SHOULD BE REPEALED.

The next legislature will be asked to repeal the law requiring bicyclists to dismount one hundred yards from a team. It is settled everywhere that bicycles have as much right on the roads as any other vehicles. The English law on the subject is a reasonable one: Every bicyclist who overtakes any wagon, or cart, or other carriage, or any horse, or any foot passenger proceeding along the carriage way, shall, when within a reasonable distance before passing such, by sounding a horn, bell, or whistle, give audible warning of the approach of his bicycle. Every bicyclist who overtakes and passes any wagon, cart, or other carriage, or any horse, shall keep his bicycle to the right or off side of the road. In every case where a bicyclist meets or overtakes any horse which may become restive, such bicyclist shall take every reasonable precaution, to the best of his judgment, by dismounting or otherwise, so as to avoid danger. Any person who breaks any of the foregoing laws is liable for any one offense to a fine not exceeding \$10.

A Five Prize Winner for Christmas Beef.

There was placed on exhibit this afternoon at 1 p. m. in front of E. C. Cross's State street market a full blood Durham prize-winning heifer from the Broadmead farm of Ladd & Reed, near Portland. The weight of this majestic beef is exactly 2253 lbs. This is the first arrival of a big invoice of the fat of the land offered by Mr. Cross for the annual Christmas display at his several markets in Salem. The show this year will surpass any previous record, as this prize animal is superior to any ever shown here, and is pronounced by competent judges the finest and best fat beef ever shown on the Pacific coast. In addition to this animal, which will be shown every day for a week, from one to three p. m., there are two more from the same farm, a carload of choice stall fed steers from Southern Oregon, thirty-five fat sheep, hogs, pigs, and calves without number. HAWAIIAN NEWS.

A Tacoma and Honolulu Steamer Line to Be Established.

HONOLULU, Dec. 15.—No disturbance in the political affairs of Hawaii has occurred since the last mail steamer left Honolulu. The new ministry still remain in office, no effort having yet been made to remove them. The legislature will apparently continue in session until after Christmas.

Marshal Wilson still holds his position, and efforts to remove him have ceased. Several of his subordinates, however, were discharged by a direct request of the cabinet.

The subsidy for the Oceanic Steamship company has passed at \$30,000 for the term extending from March 31, 1892, to March, 1894. An additional subsidy of \$6,000 is passed to be given to another line that will touch at Hilo, Hawaii, en route to Honolulu, to San Francisco.

Hawaii will be represented at the world's fair by her famous band, \$12,000 having been appropriated, which sum will be increased by receipts from concerts given abroad. Colonel G. W. McFarlane and Hon. L. A. Thurston go forward by the steamer Australia on business connected with a \$1,000,000 suit here, in which Claus Speckels is interested. They will confer with Speckels in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 16.—By the steamer Australia, which arrived from Honolulu, it is learned that W. E. Simpson, general manager of the Puget Sound and Hawaiian Traffic Company has reached Honolulu, and will shortly complete arrangements for the establishment of a steamship line between Tacoma and Honolulu. A first-class steamship will be put on about February 1 next.

Big Drive.

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 16.—Early in May Frank Fordyce, a young stock baron, will attempt to drive from the center of this state to Ogallah, Neb., 45,000 sheep, a distance of 1,000 miles. The trip will occupy six months. The sheep will have to cross the Rocky mountains in the wildest part, and will have to ford scores of small streams.

Cholera.

PANAMA, Dec. 16.—In consequence of official news that cholera has broken out again in Hamburg, the Columbian government has closed this country's ports against all vessels having left Hamburg after December 10th.

Tobacco Growers Speak.

MARION, Fla., Dec. 16.—The Florida Tobacco Growers association organized here yesterday and passed resolutions reciting that the tobacco industry of Florida can only be maintained by a continuance of the present tariff on leaf tobacco, and calling on congress not to change it. The association is made up largely of Democrats.

Money Market.

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—Speculation in the stock exchange turns upon the strength of the market for sterling exchange, the continued export of gold to Europe, and the flurry in the money market. On top of the shipment of half a million today came reports that \$2,700,000 would be shipped by Saturday steamers and anywhere from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 next week. Money lenders began to draw in loans and caused money to jump suddenly from 4 1/2 to 5 per cent. Many firms had loans called, and had to await their arrangements, thus precipitating a stringency for which brokers are in instances quite unprepared. The holders of railway and industrial shares on slender margins showed great anxiety to reduce ventures, and of course there is no lack of manipulation for the purpose of helping the decline along.
