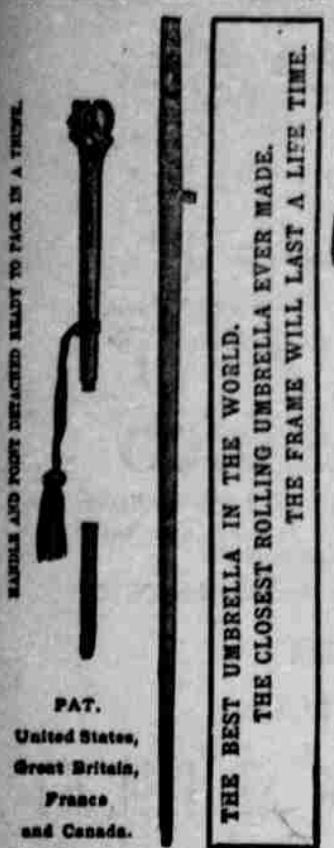

SUPREME COURT.

Hirsh, to establish a uniform standard of weights and measures; failed to pass.

Blackman, to increase the efficiency of the school for deaf mutes; Upton moved to recommit for amendment by striking out allowance of \$250 each to secretary of state and superintendent of public instruction; motion lost; the bill passed unanimously.

Gates, for relief of J. J. Hembree; passed.

Maxwell, providing for a health officer at Tillamook bay; Upton moved to recommit the bill for purpose of amendment, by including Port Orford, E. Lewisburg, Chetco, Bandon and Siuslaw; the motion was adopted.

Ger of Marion introduced a joint resolution directing the secretary of state to print 11,000 copies of the school laws for distribution; adopted.

Myers, introduced a joint resolution directing the secretary of state to compile and publish the laws relating to protection of fish and game, and the road laws for distribution; adopted.

Paxton introduced a concurrent resolution relating to marriage; adopted.

Adjournd to 9:30 tomorrow.

Brown of Douglas moved reconsideration of house bill 233, Guillemot militia appropriation bill; passed over governor's veto. Chair ruled out of order.

Woodard, to provide for recording wills; passed.

By Maxwell; salaries of county judges; tabled.

By Matlock, for location of branch insane asylum in Eastern Oregon; passed, 41 ayes.

Resolution relative to creating cabinet member for roads and highways; passed.

By Blackman, providing that State Board of Education be empowered to fix uniform series of text books and purchase same by wholesale, lost.

By Weatherford, consolidation into an independent district of all cities of 4000 or over and authorizing board of directors to establish free Kindergarten primary department in such cities; passed.

By Blackman, to require insurance companies to pay face of policy. Passed 41 ayes, 16 noes.

By Wright, chairman Ways and Means, general appropriation bill, read twice and referred to committee of whole, this afternoon.

THIRD READING HOUSE BILLS.

Geer's bill to regulate running at large of stock; passed.

Trullinger's to authorize Astoria to erect sea wall and to issue bonds; passed.

Merritt's to incorporate town of Rainier; passed.

Committee on elections reported following bills with recommendation that they do not pass, which were indefinitely postponed, Balknap's relative to general election laws; Baughman's time for holding elections; Meyer's qualification of voters.

Durham's bill for time for holding elections.

THIRD READING.

Day's bill to incorporate Grant's Pass; passed.

Judiciary committee recommended passage of Belt's bill relative to domestic animals; Brown's bill relative to employment of specialists in public schools.

Assessment committee recommended passage of Upton's bill relative to equalization of assessments.

Nickell to incorporate town of Jacksonville, passed.

Lambson, to incorporate town of Sheridan; passed.

Judiciary committee report favorably on Cross' bill providing for payment of salaries of sheriffs, and recorder; adopted.

Maloney, to incorporate town of North Yamhill; passed.

Federal Relations committee reported on Joint Memorial to Congress relative to maintaining a National Road department, adopted with amendments.

Brown's house bill on corporations and officers indefinitely postponed.

His Arrival in Missouri—Opinion of Oregon Officers.

THE JOURNAL is in receipt of papers from Aurora and Mt. Vernon, Mo., where R. C. Carter, alias Rose, who was held at Salem as a fugitive from justice, and taken back by Sheriff Wilson of that state, containing accounts of his reception there, where he is now in jail awaiting execution of his death sentence for murder, or commutation to life imprisonment.

Sheriff Wilson was in a train wreck on the way back and in an extended account the newspaper there reports one of the officers as saying: "We were royally treated by the officers at Salem, Chief Harry Minto and Police Captain Dilley. They are brave men and the people of Lawrence county should thank them for the interest they have taken in the case."

John S. Nive, charged with forgery, was released from custody after depositing \$500 in lieu of bail. His case will likely come up today.

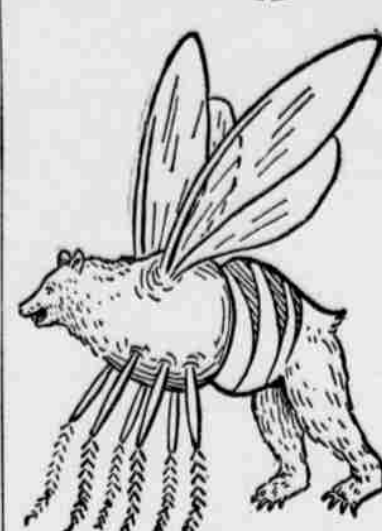
