CITY POLITICS.

Democrats Put a Ticket in the Field.—Citizens' Movement.

The democratic city convention was held in the council chamber Tuesday evening. Dr. W. D. Jeffries was chairman, Eugene Willis secretary.

John Gray, A. A. Miller and A. I. Wagner were nominated chairman of the city democratic committee and resulted in the choice of John Gray. Ward committeemen were chosen as follows: first ward, Dr. W. D. Jeffries; second, A. A. Miller; third, G. Steiner; fourth, T. B. Waite.

THE NOMINEES
are, as before indicated by THE JOURNAL: Napoleon Davis for mayor; W. H. Cook, marshal; J. G. Barr, treasurer; Webster Holmes, recorder.

John H. Brooks declines to run for alderman in the fourth ward and the filing of the vacancy was left with the delegates from that ward.

THE CITIZENS'
were not endorsed except for mayor. Mr. Critchlow having been always a Republican, Billy Cook was put up. The Citizens' party will now hold a convention at Grange hall December 1st. They hold primaries today, elections are being held from 1 to 6 p. m. as follows:

First Ward—Old Mansion house; D. J. Steiner, O. G. Smith, D. D. Keeler; four delegates.

Second—Old court house; S. A. Riggs, Wm. Hanit, H. A. Johnson; six delegates.

Third—Over Dearborn's harness shop; S. A. Starr, Jacob Meyer, A. A. Stafford; seven delegates.

Fourth—Ryan's stable; R. R. Ryan, James Miller, H. F. Jorg.

THAT DIPHTHERIA SCARE.—A reporter was sent to the Woman's college today to learn what there was to the report that Mr. Burke had removed his family from the Woman's college last night for fear of exposing them to diphtheria in the college building. Dean Miss Haines was seen and said Miss Magle Alderson had been suffering from a sore throat but the doctor thought she was in no danger. Mr. Burke will take his family back there as soon as all danger is over. There has never been a case of diphtheria in the building, and its sanitary condition is well looked after.

DIFFICULT TO REACH.—The home of Mrs. J. D. McCully in eastern Oregon, who has been called to attend the funeral of her father, T. McF. Patton, is difficult to reach. The telegram informing her of his death Tuesday evening had to be carried by special messenger on horseback forty-five miles. To reach Salem Thursday she would have to travel by carriage seventy-five miles to the nearest railway station accessible by a wagon road. It will be a very hard trip.
