all in one payment."

conservative business management and

No Australian Ballot.

The chairman of the Republican and Democratic city committees being in some doubt as to whether the city election next Monday should be held according to Australian ballot law or in the old manner, took counsel and obtained the opinion given below. According to this the election will be held in the old way.

THE OPINION.

"At your request we submit our opinion of the manner of conducting the city election on next Monday. We readily agree that said election must be held and conducted by force of charter of said city, which power is conferred on the city by section 4 of said charter, which leaves the city to execute the power by appropriate ordinance. The general law of the state governing elections has no application to the said city election. We think also that under the ordinance passed by the council that it is competent for each political organization to prepare its ballots or tickets in a manner to suit the notions of the persons having control of its management, or the voter may prepare his own ballot to issue himself, in each of which cases the vote cast would be valid and must be counted. Respectfully submitted, Timon Ford, W. H. Holmes."
