**THE GOOD BOOK.**—The regular annual business meeting of the Marion county Bible society was held Friday night, when officers were elected for the ensuing year as follows: Rev. At the Salem depository during the year the sale of books amounted to \$41.50, and collections taken up aggregated \$17.65.

**PEOPLE'S PARTY.**—The Oregon People's party and alliance held a convention at Oregon City the past week and the leaders came up to Salem last night. Elector Pierce, Geo. Weeks, Senator Vanderberg, several representatives are in the city. W. H. Spangh of Harrisburg was made chairman of the State Central committee. A barrel of resolutions were passed and will be worked into some bills. The People's party has some representatives in each house of the legislature, but in neither branch do they constitute a balance of power, or possess more than individual strength, but they have the right to vote for good bills and kill bad ones.

**WILL RESUME PRACTICE.**—Judge R. P. Boise is fitting up a law office, at 270 Commercial street in the building occupied by Boise & Barker, and will again resume the active practice of his profession. Perhaps no man in Oregon has had more to do with making and constructing law for this state than Judge Boise. He was in the constitutional convention that gave us our organic law and was chairman of its committee on judiciary. He was also in several of the early legislatures, and has for many years past been constructing law in the many different shapes in which it can present itself. He will certainly make a safe counselor.

**THE ELECTORS.**—Governor Penoyer has sent to Washington the certificates of election of John F. Caples, Daniel M. Dunne, Geo. M. Irwin and Nathan Pierce, presidential electors of this state, and they are to meet at the state house Monday to organize the electoral college and cast their ballots. Hon. Geo. M. Irwin will probably be sent to Washington to cast the vote of this state.

### ELECTRIC LINE EXTENSIONS.

**Motor Railway Lines Going South and East This Spring.**

The Salem Motor Railway Co. have a force of men at work extending the track for a two mile extension south to Morning Side addition and beyond to Battle Creek. It is the intention of the company to have the cars running south as early in the spring as the tracks can be put down. People out on the Catholic cemetery hills are looking for an extension of the consolidated Capital City Ry. Co. to the south at an early day.

**EX-SHERIFF ROBINSON CRUSOE RAMSAY** returned to Silverton this morning. He was also once county assessor. He says the Salem and Silverton motor line should be built and would be a brightening for Salem. As it is, there is practically no communication between Salem and Silverton. It takes a full day to come or go, the way trains run, while Silverton people can go to Portland, do considerable business and return the same day. There is considerable inquiry for lands adjacent to Salem on probable lines of extension from this city of a motor line. There is great likelihood of a big railroad enterprise being sprung on Salem and vicinity in a few days. It is a transcontinental affair, but we cannot overestimate the value of motor lines into Marion, Polk or Yamhill counties. They are of far greater importance to the laborer in the city and the gardener, farmer and fruit grower outside.

**POINTERS PICKED UP AMONG THE CANDIDATES AND MEMBERS—THE WILLAMETTE HOTEL LOBBY IS A SEETHING MASS OF POLITICS.**  
J. M. Stott, sergeant-at-arms of the house is again in the field.  
Frank C. Middleton is candidate for the senate desk—chief clerk this time. He has been in various capacities in the legislature and has the experience to make a good officer.  
Senator Cogswell proposes to disband the Oregon National Guard and enlist the candidates for railroad commissioner instead. He thinks they would form a larger contingent.  
Clackamas county has two able and energetic young senators—Hayes and Cross.  
J. L. Swafford, of Oregon City, is candidate for senate doorkeeper. He is a brother of City Treasurer Swafford of Salem.  
J. H. McCormick of Salem is again candidate for doorkeeper of the senate. He made an acceptable official two years ago and stands on his record to get there.  
The army of candidates for pages and messengers besieges the hotel lobby and crowds around the doors of members' rooms, making it fairly hot. Master Fontaine approached a senator this morning saying his father was a Democrat, but that he understood all these men were Republicans and politics did not cut any figure in the matter anyhow. That had will be a great politician some day.  
The fight over the speakership is waxing quite personal. "Mr. Keedy, the Portland candidate, is a rustler" said an old Oregonian. "He don't believe in waiting until the round-up to brand cattle."

**IN THE LEGISLATIVE LOBBY.**  
Pointers Picked Up Among the Candidates and Members—The Willamette Hotel Lobby is a Seething Mass of Politics.

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Hon. W. P. Keedy says to THE JOURNAL that he is in favor of all legislation to open the rivers to Oregon commerce, and that he is heartily for a state portage railway at The Dalles. He is a candidate for speaker and this is a very important matter for members to consider.

The legislature will probably meet at 10 o'clock Monday, January 9, and effect a temporary organization. It will then adjourn to hold the caucuses of the respective houses and meet to organize permanently in the afternoon.

The Governor's message will not be ready for the legislature before Tuesday or Wednesday. He returns to Salem this evening.

Indications are (as the JOURNAL goes to press) that Senator Hirsch will be elected president of the senate.
