by supporters of the government. RELATIONS WITH RUSSIA. Referring to Russo-German relations, the chancellor said: "The present czar is one of the noblest, grandest and most peaceful of monarchs, and appreciates the peaceful and loyal policy of Germany. In Russia, however, hostile currents are working against us, but it must not be concluded that because Russia is developing an army that war is imminent. From her preparations we must assume that Russia's next war will be to the westward. There is undeniably apprehension between Russia and France, in the face of which we yield Alsace-Lorraine, nor break off relations with Austria. Strengthening our armaments constitutes no threat to Russia. We only want to repel any possible attack. We must think of war with the possibility of having to present two fronts. We are not prepared for such an exigency. We would have to defend ourselves against superior numbers. We have the highest opinion of our allies, and the dread is nowhere so popular as in Germany. But even the dread is weaker troops than France and Russia."
