THE DEATH OF JAY GOULD.

Funeral Preparations—Will Be Buried in a Plain Casket.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—There have been about a dozen callers at the Gould residence this morning. Most of them left cards in evidence of sympathy. The casket in which the dead financier is to be buried is severely simple, of plain white oak covered with black broadcloth, and with oxidized silver handles and plate. The inscription on the latter reads:

"Jay Gould, born May 27, 1836, died December 2, 1892." A number of telegrams of condolence have been received by the family.

Funeral services will be held on Monday afternoon. Tuesday morning, the remains will be taken to Woodlawn cemetery, and interred in the family vault, beside those of his wife. In accordance with Gould's wishes, everything connected with the funeral will be very plain.

Death of Editor in Japan.

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 3.—A cablegram from Tokyo, Japan, was received today, announcing the death of Mary Allen West, senior editor of the Union Signal, organ of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, Thursday. She has been engaged in the temperance work in Japan for nearly a year. The cablegram gave no particulars. Miss West formerly lived in Galesburg, Illinois.

Railway Mail Service.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—In his annual report Superintendent White of the railway mail service states that for the year ending June 30, last, the service furnished the enormous total of 9,589,862,589 pieces of mail matter. The increase is seven and thirty-seven hundredths compared with the preceding year.

RALPHIGH, N. C., Dec. 3.—The contest before the state canvassing board in fifth congressional district resulted in favor of Settle, the Republican. Williams may contest the case before the House.

Schooner Wrecked at Astoria.

PORTLAND, Dec. 3.—It is reported that the schooner Point Loma is wrecked off the mouth of the Columbia river. The report could not be confirmed or denied at noon owing to telegraphic interruption with Astoria.

Mill Closed.

PITTSBURGH, Penn., Dec. 3.—The South Fifteenth street mills, of Oliver Iron and Steel Company, has closed down, throwing 1000 men out of employment, owing to overstocked mill and lack of orders.

Kansas Populists.

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 3.—The Peoples' party and the Democrats are highly indignant over the action of the board of canvassers declaring two Republicans entitled seats in the lower house of the legislature.

The leaders of the Populists say they will organize the house composed of their men and ignore the Republicans, and that Governor Lowery will recognize that body and the Populist senate and let the Republicans crack their whip. In this way they will elect a United States senator who they say will be seated.

Murdered a Boy.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 3.—Captain Smith, who was arrested last night on the charge of having murdered young George Neale, by throwing him from the schooner "Lou," while at sea, has confessed that he did throw the boy out of the vessel. His only excuse is that the boy wanted to run the schooner and it made him mad. Mrs. Neale, mother of the murdered boy, is here. She has been notified and is frantic with grief. Indignation here is intense.

THE CORRIGAN TRIAL.

The Catholic Controversy Involves a Hoboken Priest.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Rev. Father Patrick Corrigan, of Hoboken, announces in an open letter to the editor of Freeman's Journal that he has been summoned by Bishop Wigger to stand trial for the letters written by Father Corrigan in opposition to the Anti-American spirit of the late German Catholic congress held in Newark, and its attack upon the public schools. In the course of the statement the father continues to oppose two things—first the attempt to Germanize America by means of the church, and second, the denunciations of the public schools as "abominations." He says: "My criticism is substantially that which has appeared in the editorials in some of the great dailies, one of which concluded a leading article in those words, 'What we are justified in saying is that they who took part in those proceedings are bad citizens, and dangerous in proportion as they are powerful.' I criticized the congress as a body. The congress insulted American intelligence by denouncing the public schools, the most cherished institution of the land, as 'abominations.' It insulted the American church by denouncing some of our most distinguished prelates. I did not speak of Bishop Wigger in his character as bishop of the diocese, but simply as a member of that German congress over which he presides every year outside of his own diocese, to the great mortification of his own English-speaking flock. My opposition to Canisiusism meets the approbation of Americans generally, judging from the unanimity of the press, daily and weekly, without distinction as to politics or religion. Archbishop Corrigan and Bishop Wigger were not on speaking terms for years till Canisiusism united them against Archbishop Ireland and Cardinal Gibbons." Father Corrigan says in conclusion: "I received two weeks' notice of the coming trial, and when I asked a reasonable extension of time was peremptorily refused. This showed how imperfect is our tentative legislation, and how completely it places the priest at the mercy of the bishop."

