Opinion by Bean, J. A. N. King, appellant, vs. J. P. Brigham, et al., respondents, appeal from Multnomah county; judgment of the lower court affirmed. Opinion by Lord, C. J. Gordon vs. Breidenstine et al.; exceptions to cost bill denied. Motions for rehearing granted, in the cases of Philomath college vs. E. C. Wyatt et al., and First National bank of Arlington vs. N. Cecil. Motions for rehearing denied in the following cases: Johnson vs. Oregon Short Line Railway Co.; Haley vs. Bevis et al.; and the King Real Estate association vs. the City of Portland.
