FALLS FROM STATE HOUSE.

A School Boy Drops Three Stories—Still Alive.

Today during the noon hour several school boys were playing on the third floor of the state capitol, and while sliding on the upper rail, Paul Buettner, the 15 year old son of Fred Buettner, lost his balance and fell to the basement. It is believed that he struck on the intervening balustrade while falling as his body is badly bruised up.

J. H. Howell found the boy a moment after he fell, and immediately called Dr. Reynolds, and then with assistance carried him into the state printing office. When the doctor reached him in about 20 minutes the boy was conscious, but nearly exhausted. On close examination it was found that his head was cut, but it is not thought that any bones are broken.

The boy soon went to sleep and rested quite comfortably. He was taken to his father's home in Simpson's addition this afternoon, and not much fear of his death is apprehended.

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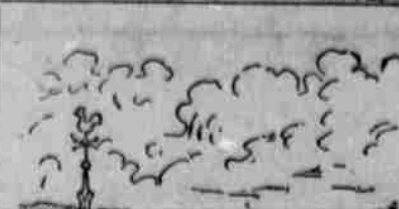

SILVER LEGISLATION.

Skirmishing in Anticipation of a Coming Struggle.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The silver and anti-silver men in the house engaged in a light skirmishing in anticipation of a failure of the Brussels International conference, from which the members say they expected nothing. Each side is now endeavoring to learn something of the purposes and views of the other side. Talks with free-silver men and avowed opponents of the present Sherman law show it is believed to be unlikely that anything will be done at this session, either in the way of a repeal of the Sherman law or the enactment of more radical silver legislation. Yesterday the house coinage committee held the regular day set for the consideration of the Williams bill to repeal the Sherman law. Williams, its author, was not present, and the bill went over. There was a very informal general discussion of the silver question. A proposition was put forward in a rather indefinite shape that an opportunity be given in the house for a vote on the repeal of the Sherman law. The free-coinage men are not unwilling that this should be done, but in order to preserve their present parliamentary advantage suggested that the method by which to accomplish this was to take up the Bland bill, which at the last session was finally displaced by a few dilatory motions, after the speaker found it necessary to cast the deciding vote on the bill. Bland and Pierce, leaders of the free-silver section of the Democratic party in the house, expressed a willingness to give the other side an opportunity to offer the Williams and other bills as amendments to the Bland silver bill, provided on their part the anti-silver men would agree to let the house come to a vote on the question of the free coinage of silver and other propositions more favorable to the extended use of silver currency than the present law. Tracy and Taylor, of Illinois, without committing themselves, were inclined to this view. The committee adjourned without action, however. It is thought that if the committee were to agree unanimously upon some recommendation to the house, support of rules committee could be obtained to a resolution making the silver bill the special order, but nothing in the past history of the committee warrants the conclusion that it will be able to act harmoniously and as a unit in the consideration of silver legislation in the house.