INDIA AND SILVER COINAGE.

Progress of the Discussion of Bimetallism.

CALCUTTA, Dec. 3.—The newspapers of India are watching with anxious interest the proceedings of the monetary conference. The Allahabad Pioneer says the chief importance of the Rothschild scheme is its parentage. It is believed Rothschild was appointed a delegate mainly to strengthen the opinion of the bankers and merchants of London. He now appears to be the mouthpiece of the government, for without the authority of the government he would never have made a proposal involving an international legal tender of silver. Further meaning is attached to his proposals when it is seen the British ministry, which has such anti-silver tendencies, recognizes the necessity of an immediate step towards the support of silver, and for securing the co-operation of other nations to the end. It is odd also that the submitting of the proposals should have devolved upon a Rothschild, as the anti-silver party has found its largest support among the Jewish financiers, especially the Rothschilds, who are the holders of the chief government stocks, gained enormously through the appreciation of gold. Probably the Baring crisis opened the eyes even of the Rothschilds to the fact that the present strain involved by the scarcity of gold may be carried too far and bring on disasters that would obliterate the advantages subserved by the moneyed interests.

LEADS TO BIMETALLISM.

BOMBAY, Dec. 3.—The Times says: "India holds the Rothschild scheme would pave the way to the ultimate adoption of international bimetallism."

Canadian Affairs.

OTTAWA, Ontario, Dec. 3.—Sir John Thompson, the new premier, on Saturday will announce the completion of the cabinet. A semi-official forecast of the new ministry is as follows: Premier and minister of justice, Sir John Thompson; president of the council, W. B. Ives; postmaster-general, Sir Adolphe Caron; minister of militia, M. R. Angers; minister of public works, J. A. Ouimet; minister of marine and fisheries, C. H. Tupper; minister of finance, George E. Foster; minister of railways, John Hoggart; minister of trade and commerce, Mackenzie Bowell; minister of agriculture, John Costigan; secretary of state, J. C. Patterson; controller of customs, Colonel Tisdale; controller of inland revenue, Clark Wallace. Without a portfolio, J. C. Abbott, Frank Smith.

Favor of Annexation.

STIMSON, Ontario, Dec. 3.—The annexationists made a demonstration here tonight that opened the eyes of the federation leaders. Nearly 1000 voters gathered in the opera house and listened to speeches in favor of annexation. Then a vote was taken, which resulted—for annexation, 428; independence, 92; remain as we are, 21. At the close of the meeting some one raised the stars and stripes, which were applauded uproariously, while a display of the union jack brought forth a storm of hisses.

Purchased by a Syndicate.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 3.—A New York syndicate has purchased the street railroad system of this city for \$10,000,000. The motive power will be changed from mules to electricity.

THE CORRIGAN TRIAL.

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A Marriage Scandal.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—Effie Wade, who has been in jail under indictment of assault with intent to kill, was released yesterday on giving bonds in the sum of \$11,000. Miss Wade claims to be the common-law wife of C. D. Woolworth. The wealthy manager of the grain-commission firm of F. H. Peavy & Co., of this city. According to the story of Francis L. Horton, Woolworth's attorney, the woman had led an immoral career for several years previous to meeting Woolworth in Omaha in 1885. Since that time, the attorney says, she has blackmailed Woolworth out of sums aggregating \$50,000. Woolworth recently demanded her signature to a confession that she had led an immoral life in Omaha and Chicago, and had been the mistress of Garneau, the St. Louis cracker manufacturer, since living with Woolworth, that she had been intimate with other persons, and that her object in connecting herself with Woolworth had been blackmail. This the woman refused to sign, but at the point of a revolver compelled Woolworth to sign an agreement to marry her within six months. For this she was placed under arrest. Miss Wade denies the truth of the charge.

