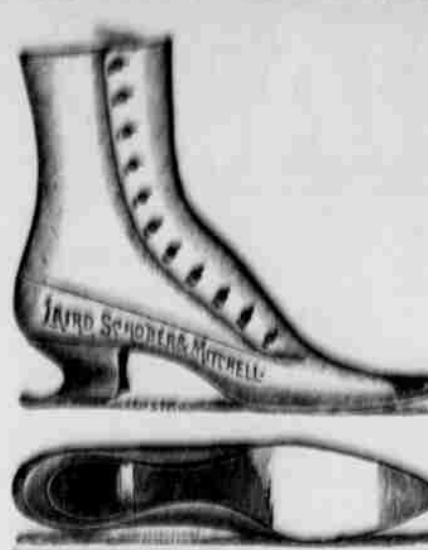

REAL ESTATE TRANSFERS.

NOTES FROM STATE HOUSE.

The house killed the bill to allow grocers and doctors to attach the last thirty days' earnings of a laborer who is in debt to them. It got only seventeen votes and a large vote was recorded against it. Representatives Ford and Upton made vigorous remarks against the bill and the house seemed to listen to them. They called it confiscation and that the bill would put it in power of any man who had a pique at another to loot him.

As the Morrow and Harney county representatives were coming toward town Saturday evening about 8 o'clock, they were about turning on High street when they noticed two gray horses attached to a lumber wagon coming "full speed" toward them. The representative from Morrow being quite active, jumped in front of the team. On seeing his representative dignity the horses turned out High street. The active Solon from Morrow not to be outdone followed at swift pace through mud and slush, reached the mud gate of the wagon box and swung himself aboard, supposing the lines were so he could get them and stop the team, when to his dismay he found them overboard on either side of the wagon tongue, but nothing daunted, climbed the pole between the excited horses, got the reins in his hands and soon brought the team to a stop and delivered them to the then very anxious owner, only a little worse for the wear, except a tired span of horses and a muddy representative with a few cents in his legislative suit which the grateful teamster offered to make good.

Rep. Ford has prepared for introduction a general incorporation bill, which should become a law. It is carefully drawn after the best acts of several other states and adapted to existing conditions in Oregon. It would leave special local charters stand as they are. The preparation of this bill involved a good deal of work, which Mr. Ford has performed well, and he deserves the thanks of the people for his labors. Such a bill would long ago have become a law but for the labor involved in its preparation.

Rep. King has received a great big bouquet of compliments from his home paper, which refers to the fact that he is the first representative from that county who has ever secured the passage of a bill for any thing but to change the name of a town.

Senator Looney is referred to by his friends as a possible candidate for railroad commissioner.

The Senate passed the Agricultural college appropriation bill unanimously almost every county voting for it except Clatsop. It will go through the House without a speech against it.

The Oregon National Guard appropriation bill will be special order in the Senate at 3 p. m.

The senate is engaged this afternoon discussing the Lawton tax bill, which has passed the house.

Governor Penney says he favors the repeal of the mortgage tax law, saying he never could see why such credits should be taxed.

The jute mill bill is occupying the attention of the house this afternoon.

NEW BOOKS AND MAGAZINES.

"Thoughts of Many Girls," from Oak Hill & Co., New York, is a helpful little volume dedicated to the many girls who are laborers in the factory, shop, office and home. It is written by girls who have perhaps little time for study, but plenty for thought, and who hope that before long all girls may learn to value and love "Practical Talks" as much as they do. The book includes the good and pure thoughts and practical helps of over fifty of the working girls' club of New York, which organization is for girls who are compelled to earn their own way in very early life. The little volume truly proves that girls who work can also think.

"The Old Mill Mystery," by A. W. Marchant, John A. Taylor & Co., New York, is a late number of the Mayflower library. In the narrative the author draws a mad horse victim into the course of true love. It is an intense story, and that is about the most that can be said for it.

"Spectacular Romances," by W. H. Ballou, (W. D. Rowland, New York,) is a collection of the author's best stories on the fables of modern society. The writer has a keen perception of the ludicrous, and makes some telling points against all prevailing shams. The various scenes of his tales evidence a broad range of experiences.

"A Confederate Spy," by Thos. A. Conrad (J. S. Ogilvie, New York,) is a true and thrilling story of the civil war. It relates the experience of the author as a spy in the Union lines, and of course he is the hero of his well told tales. At the end of the volume is given the "Johnny's" reason for thinking that Mrs. Surra should not have been hung, in which he throws severe blame onto the federal officials for their persistence in executing an "innocent woman."

"The Romance of a French Parsonage," by M. Betham Edwards (Lovell, Gostefeld & Co., \$1.25) opens with a bright description of Paris about the Eiffel Tower, contrasting different peoples and their church goings. The story is written in an easy style, and the author brings out many great good ideas in the different scenes introduced. His picture of the Huguenot home is one worthy of emulation in any land. These homely, hard-working Huguenots had ample store of stout homespun, simple and cordials. They wanted no fine ladies crossing their threshold unannounced, agog for courtesies and subservient outpourings. Every man sat under his own vine and fig tree and owned the roof that sheltered him. Laborious and frugal as was the general lot, it was one of content and independence. Charity, in other words, almsgiving, had here no work to do.

"Riland Graeme, Knight," by Agnes M. Macfar, (Foris, Howard & Hulbert, New York, \$1.00,) is purely an American story touching upon the labor problem, dedicated to Lyman Abbott, one of the first voices in America to enforce the relation of Christianity and the labor problem. Mill owners and their families, mill hands and theirs, the needs and demands of "labor," and crude attempts to enforce them by strikes and violence; the power of the capitalist and different ways of its manifestations, both for evil and for good; discussions of matters social, religious, economic, musical, poetical, personal and otherwise, are introduced naturally, and at the best substance and adornment.

"Criminology," by Arthur Mac Donald, (Funk & Wagnalls, New York,) is a well classed text book on all forms of crime. The author has made a life study of the causes of crime and its prevention, being at present a specialist on education as related to the abnormal and weakling classes. U. S. bureau of education, Washington. The volume is intended for the benefit of societies devoted to the suppression of crime, and would make good supplementary reading for a criminal lawyer. It is no doubt scientifically correct, and a copy of it should be supplied the Oregon state board of charities.

"The Fallen Race," by Austyn Granville, is received from the press of F. T. Neely, Chicago. It is a utopian tale centered in Australia, and of a much higher rank than most of its kind written since the day Bulwer.
