HOLIDAY GOODS.

Nervous Prostration.

General Porter gave a high credit to the soldierly conduct of the National Guard during the Buffalo strike. The excellent showing made by officers and men he attributes largely to the system of instruction at Peekskill, which he believes is superior to any other. In view of the admirable service of the National Guard at Buffalo it is little less than disgraceful that proper equipment should be denied them by the legislature. The Empire state is great enough and rich enough to provide her military forces with the best modern arms and equipments.—New York Press.

If the Oregon legislature does not make an appropriation sufficient to pay its debts and its living expenses it might as well abolish the Oregon National Guard. There is nothing that returns less for the investment than a poorly maintained military establishment.

FROM ONE OF OUR LEGISLATORS.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—During the canvass last June the question of how to make a better assessment and taxation law seemed to be uppermost in the mind of every voter in Marion County; and I doubt if any man could have been elected to the legislature who would have declared himself opposed to the repeal of the clause allowing exemption for indolence. The practical working of the present law has been a source of unmitigated evil to the state, has placed the burden of taxation on those least able to bear it, and has offered a premium for perjury. The first thing then is to repeal this clause; then to tax all property in the state of whatever kind or name and for the purpose of taxation it should be valued at its full market value. There is nothing gained by a low valuation. If the valuation is lowered then the rate must be increased in the same ratio. If it is desired to favor the poor and those in moderate circumstances, the amount of property exempt from taxation should be increased. A team, one or two cows, farming implements, and something to apply on the homestead should be exempt from taxation. In town and city the house and lot to the value of 10 or 12 hundred dollars should be exempt. The rich will always object to an income tax. If they are to be excused then surely the poor are entitled to a fair exemption. The law thus amended, then some way should be devised to compel the assessors to strictly carry out the provisions of the law. No one but the owner or his agent should give to the assessor a list of property to be assessed when the owner or agent can be found by him. The assessor should require such person to make oath to the correctness of his statements and sign the oath; he has taken in his (the assessor's) presence. If it should come to the knowledge of the assessor that he has sworn falsely or kept back what he should have returned then the assessor should prosecute him to the extent of the law. Another question: How to secure a uniformity of valuation of property by the different assessors of the state? How is it that a mortgage is worth 100 cents on the dollar for the purpose of taxation in one county, and but 50 cents in another? An animal is assessed at 75 dollars in one county and one of the same or equal value at 50 dollars just across the line in another. I have thought that the State Board of Equalization might be empowered to fix a maximum and minimum valuation on different kinds and classes of property and every assessor be required to fix his valuations inside those limits. As THE JOURNAL has declared itself an advocate of a change in the assessment law these thoughts are submitted and are of course open to criticism.
