NEW COUNCIL.—The work of the city council will be closed by a regular meeting when the new officials will take the oath of office and the new city government will be initiated. Claude Gatch will succeed Mayor Peter H. D'Arcy, and Ed. N. Edes will step into the shoes of Recorder Goodell, as scribe of the council and police magistrate. Marshal Minto succeeds himself. The mayor's address will probably be short, business-like and to the point. A street commissioner and city engineer are to be elected and city attorney. The police will have to be re-elected upon recommendation of the marshal. The action of the council in all matters pertaining to expenditures will probably await the report of the new ways and means committee.

FOR READING CLERK.—M. Clay Starr of Salem is candidate for reading clerk of the house of representatives, with good assurances of support from his home delegation. He is a competent man for the place, being a good reader, not too fast, and well-informed on all subjects of legislation. He would never have to stop to spell out words nor pronounce them in Chinook jargon when good English would do just as well. And that is the kind of man legislators want in that position.

RESIGNED.—Adjutant General R. W. Mitchell has annulled the order vacating the commission of Capt. W. C. Alderson, of Co. C, 2d regiment, O. N. G. Captain Alderson's resignation has been accepted, taking effect November 15th. The resignation of Capt. Harold B. Fiske, of Co. H, has also been accepted, taking effect December 19th.

SUPREME COURT.

Two important decisions handed down on Monday: H. H. Miller, appellant, vs. Geo. W. McBride et al., respondents, appeal from Marion county judgment of the lower court affirmed. Opinion by Bean, J.

According to this decision printing the name of the Elector Pierce in two places on the official ballot is held to be improper and illegal by a majority of the court, but the decision is in favor of Pierce on the theory followed in nearly all such cases that the intention of the voter must prevail. Pierce, the fusion candidate will be declared elector.

In E. M. Croisan vs. O. P. Ry. Co., Benton county will recover about \$3,000 and Marion about \$6,000.

THE STATE TAX RAISERS.

Another Discrimination in Favor of Stock and Bond Holders.

The State Board of Equalization, which has been performing various surgical operations upon the tax rolls as returned from several counties, have in vulgar phrase lanced several intestines, if they have not eviscerated the whole they are called to deal with.

THERE IS NO EVIDENCE whatever before the State Board to warrant such a general increase of valuations, beyond perhaps a desire to do something to make a showing and earn their salaries. This point was made in Monday's JOURNAL and is clearly set forth in

MR. GIBSON'S PROTEST

The following was read to the board and placed on file by the member from this district:

To state board of equalization:

The undersigned, a member of the state board of equalization, hereby protests against 30 per cent. being added to assessment of Linn and Yamhill counties on city and town lots; against the adding of 10 per cent to the assessment of Linn, Marion, Polk, Yamhill and Tillamook counties on agricultural lands; also farther protest against adding 20 per cent to Polk county and 30 per cent to Yamhill county on improvements.

My reason for this protest is that the state board of equalization had not evidence before them showing that assessors and county boards of equalization of said counties have failed in making a just assessment and equalization.

PERSONAL PROPERTY.

Mortgages were "equalized" by being raised to 100 cents on the dollar in all counties. They were returned from all the counties at that figure except Clackamas 50 per cent, Douglas 25, Multnomah 50, Union and Wasco 75. In Gilliam no mortgages were returned. The assessment of moneys, notes, accounts, stocks, shares, bonds, etc., were allowed to stand as returned, and it is exactly this class of property that is returned at almost nothing.

A CORPORATION SCHEME.

A prominent state official says: "The action of the board seems to have been had on the theory that a raise must be made, whether necessary or not, so horizontal elevations were ordered on lands, lots, cattle and improvements. They had to follow the action of last year's board and put all mortgages at face value, which most of the counties had done already. The class of property which notoriously escapes taxation they let stand. The holders of stocks and bonds in all private corporations have reason to be satisfied."

ASYLUM AFFAIRS.

Report of Supt. Rowland—Investigation Ordered.

Supt. Rowland filed his monthly report for December, Monday. It shows what changes were made in employees, and statistics of patients: 29 received during month; 84 under care and treatment; 5 discharged, 5 died; officers and employees 86; per capita expense monthly \$11.266 daily expense .563.

AN INVESTIGATION

has been ordered by the committee on the Asylum of the State Board of Charities, as advertised in THE JOURNAL. They are a proper body to examine into the alleged scandals, in the opinion of public men. Their sessions will be held at the asylum, and will probably not be public. It is not known whether they have any right to inquire into the conduct of employees when not on duty.

WHAT OFFICIALS SAY.

The governor and treasurer, who are members of the board of asylum trustees were seen today and this was learned: The trustees have already examined the whole matter individually, and are each satisfied that no foundation exists for the charge that patients have been tampered with. A man named Huntley who was employed as a painter in the fall got into the room of one of the patients and hid under the bed. He had been closely watched and was promptly kicked out, having been found there by Dr. Griffith but not believed to have been in the room long enough to accomplish his purpose. This man disappeared, although, there was considerable pay due him for which he has never called. This indicates his guilty conduct, although his crime if any, can only be proven by an insane person.

A Hermit with a Telephone.

A little ditch marks the line beyond which Samuel Dutcher cannot go. The home of Dutcher is a rough redwood hut not far from the infirmary of Alameda county. He lives alone, more severely alone than any hermit. No person is permitted to cross the ditch, and Dutcher is prohibited from approaching within thirty yards of any person who addresses him from the border marked by the little waterway. Conversation must be conducted by shouts.

His meals were sent from the infirmary and placed on a box some distance from the hut. The waiter then scurries back to the infirmary, and Dutcher walks to the box and takes the mush and molasses or the stew and the coffee from the box and has a solitary feast. Not entirely without company is this solitary recluse. Three puppies play about his cabin and feed from the scraps from his meals. They are owned by a Portuguese rancher who lives in the foothills. They found the hut of the lonely man, and as he plays with them and feeds them they spend most of the time with him and provide society for him. But for the dogs he would have no company.

He is to have a telephone. A kind hearted minister who conducts services at the infirmary has asked that the hut and the chapel be connected by wire. Then on Sunday mornings Dutcher may sit in his cabin and participate in the services, a congregation of one in his little hut. The telephone might have other uses than to transmit the words of worship and praise. It would provide means for sending word if Dutcher becomes seriously ill, and people might talk with him and relieve some of the monotony of his life. Dutcher is a leper.—San Francisco Examiner.
