The Democratic county central committee met yesterday at the parlors of the Willamette hotel and transacted considerable business. There was nearly every precinct in the county represented, and very enthusiastic were the feeling that prevailed when the following resolutions were carried almost unanimously.

Resolved, That we endorse the action of the state central committee in their endorsement of Governor Penneyer in refusing to furnish the state guns to be fired on inauguration day, and we further denounce the act as childish and ungrateful and beneath the dignity of the executive.

The party in Marion county is now under a complete and thorough state of organization and general satisfaction prevails over the future outlook.

DANGER IN PENCILS—Dr. R. S. Farum, of Detroit, says that the prevalence of the diphtheria among the school children of that city, among whom it has been making great ravages, is due to their using the same lead pencils. The schools furnish the children with pencils, and they are allowed to use no others. The pencils are distributed to them at the opening of the day's session, and collected in the evening. Of course the children seldom have the same pencil on two consecutive days. An average child using a lead pencil will put it in into his mouth a hundred times a day, and with the pencils going thus from mouth to mouth day after day, it is easy to see that great harm might result in the way of spreading contagion.

MAN INJURED.—J. F. Shoup, one of the proprietors of a livery stable on Ferry street, back of the postoffice, was kicked and severely injured by a horse while watering it. When found he was lying insensible at the heels of the horse which had injured him. His injuries were found to be a dangerous wound on the back of the head, and a deep cut on the right hand which were dressed by Dr. Byrd. He was resting well last night, and it is thought he will be all right in a short time.

A COOL HUNDRED THOUSAND.

The Trick By Which the O. N. G. Gets Two Appropriations.

General Commons is accredited with securing two appropriations for the Oregon National Guard at the hands of this legislature. The Gullixson bill giving them \$40,000 has passed both houses over the governor's veto. That is an unalterable fact. The Ford bill to give the National Guard \$60,000 in lieu of the mill tax also passed both houses. That gives the state militia a cool hundred thousand to operate with the coming two years. The governor cannot veto the Ford bill without restoring the mill tax of both the militia and State University, and adding considerably to what they will now receive. Ford claims there was an understanding that if he would increase the sum carried in his bill from fifteen thousand to thirty thousand a year, the governor's veto of the Gullixson bill should be sustained. But Gullixson and his friends went back on that and the result is a double appropriation through combinations.

When the matter came before the House yesterday, of passing the Gullixson bill over the veto Ford denounced it as being in bad faith and an outrage on the tax payers of this state.

Wilkins, relating to estimates for supplies for penitentiary; passed.

Gullixson, for equipment, etc., of the Oregon National guard, with the veto message of the governor; Ford opposed the bill, Geer of Clackamas, Gullixson, Paxton and Northrup spoke in favor of the same; the bill passed over the veto, 39 to 13.

Jeffreys, bill relating to condemnation of certain lands for water purposes; passed.

Nickell, changing time of Arbor day in public schools; passed.

Geer of Marion, providing for elementary text-books on agriculture and horticulture in public schools; passed.

Brown of Douglas, to provide a school for convicts at the penitentiary; passed.

Senate bill No. 50, providing that sheriffs, clerks and recorders shall be paid a yearly salary, and fixing the respective amounts; passed.

Nickell, to provide for recording sales of real property sold for recovery of delinquent taxes; passed.

Coun offered house joint resolution No. 29 for a committee of five to act with a like committee from Washington legislature on fisheries; adopted.

Day, amending school laws; indefinitely postponed.

Russell, regulating payment of salaries of circuit judges; passed.

Jeffreys, relating to sale of real property by administrators.

Northrup, to cure defects in certain deeds to real estate heretofore made; passed.

Ford gave notice of his intention to introduce a joint resolution to amend the constitution, etc.

7:30 P. M.

Manley, by unanimous consent, introduced a bill to authorize the bridge commission to issue bonds of the city of Portland to the amount of \$50,000, for the purpose of a free ferry at Albina; read three several times under suspension of the rules and passed unanimously.

Brown of Douglas by leave withdrew house bill 346.

On motion of Jeffreys the bill for a health officer at Newport was laid on table.

The same disposition was made of house bill 349, on motion of Gowen.

Wright of Marion, to regulate collection of notes, etc.; passed.

Northrup, to regulate the taking of acknowledgements of married women, extending the law to mortgages, etc.; passed.

Jeffreys asked unanimous consent to introduce a bill for protection of salmon in the Columbia, the same bill agreed on by the joint committee of the legislatures of Oregon and Washington. Upton objected.

Nichols, to promote the good behavior of convicts in the penitentiary. In the absence of the introducer, Mr. Paxton explained the objects of the bill; passed.

Imman, amending the mechanics' lien, law; passed.

On motion of Gill, house bill 317 was indefinitely postponed.

Senate joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution providing for election of supreme and circuit judges in district classes, was adopted.

Geer of Clackamas, to change the rates of interest, from 8 and 10 percent, to 6 and 8 percent. Mr. Geer moved to indefinitely postpone; motion lost; bill passed, 31 to 16.

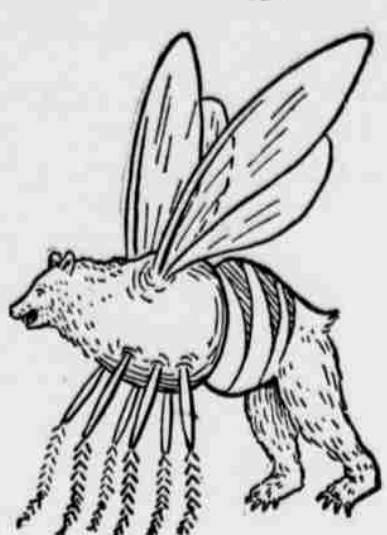

NOTES FROM STATE HOUSE.

The Republican caucus was not held Wednesday night. The ways and means committees of both houses met last night with Geo. W. McBride, Secretary of State, to complete the appropriation bill. It will probably be held tonight.

Hon. Sol. Hirsch of Portland, was an inter-stated visitor at the legislative halls yesterday.

There is a new combination on railroad commissioner about today, including Capt. Tuttle and an eastern Oregon Democrat.

House bill 216, introduced by Mr. Wilkins, (being identical with house bill 294, 1891,) providing for interchange of traffic between competing lines of railroads, has disappeared and cannot be accounted for. The record shows it was referred to the committee on railroads. A member of that committee says he knows nothing of the bill and Mr. Wilkins says the chief clerk has not the usual receipt for the bill. It is possible that the bill got slipped in with some other bill and sent to a wrong committee. It is certain that it has been telescoped somewhere.

There was considerable comment among members over the manner of adjournment Wednesday evening. The house was declared adjourned amid a storm of noise, and Geer of Clackamas declares that the adjournment was arbitrary. Others say it was all right. The house has been remarkably free from conflicts of any kind, and it is hoped the closing hours will not be marred by unpleasantness.

There are going to be hundreds of bills left on final passage. This morning there were fifty senate bills in the house on third reading, 18 on second reading, and 53 house bills on third reading, 5 on second reading, eighty odd in committee, and a score of senate bills on the table, besides what will be done by that body of a joint nature in the two days remaining. Close observers note the fact that there has been very little pushing of business on the part of anyone at this session, while there has been much of dilatory methods and time-killing.
