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No GOLDBUG REPUBLICANISM WANTED.

There is great danger that the Republican party will become so identified with goldbugism that it will lose its political grip for years to come on the affairs of the nation. Those who have observed the tendency of the age agree that it lies in the direction of more direct responsibility to the people. Since years the people have been demanding an extension of our financial system by the general government to meet more nearly the necessities of commerce and the growth of the country. One of these demands has been for an adequate supply of legal tender fractional currency. All kinds of devices are invented to send silver through the mails. Every mail order department of any business will testify to the shifts resorted to in remitting sums of less than one dollar. Newspapers especially suffer from the inconvenience of this lack of fractional paper currency. There is woeful ignorance among the people on the subject of remitting money. People buy money orders and keep them, thinking they have remitted. They buy postal notes and send them in a registered letter. All this expense, trouble and loss could be avoided by a supply of good fractional paper currency. The Oregon legislature adopted a joint memorial to congress asking that fifty millions be issued for the convenience of the people.

Both houses adopted the memorial. Then came the order from the Portland goldbug order that it had better be reconsidered. And reconsidered it was. No one could give a good reason for so doing. There were plenty of good reasons for the measure. The house passed it without division. But in the senate in the name of the Republican party it had to be reconsidered and killed to stave off the demands of the goldbug. Not the slightest infringement of the single gold standard of politics will be tolerated, yet that very thing is a millstone about the neck of the party.

We do not believe the rank and file of the party want goldbug Republicanism. The rank and file of no party want goldbugism first, last and all the time, crammed down their throats. The election of one Populist after another to the United States senate from Republican states shows that the party has a future with such an absurd policy as is dictated to it by the single gold standard men. The party is now in a minority and out of power in every branch of the government of the United States, and it is our firm conviction that it will remain so until it rises from the worship of the golden calf and gives the people more nearly what they want.

THE ELECTION OF JUDGE ALLEN.

Omaha Bee: After the most protracted contest that has ever taken place in this state the legislature has elected W. V. Allen to succeed Algonson S. Paddock in the United States senate, for the term beginning on the 4th day of March next.

The selection of Judge Allen will in some degree be a disappointment to Republicans as well as Democrats. This is especially true of the business men of both parties, who regard the election of a populist with disfavor because of the radical and eccentric views held by the third party on the currency and other economic issues that tend to disturb commercial confidence and credits. This apprehension will, however, be dispelled by the fact that Judge Allen is not a hare-brained visionary or wild-eyed revolutionist. Quite the contrary, our new United States senator is well balanced, broad-minded and conservative. He is by nature and training a man who carefully deliberates upon every issue, and does not reach a conclusion until he has weighed both sides.

Senator-elect Allen, of Nebraska, said to the citizens of Lincoln after his election:

I cannot say to you at this time what my course will be. I will say to you, however, as I say today: that in all the great questions that may be presented in the senate for its action, so far as I am concerned they shall be examined carefully, conscientiously and with a full determination of knowing what my duty in the premises may be. I will examine them with the care that I would a question of law that was submitted to me, and after determining what my duty may be, I assure you that I shall have no hesitancy in voting my convictions.

WILL ABOLISH BULLFIGHTS.

The state legislature of Puebla has enacted a law abolishing bullfighting. One by one the different states are turning their backs on the past and its old traditions and customs. The relegating of bullfights to the past is an act which goes to show how earnest are the progressive men of the republic in their determination to abandon every

custom, no matter how deeply rooted, which in any way tends to retard the nation's advancement. An effort is being made to induce congress to abolish bullfighting in the federal district and territories. It is believed that such an action would cause all the other states to fall in line with Puebla. The reason there are no bullfights in the City of Mexico is wholly due to the local authorities, who, in the exercise of their power, refuse to permit them.