Bribed Newspapers.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—A Paris correspondent gives a list of sums of money paid the newspapers by the Panama Canal company, as prepared by Rosignol, former auditor of bankruptcy, as follows: Le Petit Journal, 300,000 francs; Le Figaro, 120,000 francs; Le Temps, 120,000 francs; Le Matin, 50,000 francs; Le Gaulois, 150,000 francs; Meyer, di-

rector of the Le Gaulois, 50,000 francs; Senator Magnier, director of L'Evenement, 50,000 francs; Patinote, director of the Journal des Debats, 40,000 francs. The last named denies having received any money. The other papers make no reference to the exposure.

Escape of a Prisoner.

RED BLUFF, Cal., Dec. 3.—Tom Harrison, colored, who was confined in the county jail, charged with a criminal assault, sawed off a bar in a north window on the east side of the jail Wednesday morning, and escaped. The sheriff, when apprised of the escape, boarded a south-bound express train, which was over three hours late, and while standing in the cab saw Harrison get on board. The train pulled out, and when near Red's-creek bridge Harrison, obtaining a glimpse of the sheriff, jumped from the train, being followed at once by the sheriff, who was watching the prisoner over the tender. The night was very dark, and it was raining hard. The officer finally lost sight of Harrison altogether. A posse has been out scouring the country, and it is believed is impossible for Harrison to escape. The prisoner was tried last week, but the jury failed to agree.

Train-Wrecked Captured.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 3.—A tramp giving the name of F. R. Warner has been arrested on suspicion of having caused the wreck of the overland train on the Santa Fe road near Monrovia a few days ago. Railroad detectives expect to make other arrests soon. They claim that Warner placed a rock on the track in revenge for having been put of a freight train, that he and his accomplices intended to wreck the overland and then loot the wounded. Warner afterward confessed that he had attempted to wreck the train, and says he did it out of revenge for having been put off a freight train. Detectives will not make any more arrests.

Seattle Editor Shot.

SEATTLE, Dec. 3.—Thomas Henderson Boyd, editor of the Olympian at Olympia, was shot at 11 o'clock last night by his wife, who lives here, and who was formerly a notorious woman at Olympia. Boyd came here from Olympia and spent the evening in shaking dice and drinking in a saloon. About 10:30 his wife came after him and took him home in a hack. Thirty minutes later she shot him. Particulars of the shooting are not yet known. The woman was arrested. Boyd is dead.

California Politics.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3.—There was an exciting scene at the meeting of the election commission today. When Attorney Andrew J. Clunie, who is representing the Democratic party during the progress of the official count of the votes cast in this city at the recent election, made some charges against Auditor Smiley and Tax Collector O'Brien, who are members of the election commission. Auditor Smiley offered a resolution, declaring that Clunie's conduct was unbearable, and ordered the registrar to exclude him from the room. Clunie declined to leave, and warned Registrar Brown not to touch him, and told him if he did so, he would be criminally liable. Brown refused to put Clunie out, and Smiley and O'Brien then called on Police Officer Scott to do so. Scott demurred when Clunie warned him, and then a man named Lauterback who is employed in the auditor's office, appeared, Smiley ordered Lauterback to put Clunie out, and Lauterback accordingly grasped the attorney by the collar. This was the signal for a general disturbance. A number of the counsel's friends jumped over the rail and grabbed Lauterback and a general scuffle ensued. Lauterback was thrown to the floor and badly kicked. The disturbance was finally quieted, and Clunie was still in the room. In order to clear the room, the board adjourned.

Wyming Politics.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 3.—A bombshell was exploded Friday in the ranks of the Republicans when Governor-elect Joe Osborne went to the capitol building, took the oath of office, and took possession of the governor's office. The oath of office was administered by a notary public in the presence of A. L. New, chairman of the Democratic state committee and half a dozen personal friends. Immediately after taking the office, Governor Osborne issued a proclamation saying: "Having been duly elected by the qualified voters of the state of Wyoming, and there being no board of state canvassers authorized to canvass the returns and declare the result of said election for governor, I am legally qualified as governor, and I call upon all citizens to aid me in enforcing the laws." Governor Osborne notified the secretary of state and auditor and treasurer that the canvass of the state vote would be commenced on Monday next. These officials, however, refuse to recognize his authority and will not act with him on the canvassing board. They claim that the action of Governor Osborne will compel an immediate canvass of the vote of the state, and that the result will be in their favor.
