SCHOOL BOOKS REFORM.

The Minnesota Plan is Proposed by Miller of Linn.

Representative Miller of Linn county is a druggist and bookseller of over ten years experience. On his canvass he proposed a state school book plan which met with so much favor that he pledged himself to introduce a bill providing this reform. Mr. Miller is a graduate of State University and was a successful school teacher for many years. He knows what he is talking about when you touch him on the subject of school books.

MILLER'S SCHOOL BOOK BILL.

This bill introduced by Miller of Linn provides for compilation of a series of schoolbooks consisting of three readers, one speller, one arithmetic, one grammar, one history of United States and one geography. The books are to be published by the state, and the state, county and school district authorities are required by this law to enforce the use of them. They are to be distributed from the office of the state treasurer to all dealers at cost and shall be sold at retail at not more than ten per cent profit. \$20,000 is appropriated to cover expenses of compiling and editing books, or so much thereof as may be needed; a \$50,000, or as much as needed, for printing and distribution of books. The expense of publication will become a fund that will go right back into the state treasury. The contract for publishing the books is to be let to the lowest responsible bidder, and prices fixed when the bill is accepted. This shall be in effect for four years and at end of four years to be submitted to vote of people whether to be continued or not. The bill is modeled after the Minnesota law which has proven successful in a high degree.

He was seen on the floor of the house today and made the following statements on the subject: "I found the people in my county very much interested in the subject and when the votes were counted I led the rest of the ticket and am satisfied that it was my views on state school books that gave me a big vote of all parties. The first reading book that in Oregon costs parents 25 cents is supplied in the state of Minnesota at 10 cents. The people of Oregon pay 100 to 200 per cent more for all their school books than do the people of some other states. The books sold throughout the county districts are poor in quality and inferior in matter. The children are now required to have five readers, three different language books, five different books on physiology, and the average child is forced to carry on eight studies and is loaded down with too many books and theories. All this is done to further the interests of the school book syndicate. The expense of school books is an outrage upon the people of this state and should be abolished. I have set my heart on this scheme and believe the children of the poorer people would be benefited incalculably by the Minnesota system. The people have been robbed long enough in the name of education by the school book trust of this state."

OLD AND YOUNG.—A marriage license has been issued to Etta Kirkland and George A. Roff. The parties live near Brooks. Also to Mrs. E. E. Vazey and M. Beatty. The latter groom is over seventy and the bride is considerably younger.

NOTES FROM STATE HOUSE.

The tug of war on the clerkships has not yet come.

The proposition to have the state invest in electric dynamo is not in the line of economy. The state partially operates the present plant through a contract with Thomas Holman. Now a separate plant entirely operated by the state is proposed. It is not a success either way, although Mr. Holman is doing all in his power to make the old contract good. The state cannot run an electric light plant in competition with private effort.

The legislature could make a short cut of all the motions to invite honorables, ex-honorables and some dishonorables within the bar of the house by printing a resolution and hanging it up at the bar saying who should come in. Then the records would not be cumbered.

The vote of the people is to be enlarged. Mr. Geer's bill to have the railroad commission elected by direct vote of the people, and Miller's resolution to elect senators by popular vote are in that direction.

The governor's message is read by people with a great deal of interest. It contains enough good suggestions to give legislators of all parties food for thought and lines of action if they will but prepare bills to carry it out. Much of the message might be criticised, but that can be said of nearly every public document. If the governor has made mistakes, the people will overlook them in the general belief in the honesty of his intentions. The good that men do will live after them. The evil dies with them. But Penoyer is not dead yet.

A. M. Elam, of Milton, was here yesterday looking up the question of the division of Umatilla county. Delegations of senators and representatives of Umatilla met and informed him that they could support no measure to that end.

Rep. McEwan got a motion through yesterday which increases standing committees from 24 to 25, by creating a labor committee, to consider all bills affecting labor organizations.

A bill has been introduced by Stone of Umatilla incorporating town of Adams.

G. W. Davis, clerk of the state board of school land commissioners, reports sales of land and receipts from different funds of \$230,629.38. Of this \$201,293.39 is school fund principal and interest. Total number of acres of land disposed of, 122,249. These figures are for time between Aug. 1, 1891, to Dec. 31, 1892, one year and five months.

THE ROSE-CARTER CASE.

After the continuance granted by Judge Edes in the Recorder's court, in Rose, alias Carter, under arrest here as a fugitive, his attorneys appeared before County Judge Hubbard and asked a writ of habeas corpus; that Rose is restrained of his liberty by Sheriff Knight, the claim being made that such detention is illegal for the reason that Rose is not the man Carter, who is wanted in Missouri to be hanged for murder; that his name is and has always been R. C. Rose; that he has never been guilty of the crime of murder and has never in his life been in Missouri. The court, upon reading and filing the application, the circuit judge being absent from the county, and it satisfactorily appearing that good cause exists for inquiring into the circumstances of the detention of the petitioner, ordered that a writ of habeas corpus do issue as prayed for, and that John Knight as sheriff, produce the body of R. C. Rose before the court Thursday at 9 a. m., together with the cause of his detention, then and there to receive such determination as may be met in the premises.

Proceedings were had today in this case as follows: Before Judge Hubbard, continued to 9 a. m. Friday. Before Judge Edes, also continued.

Oregon Secular Union.

The fourth annual convention of the Oregon state secular union was called to order at the opera house Wednesday at 2 p. m. The meeting was called to order by the president, J. Henry Schroeder, of Arago, Coos county. Katie Kehm Smith, wife of Judge D. W. Smith, of Oregon City, opened the convention with remarks on "more perfect organization as demanded for the better advancement of its social and secular aims."

Hon. J. R. Charlesworth, secretary of the Freethought federation of America, of Chicago, was introduced and gave an address, setting forth the pressing need of thorough organization and concert of action on the part of all liberal people. Mr. Charlesworth ranks among the first Freethought orators of America.

C. B. Reynolds, secretary of the Washington state secular union, followed in a short address, setting forth the importance of organized effort. Judge Smith, C. B. Reynolds and Mr. Beatty were appointed a committee on order of business and the good of the organization. Convention adjourned until 10 a. m. Thursday.
