## French Socialists.

PARIS, Jan. 20. -Socialist leaders declare the Panama scandal is rapidly convincing the people of the necessity of a social revolution. They assert if they had money to contest seats in the chamber of deputies in all departments they could gain control of the country at the next election. Being able to make contest in only a few places, however, they will have 40 or more members, who, as a respectable independence of the khedive. minority to organisation, will enable them to sweep the country four years hence. Then a socialist regime will be put in force; the gov ernment will take possession of railroads, warehouses and farms, and increase wages and shorten hours. They deny any intention of using force to bring about the results
