Reception and Refreshments for Business Men this Evening.

The committee in charge of this latest popular move to spread their work, yesterday sent invitations as follows:

SALEM, ORE., Dec. 12, 1892. You are cordially invited to be present at the Banquet to be given by the Young Men's Christian Association, to the business men of Salem, at the Association Rooms, 250 Commercial street, at 8 o'clock, Wednesday evening, December 14, 1892.

Several hundred were issued to representative business and professional men, and Sec. Wetherbee and a force of assistants have been at work for the past two days putting their elegant quarters in order for the event. It is expected that such connoisseurs of good grub as Timon Ford, Dr. Keene, Capt. Wm. Martin, John G. Wright, Ed. Cross, Rev. Kellerman, Mayor D'Arcy, Jap Minato, J. J. Dalrymple, Judge Burnett, General Odell, Prof. Hawley, and others who are not afraid to tackle a big nine o'clock spread will be on hand. There are to be toasts, gymnastics and a general good time and getting acquainted with the boys and their methods of work. The Y. M. C. A. is an institution that has sprung up in a startling way, but its good work should be spread still wider.

The aim has been to invite every business man in the city. If any have been overlooked, it is not the intention of the Committee to have it considered as a slight or omission, as all Salem business men who can come are cordially invited to be present and participate.

SALEM CHURCH MATTERS. Congregational Annual Meeting—a Memorial Church. Last evening the First Congregational society of Salem held its annual meeting at the church parlors. A good attendance was present and Deacon Jos. Cooke was called to the chair.

Secretary W. A. Moores read the minutes of the previous meeting, which, after a short discussion, were approved.

The annual reports of the different officers were received and considered. Under the head of election of officers the names of H. P. Keller and C. T. Roberts were proposed for clerk, and the latter was chosen. T. Holverson and C. M. Parmenter were named for trustees to succeed C. M. Talbot, who has removed from the city. Mr. Parmenter withdrew, and Mr. Holverson was unanimously chosen. Wm. Adair, M. A. Beutley and R. B. Duncan were chosen deacons. Gilbert Bros. were re-elected treasurers.

For Superintendent of the Sunday school F. M. Gilbert was chosen, W. J. Staley as assistant. Percy Willis was elected secretary, and William Stalger assistant. Chester Parvin was chosen librarian, Chester Murphy and Boyd Richardson, assistants.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

A MEMORIAL CHURCH. Robert Harrison some time since deposited \$750 in the hands of a local committee of the M. E. church as administrator of the estate of his sister, Miss Susan Harrison, deceased, who was a graduate of Williamette university and was drowned at Jefferson in 1886. With what can be obtained from the church extension fund a handsome building can be erected. No location has been selected but the church committee are prepared to receive proposals from any of the suburbs of the city.

THE KELLOW PARDON.—The Statesman this morning in its news items says the pardon of Kellow was on recommendation by the district attorney, and in justice to that officer, who secured his conviction, be it stated that such is not the case. Kellow was convicted and sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary by Judge Burnett but his Attorney J. J. Daly and the jury thought the punishment excessive. The whole jury who tried the case, the people present at the trial and the attorneys who heard the case tried, petitioned the governor for his full pardon and it was granted. From what can be learned of the matter Gov. Penney never did a more righteous act than he did in pardoning Kellow as he has a family of small children, and was only charged with stealing a calf.

J. J. Daly returned to Dallas today, after attending to some legal business in the capital city.

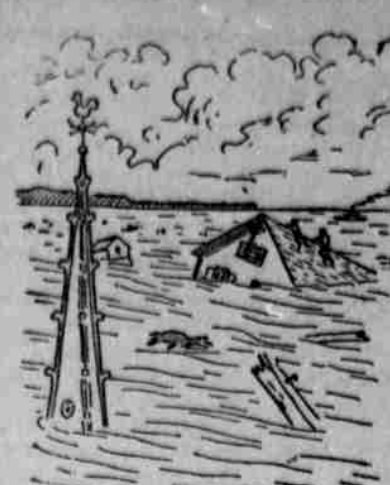
