First Formal Meeting to Arrange for Fair.

The state board of agriculture met Monday and adopted the following special program:

- TROTTLING AND PACING. 1-Yearling stake race, half mile, 2 in 3, \$100 added. 2-2 year-old stake race, 2 in 3, \$250 added.

CONDITIONS OF RACES.

In all purse races entries name and close on August 1st, entrance to be paid on or before 6 p. m. of the day of the race.

Coroner's Inquest Reveals Death From Natural Cause.

The death of S. C. Williams of Polk county was reported to Justice Batchelor this forenoon, and after notifying the coroner, held an inquest over the remains at the undertaking room of Olinger & Rigdon.

Deceased owns 15 acres of land in Polk county near Salem, where he lived alone. The past four years he has done considerable business in Salem.

EVIDENCE. Minnie McCaulley, got room at her lodging house on Front street yesterday, complained of being unwell, came to do business at bank, started to go home, fainted on bridge, came to my house, retired at 9 p. m., called him at 7:30 a. m., found him dead.

VERDICT. The jury composed of Geo. P. Saunders, D. H. Lafolette, Fred Hurst, D. F. Wagner, J. O'Donald, S. B. Watkins, found deceased was named Saxton C. Williams and his death came from natural cause.

Shaping Granite Columns. Granite for columns, balusters, round posts and urns is now worked chiefly in lathes, which, for the heaviest work, are made large enough to handle blocks 25 feet long and 5 feet in diameter.

Instead of being turned to the desired size by sharp cutting instruments, as in ordinary machines for turning wood and metal, granite is turned or ground away by the wedge-like action of rather thick steel disks, rotated by the pressure of the stone as it slowly turns in the lathe.

The disks, which are six or eight inches in diameter, are set at quite an angle to the stone and move with an automatic carriage along the lathe bed. Large lathes have four disks, two on each side, and a column may be reduced some two inches in diameter the whole length of the stone by one lateral movement of the carriage along the bed.

The first lathe for turning granite cut only cylindrical or conical columns, but an improved form is so made that templates or patterns may be inserted to guide the carriages, and columns having any desired swell may be as readily turned.

For fine grinding and polishing the granite is transferred to another lathe, where the only machinery used is to produce a simple turning or revolution of the stone against iron blocks carrying the necessary grinding or polishing materials.—Waverly Magazine.

Refeathered the Turkey.

A curious incident occurred on one of Admiral Farragut's frigates when the fleet entered Mobile bay. It is related by an officer whose surprised eyes beheld the ornithological phenomenon. The men were sitting down to a hearty breakfast—roast turkey and other toothsome things—when they were "piped to quarters."
