SALEM CITY POLITICS.

Democratic Slates Ratified at Primaries—Citizens' Meeting.

Saturday afternoon the Democratic primaries were held, following delegates and nominations being chosen:

First Ward—For delegates to city convention: P. H. D'Arcy, E. H. Flagg, D. J. Fry, W. D. Jeffries, John Gray. For alderman, George Sroat.

Second Ward—Delegates, Charles Gray, A. N. Bush, W. F. Dugan, E. Willis, A. A. Miller, A. D. Palmer, Thos. Canfield, Martin Pezel, W. J. Polley, Joseph Clark, Dr. J. Griffith. For alderman, A. Blosser.

Third Ward—Delegates: G. Steiner, Wm. Scott, Z. Craven, J. H. Cavanaugh, T. Howard, J. G. Barr. For alderman, Geo. B. Gray.

Fourth Ward—Delegates: T. B. Wait, J. Brooks, C. Van Patton, Wm. Ratzburg, A. I. Wagner, John Whitley, Wm. Gray, J. O'Donald, Joe Albert. For alderman, short term, J. H. Albert; long term, John Brooks.

Napoleon Davis for mayor and W. H. Cook for marshal were talked of.

CITIZENS' MEETING.

Saturday evening about twenty citizens met at Grange hall to consider different questions pertaining to the citizens' movement.

W. E. Burke was called to the chair, and B. E. Critchlow was elected secretary.

Remarks were made by H. S. Gile, J. M. Payne, Mr. Jory, M. V. Rork and others. All favored a citizens' movement for the government of the city, and under existing circumstances favored endorsing the best men of the old parties. It was also suggested that the best thing to do would be to "stand in" with the Democrats straight, for a share of the offices.

On motion of M. V. Rork the chairman was authorized to state to the Democratic management that Napoleon Davis would be an acceptable candidate for mayor.

R. R. Ryan suggested that J. M. Payne and B. E. Critchlow be recommended to the Democrats for nomination for recorder and marshal respectively.

On motion Mr. Critchlow was ordered recommended to the Democrats for nomination as a candidate for marshal.

On motion J. M. Payne was also recommended in like manner as a candidate for recorder.

It was understood that the citizens' managers would accept the entire Democratic ticket if the two recommendations were accepted by the Democrats.

Chairman Rork was authorized to convey this information to the Democratic managers.

O. DICKINSON.

A Salem Pioneer, Preacher and Seedsman Dead.

Died, Sunday morning, at 4 o'clock, Nov. 27, 1892, at his residence on Front street, O. Dickinson, one of the pioneer business men of this county.

He had been ill but a few days and his death was sudden as it was unexpected, though he had weak lungs for some time.

BIOGRAPHICAL.

Deceased was 74 years old, born in Springfield, Mass., residing afterwards in Michigan, where a sister was married to Governor Luce. He leaves a wife and an only child, Mrs. A. N. Moores, besides an adopted daughter, Mrs. P. H. Raymond of Portland.

Mr. Dickinson was one of the earliest of Congregational missionaries on the coast, coming to Salem about forty years ago as minister of that denomination; the first society here being organized under him July 10, 1852. He was pastor from 1853 to April 1867. Of late years he has been an Adventist.

Mr. Dickinson was a hard worker and acquired a fortune in the seed and nursery business. He gave liberally of his means to other churches, not long since donating quite a sum to Pacific academy at Forest Grove. He was a man of social qualities and charitable in his instincts.

Is set for Tuesday, 1:30 p. m., at the Congregational church. Revs. Starbuck, of East Portland, and Sharp, of Eugene, and Prof. Condon, of Eugene are expected to be present and take part in the funeral exercises.
