Shelton, president, \$438.60; J. P. Robertson, \$300.00; L. Bilyeu, \$314.40; H. E. Hayes, \$313.20; W. H. Hughes, \$393.40; C. Hughes, \$425.20; C. G. Schramm, \$331.20; J. M. Carroll, secretary, \$1640.00; W. S. Wallis, clerk, \$740.05; G. Schramm, page, \$120.00; total cost of board, \$5005.80. The president of the old board put in two days at Portland, got his partner in for secretary, who put in a bill for nearly a half year's work. The board cost the state over five thousand dollars and there is not even a printed report to show for it. That's the way the money goes in Oregon, and all Democrats, too.

THAT ROAD SOUTH.—A persistent effort has been made in the columns of THE JOURNAL for the improvement of the road leading south from this city past Rural Cemetery. It is in a horrible condition and funerals have to go around on by streets and through fields to reach the city of the dead.
