**GENEROSITY.**—A few days ago the non-church members of Harrisburg did a neat thing: They raised a subscription of \$69.25, with which were purchased for Rev. Wiltse, the Christian minister, a Prince Albert suit, overcoat, hat, boots, gloves, shirt, necktie, handkerchiefs and underwear, while Mrs. Wiltse was remembered to the extent of a dress pattern and a pair of shoes. The gift was accompanied with the following note: "We, the undersigned citizens of Harrisburg, who are not affiliated with any church, having formed a high estimate of your character as a minister of the gospel and a citizen, would respectfully present you with a small token of the high esteem in which you are held by us," and then follows the signatures of 67 of the prominent men of Harrisburg. The Courier says: "The originators were careful to keep the matter from all church members, and if any of them became aware of what was going on they were not allowed to subscribe."

**NOVEMBER WEATHER.**—C. T. Roberts, weather observer at this city, reports the following for November: The maximum temperature for any twenty-four hours ending at 6 p. m. during the month was 63 degrees on the 11th inst. Minimum temperature was 30 degrees on the 19th inst. There was the least change in the temperature on the 25th, of any day in the month, being only 6 degrees difference during the entire twenty-four hours. There were six frosts during the month, and but two days that the sun was not obscured by clouds during the day. It rained eighteen days out of thirty. The total rainfall during the month was 5.48 inches, an average of .182 inches per day for the month. On the 21st it rained 1.23 inches. [N. B. THE JOURNAL reporter wishes to add to the above that in many places about Salem there has been no frost to date, and there has not been a frost of sufficient severity to nip tender plants like nasturtiums and others. There has been no storm that would keep children indoors thus far this winter.]

**A WISE SHERIFF.**—Sheriff Smith has the following sign hanging up in his office: "This is no place for loafers, or persons discussing politics, and no money will be loaned, don't ask for it." Sheriff Smith states that the rule applies to the wives of his deputies as well as other persons and will be strictly enforced. It has leaked out today, however, that the notice was put up by the deputies to keep the sheriff from borrowing money of them.—Astoria Examiner.

**THE POULTRY SHOW.**—Yes, Salem will have another poultry show. The fanciers will have a meeting at Keller & Marsh's store next Wednesday evening to arrange for it, and every one interested in the raising of poultry should attend this meeting, as well as take an interest in the show.

### WHO THEY ARE.

The Nominees Briefly Sketched for Newcomers.

Many voters who have come to Salem in the past two years will be interested in knowing who the candidates are. For mayor two gentlemen connected with banks are up so far. Claud Gatch for the Republicans is a young man who has for years been connected with the Ladd & Bush bank. Napoleon Davis for the Democrats has been at the head of the First National bank since retiring from the office of clerk of the Board of School Land Commissioners. Both have families and own property in Salem.

For marshal the Republicans run Harry Minto, since two years Salem's marshal and chief of police. The Democrats put up Electric Line Conductor W. H. Cook, who ran for county treasurer last June. Both are men of family and well known. For recorder the Republicans run Ed. N. Edes, book-keeper for the Churchhill esch, door and mfg. Co. Mr. Edes has a family. He is a Salem boy, as well as the Democratic candidate Webster Holmes, who is a rising young lawyer but has not as yet given any hostages to fortune by taking upon himself family responsibilities.

For treasurer the Republican nominee is E. J. Swafford, present incumbent and salesman for Squire Farrar & Co. The Democrats have put up John G. Barr, the jeweler and watchmaker. Both of these gentlemen are representative heads of families.

**ALDERMEN.**  
In the first ward Geo. F. Smith, the picture store man in the Cottle block and Paul N. Sroat the grocer; in the second ward E. C. Cross the butcher, and Scotch Miller the retired farmer; in the third E. M. Walte, of THE JOURNAL staff and Geo. Gray, of Gray Brothers, hardware merchants, are the respective candidates of the Republicans and Democrats. In the fourth ward only three men are running: A. Klein, the shoe dealer, and Ed. Hutchins, a contracting carpenter, on the Republican side, and John H. Albert on the Democratic ticket, John Brooks, his running mate having declined to be a candidate. The People's party hold their city convention this evening.

**NEW Y. M. C. A. HALL.**—The Y. M. C. A. at a meeting of the directors last evening, decided to build a new hall, gymnasium, bath room and reading room on their property at the corner of Ferry and Second street. The reception room will be on Ferry street south of the gallery of Conn & Underwood, with a large gymnasium 20 feet high in the rear, arranged to form part of the assembly hall. Facing Second street, in the rear of the gallery, will be the reading room and bath rooms. The building will be veneered brick. Work will be begun on it at once by J. B. Coughlin as contractor, and it will be ready for occupancy in a few weeks. With gymnasium and bath facilities there should be a membership of at least one hundred.—Albany Democrat.

**A STRONG COMMITTEE.**—At the Republican convention an entire new city committee was chosen headed by Dr. J. N. Smith, as chairman. R. E. Moore, George Meyer, H. P. Keller, Geo. P. Hughes are the other members. The committee has organized and are making a thorough canvass of the situation for the whole Republican ticket.

**CITIZENS, TURN OUT!**—All citizens interested in a better city government are invited to be in attendance at the city convention at Grange hall this evening at 7:30, for the purpose of placing a non-partisan citizens ticket in the field. By order of committee.

### AN INSANE PERSECUTOR.

A Salem School Teacher the Object of His Attention.

It was reported from the Little Central school to the sheriff's office this morning that some unknown person had broken in there last night, slept there and carried away some property of the teacher, Miss Knox. It will be recalled that Miss Knox was attacked by a man a year ago last winter and in her struggle to escape her clothes were badly torn.

His name was Wm. Perry and he had once been arrested and convicted of insanity but had escaped from the asylum to renew his persecutions. Before returning to Salem, however he had served a year as enlisted man at Vancouver barracks. After attacking Miss Knox he ran away but was taken by Deputy Wrightman near Brooks and returned to the Vancouver authorities, who had him sentenced to the government insane hospital at Washington. He is reported to have escaped from there, but is not believed to be in this vicinity at present.

**THE CITIZENS' MOVEMENT.**—It seems to be the general opinion that the Citizens' movement has been somewhat frustrated by the anxiety of a few individuals for the honors of office. The impression seems to have got abroad that they prefer personal plunder and political spoils to any reform in city government that might be desirable. Men of the strictest integrity can be found on the two tickets already in the field, if that is what a citizens' movement demands. To make up a third ticket of new men is only to throw power into the hands of an uncertain element, and perhaps gratify the few that seek to ride in on a non-partisan tide of popularity. The public awaits the action of the convention tonight with not a little interest.

All now out will be honored, but thereafter all will pay their nickels. At least the experiment will be tried for awhile to see if the revenues can be increased.
